PURPOSE/BACKGROUND:

Current code provisions authorize the administrative issuance of a temporary license for a limited number of privileged license categories. This bill would expand that authority to apply to all privileged categories. The administratively-issued temporary license would be good for up to 90 days, and could be extended by the City Council for two additional extension periods not to exceed 6 months each.

ACTING DEPUTY CITY MANAGER MARK VINCENT noted an upcoming bill would address fee enhancements for special services such as tracking temporary licenses. Currently those requests are treated as a priority by staff and, under the upcoming bill, those applicants would pay a premium for priority service and faster approval of their temporary licenses.

CHIEF DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY VAL STEED stated the effective date would be stated in an additional section in Bill No. 2009-9. He recommended forwarding this item to the Council with approval as a First Amendment and explained that the bill would be held in abeyance to the 4/15/2009 City Council meeting so both bills can be presented to the Council at the same time.
