PURPOSE/BACKGROUND:

This bill will revise and relocate within the Municipal Code the provisions regulating the naming of streets and assignment of addresses and, in addition, will adopt the "City of Las Vegas Street Naming and Address Assignment Regulations, 2009 Edition as a replacement for the 1993 Edition of that document. The revised and updated provisions reflect changes that have occurred since the issue was last revisited and represent a coordinated effort among local entities. The Code provisions are being relocated so as to appear in Title 19 of the Code rather than Title 13.

RECOMMENDATION:

This bill should be submitted to a Recommending Committee for review, hearing and recommendation to the City Council for final action.

Minutes:

FLINN FAGG, Planning and Development Department, explained that this bill would adopt the recommendations from the County-wide 9-1-1 Committee regarding addressing standards. It

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would move the regulations to another section of the Code and the Planning and Development Department will be in charge of its administration. The Departments of Building and Safety and Fire and Rescue are both in support of these changes and he recommended approval.

Some of the changes include clarifying where Far Hills Drive and Clark County 215 are north and south. Currently, any deviation to the Street Naming and Address Assignment Regulations requires a Waiver and this bill would change that requirement to a Variance. MR. FAGG clarified for COUNCILMAN BARLOW that the Street Name Change process would not change. If an applicant would like to use a street naming term in a way that is not permitted by the Code, that applicant would be required to file a Variance application.

CHIEF DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY VAL STELLER noted that this bill would impact new developments with new streets needing names. In response to COUNCILMAN ANTHONY'S questions, he explained that these standards would be published in a booklet that will replace the existing Street Naming and Address Assignment Regulations. He explained that the replacement language is indicated by brackets and language being changed would be stricken-out. As this bill would become a section in Title 18, there is no bracketing in the draft before the Committee.
