- Expected completion February 2011.



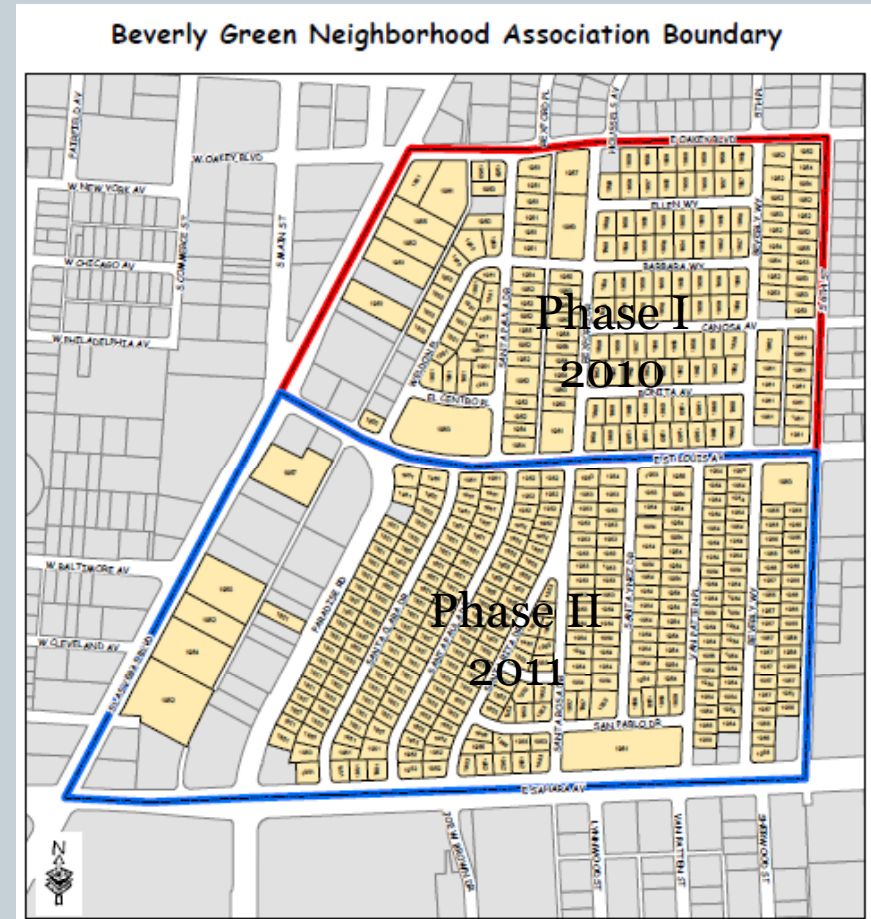
Berkley Square Historic District

- Designated on the National Register of Historic Places October 2009.
- \$25,000 received from the Las Vegas Centennial Commission to place banners around the perimeter of the neighborhood focusing on the history of the neighborhood.
- Evaluating options for banner installation.



Historic Preservation Fund Grants

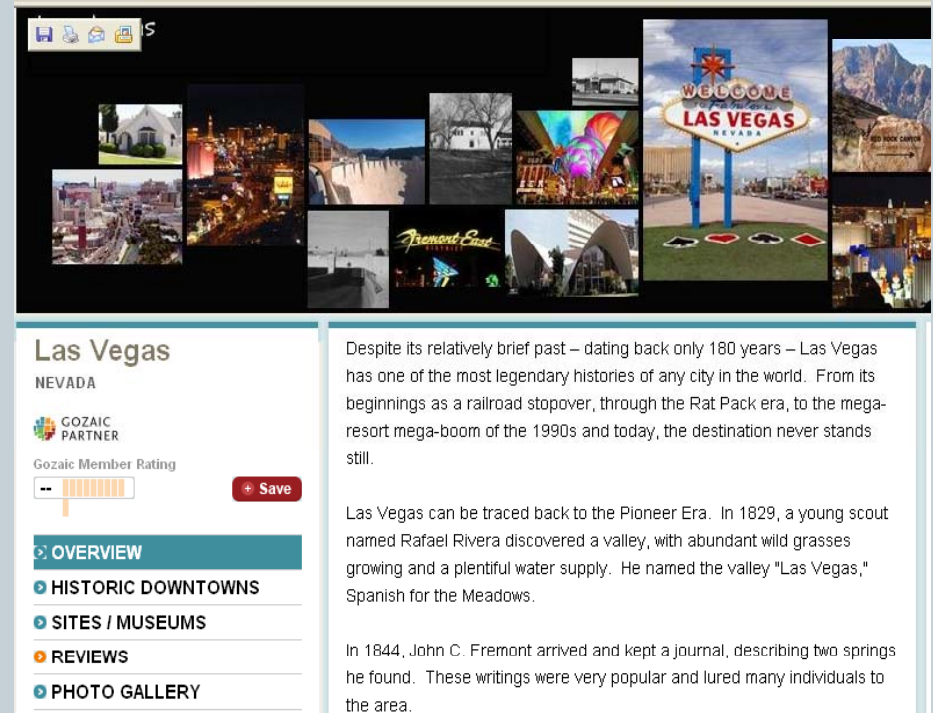
- National Park Service Grant administered through Nevada State Historic Preservation Office.
- Maintaining inventory of historic properties is required by Nevada state statutes.
- 2010 grant will fund the Phase I Historic Resource Survey and Inventory of the Beverly Green Neighborhood.

Despite its relatively brief past – dating back only 180 years – Las Vegas has one of the most legendary histories of any city in the world. From its beginnings as a railroad stopover, through the Rat Pack era, to the mega-resort mega-boom of the 1990s and today, the destination never stands still.

Las Vegas can be traced back to the Pioneer Era. In 1829, a young scout named Rafael Rivera discovered a valley, with abundant wild grasses growing and a plentiful water supply. He named the valley "Las Vegas," Spanish for the Meadows.

In 1844, John C. Fremont arrived and kept a journal, describing two springs he found. These writings were very popular and lured many individuals to the area.
