

BUSINESS IMPACT STATEMENT

BILL NO. 2014-40

(Repeals and replaces LVMC Chapter 6.04 relating to business license fees, including provisions for various fee increases and decreases, and provisions consolidating or eliminating a number of fee categories; and amends other LVMC Title 6 provisions to clarify the definition of “gross sales/gross revenue” for fee purposes and make other conforming amendments)

This business impact statement was prepared pursuant to NRS 237.090 to address the impact of a proposed ordinance, Bill No. 2014-40, that will repeal and replace LVMC Chapter 6.04 relating to business license fees, including provisions for various fee increases and decreases, and provisions consolidating or eliminating a number of fee categories; and amends other LVMC Title 6 provisions to clarify the definition of “gross sales/gross revenue” for fee purposes and make other conforming amendments.

1. The following constitutes a description of the manner in which comment was solicited from affected businesses, a summary of their responses and an explanation of the manner in which other interested persons may obtain a copy of the summary.

Notice of the proposed measure was sent by postcard to approximately 12,087 gross fee licensees, 5,944 flat fee licensees, and 6 local chambers of commerce and by newspaper notice published on April 28th in the Review Journal with the draft bill language available on the City’s website and at the Business Licensing Division offices. Responses included approximately 50 emails, 17 comments received via the City’s website, and 2 letters received at the Business Licensing Division offices. In addition, notice of alcoholic beverage license fee increases were part of a separate solicitation relating to alcohol-related uses sent to approximately 2389 licensees. Copies of the written submissions particular to fees are attached to this business impact statement

2. The estimated economic effect of the proposed rule on businesses, including, without limitation, both adverse and beneficial effects, and both direct and indirect effects:

Adverse effects:

Increased burden of doing business for those license categories with a fee increase proposed

Beneficial effects:

Simplification and consolidation of categories and fee bases, in some cases. Improved service delivery with the planned improvements to the online services and maintaining or enhancing customer service

Direct effects:

See adverse and beneficial effects above

Indirect effects:

None identified

3. The following constitutes a description of the methods the local government considered to reduce the impact of the proposed rule on businesses and a statement regarding whether any, and if so which, of these methods were used:

City staff have considered the comments regarding fees and met with affected business owners to try and minimize impacts where possible. Adjustments to the original proposal have been made or will be proposed as a result of some of the feedback received

4. The estimate of the annual cost to the local government for enforcement of the proposed rule is:

Approximately \$80,000

5. If the proposed rule provides for a new fee or increases an existing fee, the total annual amount expected to be collected is:

Approximately \$1,392,000

6. If the proposed rule provides for a new fee or increases an existing fee, the money generated by the new fee or increase in existing fee will be used by the local government to:

Support technology costs of processing and monitoring business licensing and to either increase or maintain existing efficiencies related to administration and enforcement. The City has made a significant investment in licensing technology and will have to continue to do so, as well as investing in maintain existing technology. Additionally, the City has the need to maintain staffing levels to meet customer service demands and comply with licensing cycle timing and schedules.

7. If the proposed rule includes provisions that duplicate or are more stringent than federal, state or local standards regulating the same activity, the following explains why such duplicative or more stringent provisions are necessary:

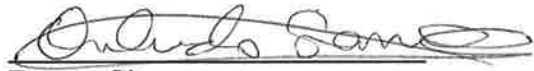

8. The reasons for the conclusions regarding the impact of the proposed rule on businesses:

Although there will be an impact on many businesses, it is believed that adjustments to business license fees are warranted at this time. A significant period of time has passed since adjustments were made to most of the fixed fee categories. No adjustment has been made to the gross revenue schedule since 1960. Currently the minimum annual license fee of \$50 no longer covers the cost to the City to maintain the each license. Presently it costs the City a minimum of \$105 to maintain each license. Additionally, the service delivery (both online and by the City's customer service staff) that will be able to be maintained and enhanced should greatly improve the business licensing experience for the City's business community.

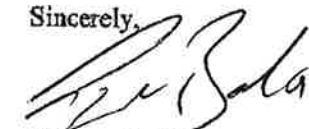
To whom it may concern:

I have read the proposed update, AmendTitle6 that I downloaded from the city website.

I must admit I was shocked at the DOUBLING of most of the fees. The two categories that I fall under, an automobile towing service and an administrative and corporate office space, based on the fact that our office is located at other than our storage facility, will raise my present costs from \$300.00 to \$500.00 each year, on top of the State of Nevada doubling its fees in the recent past and an annual list of officers, etc., and the ever expanding regulatory requirements imposed by the Nevada Transportation Authority.

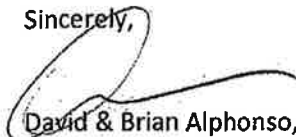
In an environment where more small businesses are failing each year, and the proposed margin tax, it is becoming harder and harder to survive in this lack of recovery. An increase of \$200 may not seem like much to a government entity, but to a small business, any additional regulatory fees are a massive burden. I had visions of growing and employing an additional person by now, but with the ongoing economic downturn (and yes, it is still going on, look at the number of empty business spaces still within the city limits, not to mention NLV and Clark County) and increasing overheads of fuel, taxes, maintenance and rents, this will not happen this year, or next, if our business survives that long.

The large proposed increases will indeed both impose a direct and significant economic burden upon my business and restrict the operation and expansion of my business.

It is a proven fact that a reduction of fees and taxes result in more businesses and business activity, more taxes being collected and more people being employed. The old domino effect, only in a good way, more money kept in the businesses hands, more expansion and purchasing, more employment, more buying, more sales tax collected, more demand for things and services, more employment, etc., etc., etc.

Text Response

This is a tripling of the current license fee. I am a one-man investment advisor who nets around \$50,000. The new license would be about 1.5% of my net income. With state, federal and city licenses, my licensing fees are approaching 5% of my net. There really ought to be some consideration to net profit as a percentage. Licensing authorities are starting to make it not worthwhile for the small business to stay in business.

6.04.070 Annual business license fee— \$200.00 (firm), \$200.00 each additional agent or representative Ladies & Gentlemen, I thank you for the opportunity to submit a comment. I agree that an agency should pay a business license fee of some sort. As a small agency \$200 a year is not too much in my opinion. As I grow and try to hire new agents, I dont think i should pay the same amount for each new agent trying to start their career with me. It should be graduated fees some sort of way. I believe 30-40% of the initial fee for each agent up to lets say five. Then 50% from 5 to 10 for the larger agencies and so on. This is advanced so no one has made any money and the agent has to pay up, especially new agents who just paid for classes, testing and licensing. Since our business is one which is not stationary, we are concerned about the ramifications for mobile car wash and detailing services and how this change will impact our business. We are a small, family owned business with no employees. Our overhead is very low because our income is only enough to allow us to meet the needs of our daily life. We do not have an extravagant life style. Any additional yearly fees effect our bottom line. We oppose any increase in fees as we are competing with businesses who offer cut rate, stationary car washing services which are substandard to our way of conducting business. We offer a more personal experiences which allows our guests to work or play while their vehicles are being cared for with pride and Aloha.

"As worded" 6.04.070 would add \$200 per ANY staff member in an insurance agent's office. Of course I object!

I am a small agency with my family working for me. The proposed license fee would raise my agency cost to \$600 a year. To over come that expense would cost me one month of new business commission from sales. This squeezes the small insurance agencies especially the captive agents that only have one company to sell from.

•Impose a direct and significant economic burden upon a business; or How does the City think it is fair to impose a business license fee per person working in an insurance firm? It is bad enough that we have to have a business license for the state and the city that we work in. You will stop a lot of us from hiring workers. I can not afford to pay an extra 200 per year per person working in my office. I can barley afford to use a payroll service so that my staff can get health insurance. Your rates doubled since I have been doing this yet there is nothing that the City provides us. I hope others stand up because this is ridiculous. At least for me it will not matter. I am tired of this state and will be closing my doors. Just another good reason to leave.

Our small business struggles constantly with the rising costs of all goods and services that we cannot recoup and keep clients if we raise our prices too high. It appears we would increase our cost of business licensing 50% under this amendment. I figured the City of Las Vegas would be doing the right thing by going online but it appears the company taking care of the website is too expensive for what we can afford. I know this should mean fewer employees in offices working to do the work of the website but I'm dissappointed we as a company keep cutting costs and working on less money so we can give more for higher costs of running the license bureau. Many businesses will get better deals for an annual license but I didn't see my company getting any advantage just more cost. I feel all businesses should be charged equally. Thank you, Carol Platt, owner.

Regarding Insurance agency/representatives. I have had an insurance agency for 12 years, the license fee was orginally 100 annual that increased to 200/annual. Now an additional 200 per licensed rep is being proposed which is unfair to me, being a small business owner already dealing with increases in expenses and loss of revenue due to online companies. What is being proposed for the on-line insurers? Since that is where the business is going, its unfair to penalize the small insurance agent.

I would like to comment on an upcoming bill, slated to go before the council in June. As I am sure that you've begun receiving comments from other concerned city residents, I will be brief. I realize that compromise is necessary in society, what myself and others find problematic is a 30% proposed business fee increase on artists, and the many artists who will be impacted are renting studios, or trying to run businesses in an area downtown designated "The 18b Arts District" where (in addition to Fremont East) the city has created generous tax and business incentives for bars and taverns, BUT NOT FOR ARTISTS OR GALLERIES. Ladies and Gentlemen:

Thank you for allowing me the opportunity to comment.

Here is my bottom line counter-proposal — Scrap the entire annual/semi-annual structure and use a NET consumption tax based structure no matter what business you are engaged in. Charge per site or per location or per “entity”.

I will spend less if these changes are put fully into effect.

Overall, I always find it intriguing that we must shoulder the cost of making the system more efficient. The postcard clearly indicates that you are after efficiency, but that being more efficient will cost me in the short and long term. I find this counter-intuitive and unacceptable from local government organizations that are set up to take more of my earned money in the name of efficiency and “other related matters”. How about a processing fee if I choose to do my semi-annual business with you online instead of pushing up my fees. I’ll drop by your office and pay instead of having more of my income taken.

Comment #1:

Overall, the semi-annual fee structure is certainly undesirable. The first issue I have with this structure is that it already taxes me on my gross revenue—Why gross? I have a significant outlay every year just to keep my services available to the public and I have to include that sunken cost as part of the tax I pay to simply license myself.

Next, those brackets are going up and taking away more of my money to be used at my discretion for my business development. This continues one burden (gross receipts instead of net), and increases another (bracket increases) on me.

Comment #2:

As the sole proprietor of my professional business I infer that my business license cost will go from \$150 to \$500 annually. What on earth requires such a jump in fees before I even open my door for business? Given the unionization of Las Vegas I further infer that this is a direct, intentional and measured attack on non-union activity to subvert sole-proprietors that do not belong to a union. This further angers me because although I would not typically belong to a union, there is not a union for my type of activity as a contractor.

From what I can tell from your document and my uneducated knowledge of “The Code” I see this as another way the city is increasing it’s immediate tax revenue on the backs of local establishments that live and work here. I even bring in money from other states that you see in revenues and I am still paying more in Las Vegas fees to do just that. Go to a consumption based taxing method and we’ll all be happier.

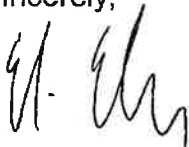

As a visual artist who rents studio space in the 18b Arts District, I am directly impacted by the 30% fee increase in the "Visual Artist" license category and I would like to go on public record as opposing the fee increase.

The proposed business license fee increase impacts visual artists working in "The 18b Arts District," where (in addition to Fremont East) the city has created generous tax and business incentives for urban lounges and taverns, BUT HAS NOT DONE SO FOR VISUAL ARTISTS OR GALLERIES. Though much of the new development downtown is exciting and welcome, we are seeing an increase in downtown bars as gallerists struggle to keep afloat and studio spaces/potential studio spaces remain vacant in the arts district. This proposed fee increase alongside a lack of incentives discourages artists from renting space and working in the so-called "Arts District" or anywhere downtown for that matter outside of their own homes. This, in effect, discourages real growth and sustainability of the arts downtown. Does the City of Las Vegas, really think that EVERY visual artist makes a lot of money??? or enough money to warrant paying a flat fee of \$200???

Frankly, I believe it would be FAR MORE FAIR to charge a sales based fee for all artists - unless you want to CAP it for them at \$200.

So, I am retired - I am a photographer - Here are two different scenarios yet BOTH are UNFAIR in my opinion.

2012 - In 2012, I earned 19690 Gross and 5670 net and I paid a flat fee of \$200 (During this same year, if I were on the sliding scale for sales based fee, I would have paid only \$110)

2013 - In 2013, I earned 991 Gross and had a loss of (8,202) - however I still paid a flat fee of \$200, whereas if I were on a sliding scale for sales based fee, I would have paid only \$110)

On your sliding scale - people who GROSS
up to \$60,000 only pay \$110 per year
and from \$60,000 to \$360,000 only pay \$200 per year

I think, during my entire career I only grossed in the region of \$100,000 one or two times and that was when I lived in a major city New York

Now I am essentially retired, but I still occasionally make sales more as a visual artist than anything else - but you are putting a heavier burden on me as a retiree and as a visual artist than you would put on someone earning up to \$60,000

My opinion is that you need to re-evaluate the Visual Artist category - and allow us to pay lower fees if we are not earning up to \$60,000 a year.

Dear Sirs:

In an environment in which businesses are struggling to make ends meet, we are finding that many government entities throughout the city, county, state and country are increasing their fees.

The question I must ask is why? In my business, as we have entered the depression, people are less willing to part with what little they have left. Many are loosing their jobs, their homes and beginning to live on much less than they have had in the past. I have had to reduce my staffing because of a reduction in income. I have had to reduce my own spending for business expenses.

What about government? The work load has decreased. Instead of reducing the number of employees they have decided to increase the fees that they charge. Inspectors are now going around looking for more violations simply to prove that they belong. The end result is that we end up paying more and more for government services.

At the North Las Vegas Airport where I teach on occasion they often have three people staffing a desk that probably could be handled by one, even if there were a little more work to do. The costs of aviation fuel is currently \$6.05 per gallon. Avgas used to be one dollar per gallon more expensive, now it is two. I was in the Boise area two weeks ago and the fuel costs there were about \$5.25 per gallon. They are out in the middle of nowhere, but their costs are lower because the government fees that are added are less. The Department of Aviation imposes a 2% tax on any business at the airport. This might make sense at McCarran where there is a large captive audience still willing to spend a lot of money, but at a smaller general aviation airport that 2% tax has for many been the difference between success and failure.

It is time for government to downsize. If government must employ fewer people then so be it. That is what I have had to do in my business. Increasing the fees during a depression simply makes things worse. Fees should be reduced, taxes should be reduced. City government should become more business friendly and do all that they can to encourage growth, not tax it.

- 1) I do not see why License fees have to be raised, when the City doesn't do ANYTHING to actually promote business in this time of recession. Tax increases result in retail price increases, which result in reduced business volume, and deepening of recessions and reduction of employment. Every \$100 of increased taxes simply pays for more inflated government salaries and more regulations. Taxes always seem to go up, regardless of the benefit the resulting government gives to the citizens.
- 2) Manufacturing is nearly nonexistent in Las Vegas, and what appears to be a doubling of our license fee to manufacture will definitely make it more difficult to actually make anything here, and will cause us to increase our reliance on imports from china, and reduction of employment here in Las Vegas.

Upon review of the proposed changes to the licensing fees and definitions, we are concerned about Section 6.04.005 Sales-based fee.

At the time of obtaining a business license for a senior apartment complex, the licensing department made us apply for 2 licenses. One for the general business and another for the private laundry room on-site for use by the residents. We are currently paying the \$25 semi-annual license fee and only average around \$2500 per 6 month period. To increase that fee to \$55 semi-annually when we are not a commercial laundry facility is not acceptable. The nominal fee charged to the residents is simply to help maintain the machines and not a large source of income.

In summary, not only are we opposed to the license fee increase, but we would like the licensing requirement for private, non-commercial laundry facilities removed.
