Minutes:
CHAIRMAN DAVENPORT declared the Public Hearing open.

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MARK FIORENTINO, 3800 Howard Hughes Parkway, appeared on behalf of the applicant. He provided a brief summary and submitted a list of social services offered by the Nevada Partnership for Homeless Youth. Speaking on both Items 25 & 26, he described the smaller of the two locations as the site that would house the administrative functions of the organization. He stated the plan is to move from the current location, stay on rent and still continue to operate from the temporary location. Referencing the second location at 864 East Sahara Avenue, MR. FIORENTINO explained that when the building is fully renovated and completed, all of the drop-in services will be handled at this location. He provided design sketches and estimated a total package of \$1.3 million, inclusive of acquisition and renovation costs. MR. FIORENTINO named numerous contributory agencies, local businesses and prominent citizens, all of whom have contributed time and money to make this project a realization.

MR. FIORENTINO provided copies of letters from the current landlord certifying they have had no problems, and from the John S. Parke Association, the Trinity School and an owner of several properties in the area supporting the project. MR. FIORENTINO, in addressing staffs concerns substantiated the hours of operation and emphasized that the Partnership is investing a large amount of money to see this project through.

PENELOPE HARDY, 838 Alhambra Drive, appeared in opposition. She stated that she lives north of the proposed project and has been a resident in that area over twenty years. Her primary concern focused on access to the site and the burden that would be placed on the existing neighborhood. She believed the project would promote a social gathering place that would greatly impact an old neighborhood. PENNY HACKETT, 828 Alhambra Drive, stated that his neighborhood currently has problems involving people sealing the wall dividing the commercial businesses from the residential area. He felt the purpose and intent of the project is to be commended, but the location is not right.

Speaking in support of the project, JEFF LONG, 1000 E Sahara, complimented the efforts being made to assist young adults in strengthening out their lives. Having access to medical clinics he offered medical assistance to the young people who may require medical attention. BOB BELLIS, John S. Parke Association, appeared in support. Having been a project manager for the Nevada Partnership for over two years and involved in building the programs, he ascertained that there has been no impact on the neighborhood at its current location. TODD FARLOW, 240 N. 19th Street, asked whether this is the same organization that previously came before the Planning Commission. No one could provide confirmation.

MR. FIORENTINO offered to meet with those individuals and take them to the existing facility so they could get an idea of the exact services being provided as well as the flow of traffic to and from the site.

COMMISSIONER GOYNES commented on the positive aspects of providing these services to young adults by encouraging self-sufficiency. Referring to the Veolia Bus Company, he noted that the company will accommodate children by providing bus transportation so they can safely

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return to the organization. He promoted the concept of the program and disagreed with the idea that it would create an environment for young people to hang out. COMMISSIONER GOYNES emphasized that the entire program is a serious effort to change young peoples lives.

COMMISSIONER STEINMAN stated that in an effort to understand the entire concept of this program, he visited the facility. He expressed his amazement at the organization, how the staff provided assistance, and the same time encouraging the young people to turn their lives around and continue to focus in a positive way. COMMISSIONER STEINMAN stated, without a doubt this project would be a great addition to our community.

CHAIRMAN DAWENPORT declared the Public Hearing closed for Items 25 and 26.
