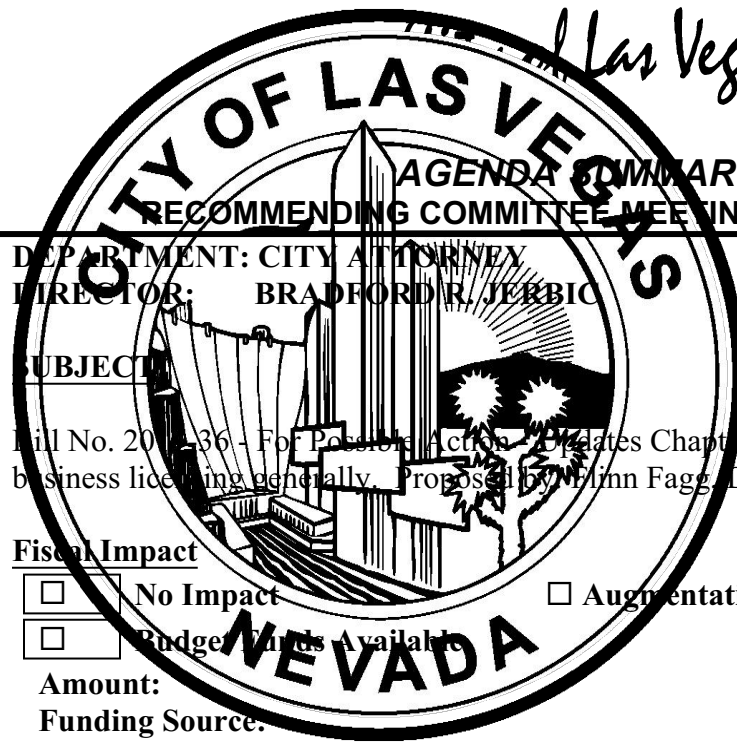

PURPOSE/BACKGROUND:

This bill will update Chapter 6.02 of the Municipal Code relating to business licensing generally. Most of the changes are housekeeping or clarifying in nature. The bill clarifies the rights of appeal regarding certain administrative actions and includes provisions allowing additional flexibility in the repayment of delinquent fee amounts determined to be owing during an audit. In accordance with State law, the bill also authorizes the issuance of multi-jurisdictional licenses under specified circumstances.

RECOMMENDATION:

This bill should be submitted to a Recommending Committee for review, hearing and recommendation to the City Council for final action.

By way of reading the item, COUNCILMAN BARLOW declared the Public Hearing open.

KAREN DUDDLESTEN, Business Licensing Manager, explained that this general update addresses two major topics. The first topic is the addition of language enabling multi-jurisdictional licensing that will allow the city to move forward with regional licensing as part of

SB110 from the last legislative session. It will also be necessary to create an annual renewal period as part of the preparations for regional licensing. The second topic helps to clarify and streamline the handling of expiring licenses by clearly stating that licenses will expire 60 days after their renewal date and that businesses with expired licenses have six months to renew or they will have to begin the application process anew.

COUNCILMAN COFFIN received clarification from MS. DUDDLESTEN that this bill does not affect home office permits, or insurance licenses.

SEAN FELLOWS, Government Affairs Director at the Greater Las Vegas Association of Realtors, stated his support of the department's changes and appreciates the inclusion of the expiration dates.

By way of reading the next item, COUNCILMAN BARLOW declared the Public Hearing closed.
