Minutes:

TIMOTHY ELIADO, Las Vegas resident, said that education regarding cannabis is key. If someone is disabled and chooses cannabis, the vocational doctor will not support the patient because they do not consider cannabis as medicinal. He also asked that the City have some sort of vocational rehabilitation program for medical patients, stating that in addition to the medicine, they also need employment, shelter and food. MR. ELIADO requested that the media report on the real issues.

RAYMOND FLETCHER, Las Vegas resident, said that access to dispensaries is being limited by not allowing 24 hour operation, and added that people who are ill cannot get their medication delivered. MAYOR GOODMAN said that delivery was approved.

MR. FLETCHER stated that there is a lot of road construction in the community and requested that as the contractors get their business licenses, they be reminded of the pedestrians and people who use wheelchairs. He said that their signs block the sidewalks causing dangerous situations and challenged the City Councilmembers to try to access the community in a wheelchair and look at the curb cuts. MAYOR GOODMAN requested that MR. FLETCHER let the City know when he finds inaccessible curb cuts. COUNCILMAN ROSS told MR. FLETCHER that he is an inspiration and an example to a lot of people in the community. MR. FLETCHER said he is a man who was given a challenge at birth and can sit at home and feel sorry for himself or do the best he can to live the fullest life.

FRANK HAWKINS, Las Vegas resident, commended staff for all of the work staff and the City Council have done on the medical marijuana issues.
