Minutes:

MAYOR GOODMAN declared the Public Hearing open.

DEPUTY CITY MANAGER ORLANDO SANCHEZ, Deputy City Manager, explained that this is part of the Mayor and City Council direction to review all City Ordinances to repeal obsolete language in the code.

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COUNCILMAN COFFIN asked if changes pertain to where bicycles are allowed, especially in the downtown area. JORGE CERVANTES, Executive Director, Community Development, explained that most changes are related to parking enforcement. Regarding the bicycles and different vehicles, a committee was established and Traffic Engineers have been meeting with the committee and are continuing to meet to develop an ordinance that addresses these types of vehicles and their uses. The transition of Parking and Enforcement going to Economic and Urban Development is addressed in these changes as well. MAYOR GOODMAN reiterated that this relates to City Council having directed legal to review all the codes and get rid of those that are outdated or update them as necessary.
