CHAIR STOLDAL called the meeting to order at 12:00 p.m.

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, introduced STEPHANIE BRUNING, Grant Program Coordinator, Office of Community Services. She was a Historic Preservation Officer in two other cities and has a professional and educational background in historic preservation.

COMMISSIONER MOONEY also introduced NICOLE EDDOWES, Planner I, who would be helping her with some of the Historic Preservation Commission projects and staff reports, and ASSEMBLYWOMAN HEIDI SWANK, Director, Nevada Preservation Foundation.

DAVID SHARP, President of Harrison House, introduced himself.

Minutes:

CHAIR STOLDAL asked if there was new legislation regarding a 45-day timeframe that would impact the minutes. ASSEMBLYWOMAN HEIDI SWANK remarked that she believed the minutes would have to be approved within 45 days of the meeting. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY JAMES LEWIS commented that the City would be in compliance.

After CHAIR STOLDAL stated that he was unable to review these minutes because they were not posted on-line, DEBRA OUTLAND, Deputy City Clerk, informed him that the meeting minutes were not posted on-line until after they were approved by the Commission. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY LEWIS stated that in order to comply with the Open Meeting Law, the public needed to be informed that the Commission would be reviewing the draft minutes at a meeting. Once the draft minutes had been reviewed and approved by the Commission, they would be placed on the City's website for the public to review. He confirmed for CHAIR STOLDAL that the public did not get an opportunity to comment on the draft minutes, as they are the Commission's minutes.

As CHAIR STOLDAL commented that he could not recall the March meeting, he asked if the Commission was approving the minutes or accepting the minutes. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY LEWIS stated that the item was for approval, and the minutes could be approved, accepted or denied.

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, asked if the Commission's approval could be conditioned upon any comments she would have after reviewing the minutes, as she was not able to review them prior to the meeting. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY LEWIS did not believe the minutes could be approved with that condition. CHAIR STOLDAL stated that the minutes could either be held in abeyance or accepted as written.

Subsequent to the vote, DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY LEWIS indicated that he would ensure that the City Clerk was aware of the new legislation that had passed.

6. [HPC-59661 For possible action regarding funded Historic Preservation Commission Centennial Legacy Fund grant projects All Wards](#)

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, read the Analysis from the attached Staff Report.

As it related to the Harrison House, COMMISSIONER MOONEY noted that no invoices could be paid and no work could commence until the funding agreement had been received. CHAIR STOLDAL asked about the timeframe, to which COMMISSIONER MOONEY replied that the project must be completed by the end of February 2016. The representative

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from Harrison House would be providing an update under agenda Item 7.

An Excel spreadsheet was distributed, which is attached, that contained all of the grants and expenditures from the Historic Preservation Commission Centennial Legacy Fund, as only the first page had been provided in the original backup documentation.

COMMISSIONER MOONEY confirmed for CHAIR STOLDAL that the entire \$5,000 related to the SARANN KNIGHT PREDDY grant had been paid. She noted that a representative of the grant was present and would be providing additional information under agenda Item 8.

7. [Report by Harrison House, Inc. regarding the status of the HPC Centennial Legacy Grant project for events celebrating the Pioneer Trail Ward 5 \(Barlow\)](#)

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, stated that the Harrison House representative would provide an update to the application for funding and noted that the funding agreement had not yet been received.

DAVID SHARP, President of Harrison House, stated that he took over the position of President after STANTON WILKERSON left the organization and Las Vegas. This grant was applied for by MR. WILKERSON and with the transition of him leaving, the organization did not have the resources to continue with the grant schedule as he had organized it. The Harrison House Board met yesterday, and they are now prepared to move forward. COMMISSIONER MOONEY confirmed for CHAIR STOLDAL that the organization had until the end of February 2016 to complete the project, but they could always request an extension of time.

COMMISSIONER McMILLAN-ARNOLD asked for clarification as to what was required to be provided by February 2016. COMMISSIONER MOONEY corrected herself, stating that the grant project would have to be completed and the invoices submitted to the City for payment by March 24, 2016.

CHAIR STOLDAL looked forward to the project being finished. MR. SHARP stated that it was an honor to be before this Commission and thought the Harrison House should be put to good use as a community outreach resource.

8. [Report regarding the status of the HPC Centennial Legacy grant project from Sarann Knight Preddy for a book about the Historic Westside Ward 5 \(Barlow\)](#)

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, reported that the grant was approved in September 2013, in the amount of \$5,000, to conduct a seminar about the Historic Westside, hire a writer, photographer, videographer and a designer to create a publication about the history of the Historic Westside and cover costs associated with publishing that book. The project was due September 24, 2014 with scheduled quarterly updates, but due to the passing of Project Manager SARANN PREDDY, a project representative requested, and was granted, an extension of time. The representative had provided updates when requested, all invoices had been paid and the project remained open.

CYNTHIA CICERO, editor of the book, announced that she was very pleased that the book was now with the printer. A mockup was expected very soon and once approved, the book would be printed, and a book release would be planned with MS. PREDDY'S son. The hope was to do something in July since MS. PREDDY'S birthday was July 25th. Copies would be distributed to the Commission once completed, with special collections placed in museums and schools and some would also be for sale. CHAIR STOLDAL and COMMISSIONER McMILLAN-ARNOLD commented that that was good news.

In response to CHAIR STOLDAL'S inquiry as to the funding for the printing costs, MS. CICERO stated that those funds were received through a grant from the Commission for the Las Vegas Centennial. She acknowledged that she would inform COMMISSIONER MOONEY once a date was confirmed.

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9. [Report by Department of Planning regarding an update on the 2015 Historic Preservation Fund grant, multiple APNs, multiple Zones Ward 3 \(Coffin\) and Ward 5 \(Barlow\)](#)

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, read the Analysis from the attached Staff Report, noting that staff was working, with possibly the Nevada Preservation Foundation (NPF), on conducting a public meeting to present the 2014 report findings and then obtain a proposal from the NPF to reach out to certain neighborhoods depending on the feedback received from the public meeting. The hope was that this meeting would provide direction for any scope changes for the 2015 Historic Preservation Fund Grant, which would then be brought to the Commission prior to submittal to the State Historic Preservation Office.

COMMISSIONER MOONEY noted that the challenge staff faced was with the large geographical area that the historic context covered. Without feedback from the neighborhoods, it was not known which neighborhood the City wanted to focus its public outreach efforts on and then move forward with a nomination. The only neighborhood the City had heard from was the Huntridge neighborhood; however, some neighborhoods had never been approached, due to the limited budget. The hope was that the public meeting would provide the City with some direction, and she could come to the Commission with feedback from that meeting.

DAVID SHARP, President of Harrison House, suggested the possibility of working in conjunction with the City on public outreach, as their organization was trying to inform the public what the Harrison House was about and what they do. COMMISSIONER MOONEY clarified that the grant was a historic context report about World War II housing that was built through loans supported through the Federal Housing Administration (FHA). It addressed the Historic Westside in stating that there were some homes that were built post-war, but not necessarily part of this FHA historic context, so the public outreach that would be done would be focused on those neighborhoods meeting that criteria. While there are significant resources in the Historic Westside that need to be included in any kind of public outreach, the Harrison House was not related to this specific grant. VICE CHAIR WHITE referred MR. SHARP to STEVE CLARKE, School of Architecture, University of Nevada, Las Vegas, to obtain information on available resources and opportunities that may exist.

CHAIR STOLDAL asked about the costs involved with reaching out to those neighborhoods that had not been contacted. COMMISSIONER MOONEY responded that the costs were unknown because the geographical area had not yet been identified. Once the geographic scope is identified, the City could look at its resources to see how it could help. She will report back to the Commission after the public meeting, which will be scheduled for some time in July.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN HEIDI SWANK, Director, NPF, offered to share the expenses involved with the Beverly Green Historic District and the Paradise Village Historic District, which included approximately 300 houses between the two districts. She recommended not having a district larger than 200 homes, as it was difficult to get through in a timely manner and everyone tends to get burned out.

CHAIR STOLDAL asked that the Commission be advised of the date of the public meeting once it was scheduled.

10. [Report by Nevada Preservation Foundation regarding Historic Preservation and Archaeology Month activities](#)

Minutes:

ASSEMBLYWOMAN HEIDI SWANK, Director, Nevada Preservation Foundation (NPF), distributed two brochures, which are attached as backup. The NPF Home Tour event was very successful. It was the first home tour that the NPF had done, and it was based on what other cities, such as Tucson and Phoenix, had done. The event was held on May 3, 2015 from 11:45 a.m. to 6 p.m. Registration along with the kick-off event, keynote speaker, ALAN HESS, took place at the Morelli House, but due to the large number of attendees, this portion may need to be held in a larger space next year.

The attendees had approximately four hours to look through 15 mid-century houses that volunteered to open their doors for the event. There were three different types of houses - original, restored, and updated, ranging from the 1940s through the early 1970s. One hundred and seventy tickets were sold, with prices ranging from \$30 for members, \$40 for non-members, and \$50 at the door. ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK noted that most ticket sales were during the last two weeks prior to the event.

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Additionally, there was a VIP Martini Tour at the end of the day of a 1972 all original house, originally owned by comic xylophonist, ROGER RAY. All 15 tickets were sold, with individuals receiving a commemorative martini glass and a guided tour of the house.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK provided statistics relating to the survey that was sent to all the attendees. This included information regarding the number of houses they were able to see in the allotted time, the quality of the houses shown and if they were likely to attend next year. Of interest was the feedback that indicated people really did not like the updated houses; they preferred the original and restored houses, so that would be the focus for next years tour. She noted that the NPFs overhead costs were only 35 percent. Consideration would be given to holding the event in the fall next year, as it was difficult having the event during the Legislative Session.

CHAIR STOLDAL commented on the large number of people that attended, stating that the event was something very special and commended the NPF for doing a very nice job. ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK mentioned a lot of great feedback was received.

11. [Report by Assemblywoman Heidi Swank regarding Senate/Assembly Bills pertaining to historic preservation and archaeology in the 78th Session of the Nevada Legislature](#)

Minutes:

ASSEMBLYWOMAN HEIDI SWANK reported that she had only two bills this Legislative Session; she had planned to do more but ended up pulling some. REBECCA PALMER pointed out to her that as the Nevada Revised Statutes (NRS) currently stood, until July 1, 2015, when this bill went into effect, any building built between the middle of the 18th Century and present day was considered historic. Assembly Bill 194 put the NRS in line with the National Trust which defines historic as 50 years prior to the current year.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK indicated that she was one of the main sponsors of Assembly Bill 377, which came out of PETE LIVERMORES bill from the 2013 Session. The bill has to do with the Nevada State Prison, which is a huge complex, with some buildings being historic and some new. One of the first things to be done would be a survey to determine which parts were historic and which were modern. The modern portions would remain under the Department of Corrections (DOC) for administrative use or they could be rented out for commercial uses that generate money. The historic property would be used as a historical, cultural, educational or scientific resource.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK spoke about the money structure and two endowment funds that would be set up following the survey. One fund would be for the historic preservation of the Nevada State Prison that would be used for operating, maintaining and preserving just the historic portions. The second endowment fund would be for maintaining the modern structures and property. Commercial rents, DOC income, grants and donations would go into this fund. At the end of the fiscal year, half of the money would get swept into the historic preservation fund for the historic portions of the building. She mentioned the possibility of putting a prison-themed hotel or bed and breakfast in the space. COMMISSIONER BECK shared that in the late 1990s, she had stayed in a jail that had been converted into a hotel in Cape Town, South Africa, and it was very unique and fun. ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK commented that from what she has seen, the hotels range from providing the prison experience to five-star hotels.

CHAIR STOLDAL commented that the challenge was that with all the publicity that the Legislature receives, it gives the impression that everything is funded and the museum would open tomorrow, when in actuality, it would not open for years. ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK remarked that a lot of work needed to be done; at this point, it was not even safe to conduct tours on the property. The bill does allow the Nevada State Prison and the DOC to engage with a non-profit, who she believed would be the Nevada Preservation Foundation, and hoped they would be able to obtain some grants. CHAIR STOLDAL asked ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK to keep the Commission informed.

12. [Report by Department of Planning regarding May 2015 Historic Preservation and Archaeology Month activities and costs All Wards](#)

Minutes:

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COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, read the Analysis and Summary of Costs from the attached Staff Report. She mentioned that the panel discussion was a well-attended and successful event.

13. [Report by Department of Planning regarding the status of the rehabilitation of the Historic Westside School, located at 330 350 West Washington Avenue \(APN 139-27-201-004\), C-V \(Civic\) Zone Ward 5 \(Barlow\)](#)

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, indicated that the update in the backup was provided by KME Architects, the lead architect on the Historic Westside School rehabilitation project, and asked for comments from any Commissioners that took the tour. CHAIR STOLDAL commented that the tour was informative, and the next big step would be moving KCEP Radio out of the old building into their new quarters, which would allow work to commence on the 1923 building. VICE CHAIR WHITE noted that the move could take place without program interruption. CHAIR STOLDAL thanked COMMISSIONER MOONEY for setting up the tour and looked forward to the next one, hoping to get to see a sense of what the 1923 building looked like. VICE CHAIR WHITE asked if there were photographs from the tour. As the photographs COMMISSIONER MOONEY had were dark, COMMISSIONER COSGROVE and CHAIR STOLDAL will forward the photos they have to her. COMMISSIONER MOONEY noted that the project was moving quickly, and the timeline was discussed as to when to set up another tour.

CHAIR STOLDAL commented that with the Variety Early Learning Center moving to Lorenzi Park, the tiles from the old pool would try to be preserved. COMMISSIONER MOONEY did not know how many of the tiles still existed but noted that one of the big takeaways from the stakeholder meetings was preserving as much of the footprint as possible. The City would like to keep as much of the original material as possible and incorporate it into the design.

COMMISSIONER McMILLAN-ARNOLD stated that the Jefferson Center pool was probably the only City pool on the west side. The handprints were those of the kids that made the tiles from the Westside School, and they were supposed to be used around a reflective pool in that area.

In response to COMMISSIONER COSGROVES inquiry as to the completion date of the Westside project, COMMISSIONER MOONEY indicated there was no exact completion date, but she heard Fall 2016. CHAIR STOLDAL asked about the occupants of the new building. COMMISSIONER McMILLAN-ARNOLD did not know who the tenants would be but understood that the Westside School Alumni Association was going to manage the building once completed. Although sometimes referred to as a museum, the scope of work was exhibit space.

14. [HPC-59344 Report by Department of Planning regarding an administrative approval for an application for a Certificate of Appropriateness to construct a utility building in the rear of the property located at 1249 8th Place, a contributing resource within the John S. Park Neighborhood Historic District \(APN 162-03-515-090\), R-1 \(Single-Family Residential\) Zone Ward 3 \(Coffin\)](#)

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, read the Analysis and Findings from the attached Staff Report. There was no discussion by the Commission.

15. [Report by Department of Planning regarding historic and archaeological resources in local media](#)

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, noted that May was a slow month, with only the one article in the Las Vegas Review Journal.

COMMISSIONER COSGROVE will forward another article mentioned by COMMISSIONER BECK to COMMISSIONER MOONEY for inclusion in next months report.

16. [Report by Department of Planning regarding Project Update list](#)

Minutes:

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COMMISSIONER MOONEY, Urban Design Coordinator, noted that the 2014 and 2015 Historic Preservation Fund grants were already discussed under another agenda item. The permits were approved on June 8, 2015 for the restoration of the adobe at Floyd Lamb Park at Tule Springs. That process was being finalized, and construction would begin in a month. The State Register nomination for the La Concha Motel Lobby at the Neon Museum was heard by the Nevada State Board of Museums and History on June 19, 2015 and was approved for listing on the State Register. There was a typo regarding the Westside School. It should read that the National Register amendment for the Westside School was approved. CHAIR STOLDAL commented that the Nevada State Board of Museums and History congratulated the City on the quality and depth of the reports.

COMMISSIONER COSGROVE remarked that there was a lot of public interest when she was posting information about the Westside School on social media and asked if the Commission had ever conducted a tour for the public of completed projects. COMMISSIONER MOONEY indicated tours had been done of the John S. Park neighborhood and Floyd Lamb Park but could not recall any others. CHAIR STOLDAL mentioned the Las Vegas High School neighborhood tour guide, and COMMISSIONER HAUSCH mentioned the on-line guide for the John S. Park neighborhood walking tour. Additional discussion took place amongst the Commissioners about the possible projects that could be included in such a tour and how it was assumed that the public knew about these projects. COMMISSIONER MOONEY noted that the planning for Historic Preservation month, which is in May, usually began at the end of the year or in January of the following year. CHAIR STOLDAL suggested the subject be visited prior to then, as the Commission may consider doing something outside of Historic Preservation month.

COMMISSIONER COSGROVE asked if the Commission could put the information out to the public that there are walking tours on-line. COMMISSIONER MOONEY noted that the brochures on-line needed to be updated, but print media did not reach everyone like it used to. She suggested this topic be discussed further under agenda Item 17. COMMISSIONER SERFAS believed the public tour of completed projects to be a good idea and offered his assistance.

17. [Discussion regarding topics for future agenda items by the Historic Preservation Commission. COMMISSIONER COSGROVE requested an item be placed on an upcoming agenda to discuss ways, both within and outside of Historic Preservation month, to make the public more aware of projects that the Commission was involved in and walking tours that were available, as the public interest was there. CHAIR STOLDAL would like one focus to be the Pioneer Trail.

COMMISSIONER RUBINSON liked the idea of a tour of completed projects.

CHAIR STOLDAL asked for a report on the costs involved to update the current brochures, both in hard copy and on-line. COMMISSIONER RUBINSON commented that most people now prefer to have the information available on their phones rather than a printed version.

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Minutes:

DAVID SHARP, President of Harrison House, shared a story relating to the effects of social outreach. About a year ago, he was at the Harrison House when three Japanese people got out of a taxi with the Pioneer Trail map in their hands and were asking about the Harrison House.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN HEIDI SWANK, Director, Nevada Preservation Foundation (NPF), invited everyone to the opening of the Modernism at Risk Exhibit at the Springs Preserve, July 2nd, from 6 to 8 p.m. The exhibit runs through September 6, 2015, and involves five case studies of modernist buildings across the globe that were at risk for demolition or had already been demolished. There would also be some footage from the La Concha Project.

ASSEMBLYWOMAN SWANK announced that the NPF would be unveiling the lost Desert Inn Estate Homes, two-thirds of which were designed by HUGH E. TAYLOR. The NPF would be also announcing a project to revive, and possibly rebuild, some of the homes that were lost, including the one EDDIE FISHER bought when he married ELIZABETH TAYLOR.
