**Minutes:**

TONI WEEKS, Detective, Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department (Metro), indicated that MR. WALRAVEN was denied a work card for a clerk position at Fremont Liquor, where he has been working for 13 months on a work card issued for another location. MR. WALRAVEN was released and placed on parole for life in 2001. Since then, he has had no contact with the police. In his position, he basically stocks and does inventory, which does not require a work card. However, when he relieves other employees for break or has to fill in when someone calls in sick, he has to use the cash register, which requires a work card. The owner wishes to continue to employ MR. WALRAVEN.

**CITY COUNCIL MEETING OF: FEBRUARY 7, 2007**

MR. WALRAVEN explained that five years after he was sentenced to life in prison something within him caused him to want to change his life. He got a college education, started a reading program in prison and acted as a mediator between prison gangs. When he was released, he was warned that it would be very difficult, but he is trying very hard to stay on track and to reconstruct his life. He humbly asked the Council to grant him a work card. MAYOR GOODMAN noted that MR. WALRAVEN is only asking to work stocking shelves, and that he certainly could not turn down such a humble presentation and request.

COUNCILMAN WOLFSON verified with MR. WALRAVEN that he is currently on parole.

COUNCILMAN ROSS praised MR. WALRAVEN for his impressive recovery. However, he could not support issuing him a work card, given his probationary status. He offered to assist him in obtaining a job that does not require a work card.

COUNCILMAN REESE offered to issue a site-specific work card with some conditions. He advised the youth sitting with the individual Council members of the importance of obtaining an education.
