**Minutes:**

EDDIE REEDOM advised the bargaining units to be realistic during this national financial crisis and cooperate to help fellow employees retain jobs. He then alleged that he was defrauded by Towbin Infinity, and the Councilmembers should not have been socializing with individuals from Towbin. He cautioned that he would be suing the City for large amounts of money for the damage the City's failure to enforce the laws and respond has caused him.

DAHNSHAULIS, Teacher at the College of Southern Nevada, claimed that the City is planning for a mob museum and a new City Hall at the expense of public employees jobs and future projects for West Las Vegas. The City should be thoughtful and just in its budget, but the constituents need to know that in 1956 the City of Las Vegas conspired with the Nevada Department of Transportation to build I-15 through historic West Las Vegas, even though it would cost more than the two other alternatives. In 1968, the City closed several vital streets in West Las Vegas, which took several years to reopen, and has spent funds on fruitless projects. With the closure of F Street, the City cut the only direct access from West Las Vegas to millions in development at Symphony Park.
