BACKGROUND

- 02/27/08 HPC approved Centennial project budget and timeline.
- 03/26/08 HPC requested revisions to the draft Centennial grant application.
- 05/28/08 HPC voted to review grant applications bi-annually in March and August, and vote bi-annually on grant awards in March and September.
- 12/11/13 HPC voted to approve (HPC-52051 and HPC-51198) revisions to the HPC Centennial Legacy Grant application regarding publishing requirements, additional required materials, evaluation criteria, eligible applicants, allowable costs and a mandatory disclaimer for grant funded projects.
- 04/23/14 HPC approved Centennial Legacy grant application (HPC-51195) from the Ward 5 Chamber of Commerce in the amount of \$5,000.00 for the Harrison House National Register nomination report and associated outreach.
- 03/25/15 HPC approved (HPC-58298) an application for HPC Centennial Legacy Grant funds submitted by Harrison House, Inc., in the amount of \$4,020.00 for publications and events celebrating the Pioneer Trail in West Las Vegas, Ward 5 (Barlow).

SUMMARY

Harrison House, Inc. was awarded \$4,020 in grant funding from the HPC Centennial Legacy Grant for publications and events celebrating the Pioneer Trail in West Las Vegas.

Harrison House, Inc. has submitted a request to approve a revised project budget.

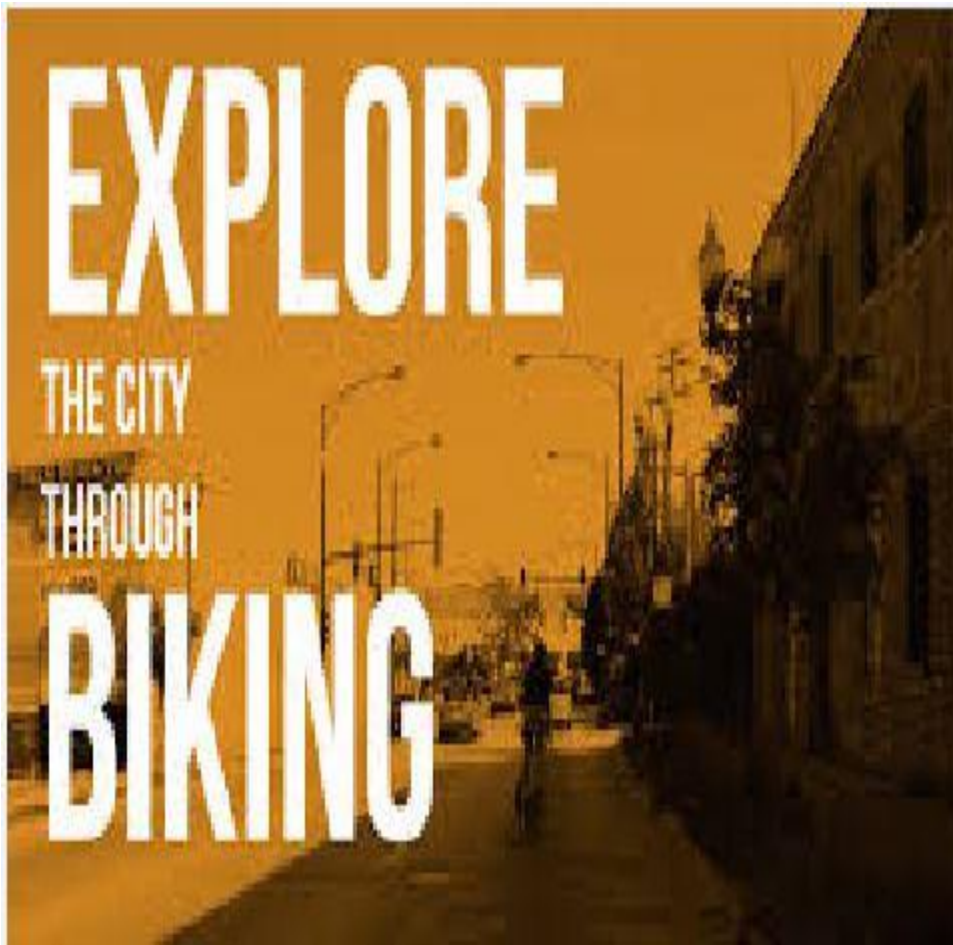

03/27/13 HPC voted to approve (HPC-48628) the annual HPC Awards for Excellence in Historic Preservation categories.

ANALYSIS

Chair Stoldal requested an item on the March 2016 agenda to discuss possible renaming of the HPC Annual Awards for Excellence in Historic Preservation or a single award category for former HPC Chair Dorothy Wright. Below are the approved categories for the HPC Annual Awards for Excellence in Historic Preservation:

- BRICKS AND MORTAR to include individuals, organizations and agencies that have sponsored a historic rehabilitation, compatible addition and/or energy efficient upgrade project.
- PRESERVATION EDUCATION to include individuals, organizations and agencies that have sponsored an historical interpretation project (such as historical markers), artwork, publications, workshops, curricula and/or research.
- ADVOCACY to include individuals or organizations that have gone above and beyond to save a threatened resource.
- CAREER ACHIEVEMENT to include individuals who have an exemplary track record in the field of historic preservation and/or archaeology.
- STUDENT SCHOLARSHIP(S) of \$500 - \$1,000 for high school students who have earned the ability to compete on the national level within the National History Day competition, and college students. Students must have original research and findings that significantly advance the understanding of the history of Las Vegas.

BACKGROUND

- 12/12/05 Las Vegas Centennial Commission approved funding of \$75,000 from Centennial Legacy funds, "History Grant" for historic preservation to be administered by the HPC.
- 03/22/06 HPC approved acceptance of Legacy funds from Centennial Board.
- 10/04/06 City Council approved Memorandum of Understanding by and between the Las Vegas Centennial Commission and the city of Las Vegas on behalf of the HPC for a grant in the amount of \$75,000 to be administered by the HPC for specified historic preservation projects.
- 02/20/13 City Council approved the first amendment to the amended and restated Memorandum of Understanding (MOU) by and between the Commission for the Las Vegas Centennial and the City of Las Vegas on behalf of the Historic Preservation Commission.
- 01/22/14 HPC approved the HPC Centennial Legacy Budget (HPC-52545).
- 05/28/14 HPC approved (HPC-54140) amendments to the First Amendment to the Amended and restated Memorandum of Understanding between the Commission for the Las Vegas Centennial and the City of Las Vegas.
- 06/25/14 HPC approved (HPC-54502) for the reallocation of \$25,000 of the Historic Preservation Commission funds for small grants, and to supplement the 2014 Historic Preservation Fund grant with the remaining balance.
- 06/25/14 HPC approved (HPC-54503) to amend the First Amendment to the Amended and Restated Memorandum of Understanding between the Commission for the Las Vegas Centennial and the City of Las Vegas to increase the Historic Preservation Commission budget to \$100,000, approval of specific projects to be funded by this amount and amend approved project categories to include education and public outreach.
- 03/25/15 HPC approved (HPC-58299) to expand public outreach activities on behalf of the Historic Preservation Commission to include social media.

ANALYSIS

The scope for the 2015 Historic Preservation Fund Grant was revised and submitted to the State Historic Preservation Office (SHPO) on February 4, 2016. The revised budget allocated additional funds to the Commissioner Assistance and Mentoring Program (CAMP) training sessions to include an additional half-day, and reduced the amount required for the creation of the History+Art+Culture mobile website. The reduced amount is due to the cost savings achieved by creating a mobile website as opposed to a mobile application.

The city of Las Vegas is reverting a total of \$7,700.00 to SHPO. The revised budget is attached.

The Las Vegas showgirl may be an endangered species — and about to go all but extinct when Bally's "Jubilee!" the last of the Strip's showgirl spectacles, closes in February.

Starting next June, however, locals will be able to relive those glittering, glamorous days of yesteryear, thanks to an upcoming collaboration between the Las Vegas News Bureau and the Nevada State Museum, Las Vegas.

An exhibit celebrating the Tropicana's long-running, long-gone "Folies Bergere" will feature costumes from the show, which the Tropicana donated to the museum last year, accompanied by photographs from the news bureau's extensive archives.

Developing the exhibit is "so exciting," according to Ginny Poehling, the news bureau's media services manager, who's reviewing about 6,000 images while preparing the display.

In some cases, the exhibit will match costumes — from shoes to those towering headpieces — to news bureau photographs showing performers wearing them.

After all, when news bureau photographers shot their images, only two pictures might have been used for promotional purposes, leaving many photos more unseen for decades, Poehling explains.

In conjunction with the exhibit's debut, panel discussions featuring locals who worked in the "Folies" will be held at the museum, she adds.

Inspired by Paris' original "Folies Bergere," the Tropicana's version opened Dec. 24, 1959, and closed March 28, 2009 — a few months shy of its 50th anniversary, but still Las Vegas' longest-running production show.

"Jubilee!" by contrast, will end after a 34-year run.

Bonanza Village one of first communities in Las Vegas to start an HOA

When large-scale planned communities began to take shape in the late 1940s, simple covenants were the law of the land. Homeowners associations sprang up later as a way to enforce those covenants, but they didn't gain mass acceptance until the 1980s and 1990s.

There were about 10,000 community or homeowners associations nationwide in 1970, and that number has increased to 260,000 since, according to the Community Associations Institute.

There are an estimated 3,000 homeowners associations in the Las Vegas Valley, incorporating about 1.2 million people.

HOAs exploded in popularity over the last several decades for three reasons, according to Evan McKenzie, a political science professor at the University of Illinois at Chicago. McKenzie published a housing study in 2005 about the emerging trends in American gated communities, and specifically in Las Vegas, as it was the fastest-growing area in the country.

The first reason is that developers pursue high density in order to maintain profits despite rising land costs, McKenzie wrote.

Privately governed common interest housing developments allow for more people on less land and create common ownership of public areas.

One of the first such communities in the valley was Bonanza Village, near downtown.

Built in 1946, it was a 168-lot development of single-family homes that were sold with whites-only race-restrictive covenants, as was common at the time in emerging communities nationwide, such as Levittown, N.Y., the country's first master-planned suburb.

The early covenants, conditions and restrictions, or CC&Rs, in Bonanza Village also had guidelines regarding servants quarters, stables, crop growing and even the number of animals permitted on the property — up to 12 chickens, six rabbits and a reasonable number of dogs, cats and horses.

There was, however, no homeowners association at the time to enforce these rules, and one was not formed until 1971.

The second reason for the increasing number of HOAs is that local governments seek growth and increased tax revenues with minimal public expenditure, McKenzie wrote.

These communities privatize what normally would be government responsibilities, such as maintaining streets and landscaping.

City governments nationwide have been supportive of the creation of this system because they collect property taxes from all homeowners in the city but are increasingly less involved with the upkeep of it, according to state Sen. Mike Schneider, D-Las Vegas.

Nowadays, at least in Las Vegas, HOAs are law.

The city of Las Vegas virtually mandates that new development be done with homeowner associations, McKenzie wrote.

Zoning and development codes passed in 1997 require that all new housing within planned development zones contain certain features such as a landscaping plan, open spaces and security walls. If such features are included — which they must be — then there must be a homeowners association to maintain them, McKenzie said.

The city of Henderson, Clark County and the city of North Las Vegas soon copied this type of legislation, according to Monica Caruso of Southern Nevada Home Builders.

Government figured out, “Oh, wait, this is a good thing to do,” Caruso said. “We’ll still get the tax revenues, but we don’t have to fix their streets and lights.”

Caruso also said racially targeted covenants such as those in Bonanza Village have existed since the 1800s.

The third reason is that many middle- and upper-class home buyers, fearful of crime and disenchanted with government, are in search of a privatized utopia offering security, a homogenous population and managerial private government, McKenzie wrote.

Former Las Vegas Review-Journal real estate editor Mike Henle said this was the huge selling point for home builders in the 80s and 90s when HOA growth exploded.

“The idea was to create this perfect neighborhood,” Henle said. “(Residents) were part of an HOA, and everybody thought it was the best thing since sliced bread.”

HOAs, while controversial, continue to thrive, and about 10,000 new community associations are formed each year.

Bonnie Springs Ranch namesake dies at age 94

Roosters crowed, and the burro brayed, and kids and parents cooed as they fed tidbits to the deer and goats Sunday at the Bonnie Springs Ranch in the shadow of Red Rock Canyon. Folks strolled the grounds, and the actors at the Old West town played their sheriff and bad guy parts.

But something — or rather someone — was missing. Bonnie Levinson, lover of animals and owner-operator of the ranch attraction she created more than six decades ago, has died.

Levinson was 94 when she fell ill and was briefly hospitalized before she died Jan. 29. Her family announced the death Sunday and plans to have a public gathering from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Saturday to celebrate her life.

She is already missed, not only by her own family, friends and employees but also by the many generations of families who cherished coming to the ranch over the years and would stop Levinson to chat and take photos.

Las Vegas Kelly Barrington was saddened by the news. "Oh my gosh, I've been coming here since I was a child," said Barrington, 42.

"I've seen Bonnie many, many times. A really loving woman."

Not many know much about her early life. Born July 30, 1921, she lived in Hollywood with her mother and father, an actor and director, said her son, Alan Levinson, who runs the ranch with his sister, April Hopper, two of Bonnie's three children.

A dancer, Bonnie Levinson worked in the movie business for a while, but one day decided she wanted to ice skate, her son said.

It took her a while, but she kept working at it. "And she actually got a part with [famed figure skater] Sonja Henie."

Then Bonnie Levinson and her mom bought a small piece of property in Twenty-Nine Palms in the 1940s where they raised turkeys. "I always used to ask her, 'How did this come about? Hollywood, lingerie, professional ice skater, turkey farmer.' It made no sense."

He still doesn't know the answer. "I guess it was just her wanting to be out."

Whatever the reasons, it was the turkey business that brought her to Las Vegas to deliver the birds — alive, her son said — to the hotels and restaurants. One day after delivering turkeys to a friend who owned a diner in town and was preparing to return home, he told her he wanted to show her a ranch he thought she'd love.

"He brought her out here early in the morning and she saw the sunrise on the mountains and the view, and then next thing you know she was here," her son said. After leasing the place, she bought it within the year, and shortly thereafter married Al Levinson, who died in 1994.

The ranch had no paved roads and no electricity. "Even when I was a kid we had no power and dirt roads for a few years," said her son, who's 56.

Initially, she and her husband had a bar and a couple of cabins, and friends who were dancers and others from the shows on the Strip would come out to visit.

"They wanted to go horseback riding, and so my mom got a couple horses so they could go horseback riding, so then she got a few more so this was kind of the little hangout for those people," he said.

Soon the couple added a restaurant. "There were always stray dogs, and by the time I was in my early teens people started dumping off animals out here, bunnies, and of course she started collecting so we had a small zoo of sorts."

She stood 5 feet 1 inch and weighed maybe 100 pounds, but she had a personality that drew people to her. "She never met a stranger," and always made time to talk to visitors, he said. "My mom loved everybody."

The ranch, which includes the petting zoo, horse stables, a hotel and restaurant and bar, operates seven days a week, with only the old West town and its shops going dark Monday and Tuesday. At its core, it's a family attraction, he said.

"My dad and mom used to say the family has to have somewhere to go with the kids."

Beverly Boyer, assistant manager of the petting zoo, was misty-eyed as she talked about her boss.

"She was a pistol. I would have loved to have known her in her younger days," Boyer said. "I used to tell her, 'Bonnie you've lived three lifetimes in one life from little Hollywood girl to famous dancer, to ranch hand.'"

Bonnie would come to the petting zoo, bearing treats for the animals, and tell stories of how she raised some by hand, including a lynx named Simba and two wolves, Tikia and Little Foot. "She'd tell us, 'They're my vitamins. I have to come here to get my vitamins,'" Boyer said.

By the time Boyer got to know her, Bonnie was in a wheelchair, having her second broken hip at age 91. "We'd take her to the lynx enclosure, and he'd always meet her at the door and rub up on her."

Before Bonnie died, she'd ask Boyer and the others whether the kids were enjoying it and were still coming out. "We'd tell her every day that the kids are still coming out. She'd tell us, 'I built this place for the city kids because they don't know what animals are.'"

Bonnie, she said, left an important legacy. "She wanted as many people to enjoy this place as possible. It's something I hope lives on a very long time."

Levinson said it's been a difficult time since his mother died, but he can take comfort in knowing, "this was where she wanted to be, and I can say she probably did everything she wanted to do with her life."

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WESTSIDE STORY: THE LEGACY AND HEART OF A HISTORIC NEIGHBORHOOD



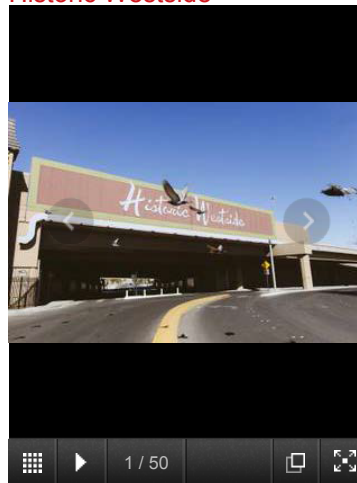

It's quiet at the corner of Jackson Avenue and F Street, where empty lots and vacant buildings define the historic landscape. A man rides by on his bicycle. A car occasionally passes through the intersection, and a security guard sits down on a chair outside the old New Town Tavern.

Pastor William McCurdy pulls up to check on renovations inside the tavern, slated to become a casino named the Tokyo. The dilapidated apartments across F Street are coming down, he says, for a new parking garage.

We look south and settle our eyes on the Historic Westside sign on the F Street underpass, the outcome of a contentious freeway-widening project that for six years blocked F Street with a concrete wall, severing it from Downtown and echoing a tumultuous history of segregation.

Historic Westside



McCurdy has lived in this area most of his life. He points to a building that used to be the Jackson Community Center, where he played as a kid, and to the next block over, where there once was a bowling alley. "I've seen it in its glory days. I've seen the decline," he says. "I want it to be revitalized. I want to see people be employed. I want to see homes built. You need rooftops to support businesses. It's very important that we have the same amenities as they do across town."

Segregation built this neighborhood. Desegregation led to its decline. And architecture tells the story. In the 1930s, African Americans were pushed to the Westside as business licenses were no longer issued to them elsewhere. Projects like the Hoover Dam brought workers from all over the country, including the South, where segregation was a way of life. Residents lacked amenities and adequate housing, but the growing community built up the neighborhood, turning Jackson Avenue into a bustling hub of businesses and nightclubs like the Brown Derby and the Cotton Club. The area drew celebrities white and black, from Frank Sinatra to Eartha Kitt.

"At one time the Westside was the sole black community—the only area where African Americans could live," says Claytee White, director of UNLV's Oral History Research Center, who would like to see that history recognized and celebrated for its

uniqueness and past limitations, along with the foundation it provides for the “limitless possibilities of the future.”

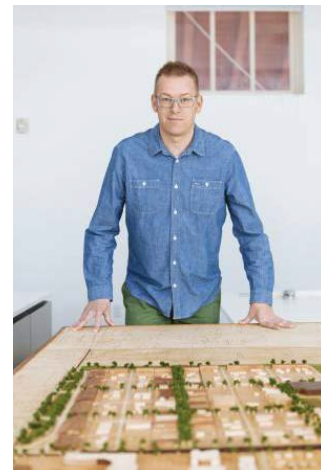
Longtime residents remember how desegregation allowed African Americans to live and work elsewhere in the Valley. The core population took a hit, but the Westside is still vibrant.

“It is the black cultural hub, where churches are still attended by over 18,000 blacks on Sunday mornings,” White says, adding that ideas from the redevelopment taking place a half-mile away Downtown could be transferred across the tracks, “making this area viable again in this new era.”

The Plan

At UNLV’s Downtown Design Center, director Steven Clarke discusses renderings of the Westside, part of the HUNDRED Plan, an acronym for Historic Urban Neighborhood Design Redevelopment. It originated in 2014, when Councilman Ricki Barlow approached the Design Center about revitalizing the Westside. Clarke, who took over the arm of the School of Architecture that year, inherited the plan funded through the Las Vegas Historic Preservation Commission’s Centennial Legacy Grant. He learned there were five Westside redevelopment plans on the shelf, one a largely academic in-house study he reworked to include input from residents, about 200 attending an intensive planning meeting over three days.

Clarke and a team of architecture students, faculty and local and international design consultants listened to the community. On provided name tags, attendees were asked to write one word describing what the Westside meant to them. The most common word was home, “whether they



lived there or not.”

“The historic Westside is a community that’s full of passion. They have a lot to say about their community,” Clarke says. “It wasn’t just people who lived in the area but people who had a stake in the community, African Americans who had lived there, and people who’d left because they could.”

The HUNDRED vision sees Washington Avenue becoming the entertainment corridor celebrating the African American experience; a stepping stone to Downtown. Jackson Avenue would thrive again, bookended by Jackson Memorial Park and Plaza and the Walker African American Museum. Housing design would reference the community’s historical landscape. “The Westside is so unique and so different from other parts of the city,” Clarke says. “It has its own architecture and building typologies. There are opportunities for innovations in urban downtown living. People think density means towers.”

This plan favors cottage clusters, and nothing more than three stories. “We’re currently working with Councilman Barlow and the City of Las Vegas to transition the HUNDRED Plan to the City,” Clarke says. “Our hope is to have the plan grafted as part of the Vision Las Vegas Downtown 2035 Plan.”

City Council approval would give the HUNDRED official status and help guide economic investment in the Westside, something UNLV’s Claytee White sees as advantageous for all of Las Vegas. “The redevelopment of Downtown shows that our tourists are more sophisticated than we thought,” she says. “This is an area that is equally rich in

potential. The cultural arts center/library is the core of the community, allowing plays, poetry sessions of all types, arts exhibits, readings and celebrations. Those celebrations could eventually spill over into the revitalized Jackson Avenue corridor, bringing in tourist dollars and sharing Westside history.”

The Collector

There was a time when Gwen Walker hit thrift shops, antique stores, yard sales and swap meets incognito. Local papers had been writing about her, and she didn’t want sellers recognizing her and jacking up prices.

She’d been on a bender, buying anything that had anything to do with black people: paintings, old newspapers, statues, books, postcards, consumer products, photos of black models in print ads and a Michael Jackson doll. Politics, business, sports, education, pop culture. Not just Americans—Russian writer Alexander Pushkin and French author Alexandre Dumas. “Anything that has a black face, was written by blacks or African Americans or written about blacks or African Americans.” Walker will even request a magazine in her doctor’s office if there’s an African American on the cover, or settle for a photo copy.

Her life’s work is a perfect art project evolving with the calendar—a collection where African Americans aren’t absent, remedying a situation from her youth. Assigned a school report on black history at age 13, she couldn’t find the necessary resources in her school library. This, despite growing up in a predominantly African American community adjacent to the Westside.

A world opened up when her mother bought her the Negro Heritage Library—an inspiration and a great resource, she says, for someone who wasn’t being taught contributions by African Americans in school, save for Black History

Month, “the shortest month of the year.”

Her Walker African American History Museum sits in a small house on West Van Buren Avenue. It opened in the '90s, after collecting became Walker's drive. She'd quit smoking and used her saved cigarette money to hit yard sales, not planning at first to display her bounty. She doesn't know how much she has, because she never stopped collecting.

Unfortunately, 90 percent of that vast collection is temporarily stored elsewhere. There have been burst pipes, floods and break-ins, but Walker's plan remains undeterred. Her mother owns two parcels where the museum sits, and they want to buy a third. Either way, the HUNDRED Plan has the museum anchoring Jackson Avenue.

“My love for finding about our history made me proud and our children proud,” says Walker, whose Black Pioneers of Nevada publication is at the West Las Vegas Library. “I used to go with suitcases to churches and rec-rooms and talk about the importance of preserving our heritage. We're hoping to build a permanent facility, if not here where we are, then wherever God puts us so that legacy lives on.”

Cultural Core

The West Las Vegas Arts Center is hopping on a Saturday afternoon, an improvisational composition of rhythm and motion. Cars move through the full lots, engines humming, doors opening and closing. Conversations buzz around the campus as basketballs pound the nearby courts. This is the cultural epicenter of West Las Vegas.

Inside, artist John Trimble is greeting guests for the opening of his new exhibit The Hues of Souls. Jazz music in the gallery is met with drums in the dance room, young bodies moving to the spontaneous syncopation. Staff members,

darting from room to room,
stop to answer questions,
chat and offer directions, but pretty much everyone
knows where they're going.

Launched in 1995, this is the center for discussion groups, cultural events, readings, dance classes, rites of passage—whatever serves the community. The night before Trimble's opening, Dr. Tiffany Tyler led a discussion as part of an educational and cultural series. Today, appetizers fill the table. The upright piano is covered with patterned fabric, and Trimble is talking about "Choir Practice," a piece he finished after meeting black artist Synthia Saint James, whose work was featured on The Cosby Show. It hangs near a painting of Spyro Gyra from when the jazz fusion band played at Jazz in the Park. Jazz inspires his work, he says, surrounded by paintings in bold colors of beach scenes and jazz musicians.

Around the corner on J Street, families and clusters of kids pour out of Doolittle Community Center carrying trophies while basketball games take place in the gymnasiums inside. It's one big campus coming together, the West Las Vegas Arts Center, the West Las Vegas Theater, the West Las Vegas Library and the long-standing Doolittle.

Marcia Robinson, who heads the arts center, grew up in East St. Louis, Illinois, received her MFA from University of California San Diego and has a doctorate in education from UNLV. The former dancer in Hallelujah Hollywood! at the MGM Grand and Jubilee has been director since the center

opened. She emphasizes mentoring, given her experience with African American choreographer Katherine Dunham. "Our program is socialization through the arts. As Katherine Dunham says, I see it as taking the edges off their lives and trying to channel them into ways of thinking and behaving that will help them in other parts of the world," Robinson says. "I'm one of those young people."

Preservation

The telling of Las Vegas' story isn't complete without the Westside. The neighborhoods are dotted with dedication markers of the Pioneer Trail, established by the city, county and community as a "journey through early Las Vegas."

The Moulin Rouge—the first integrated casino, and site of the Moulin Rouge Agreement that legally ended segregation of Strip casinos—is gone, but the Harrison House still stands at 1001 F Street, where in the '40s and '50s Genevieve Harrison housed black entertainers. There's Jackson Avenue, which thrived during segregation, and the Westside School on Washington Avenue, built in 1923 and the oldest standing schoolhouse in Las Vegas.

"The Historic Westside contains some of the oldest buildings in Las Vegas, ranging in styles from vernacular to popular 1920s and 1930s styles like bungalow and mission revival. There are a fair amount of mid-century-style buildings as well," says Courtney Mooney, urban design coordinator and historic preservation officer for the City of Las Vegas.

"The vernacular architecture is one feature that sets this area apart as there is not a lot of it left in the city." The area is bounded by what is now West Bonanza Road, H Street, West Washington Avenue and the railroad tracks, Mooney says, and was the city's first urban development. "It beat the east side of the tracks by a few months. Through a series of unfortunate events and eventually de facto segregation, the area was effectively cut off from the emerging development on the east side and left to languish for many years. Because of this, people forget how important the area is to our

collective history.”

Mooney was involved in getting West Las Vegas’ Berkley Square neighborhood listed on the National Register of Historic Places in 2009, following the listing of the Westside School (1979) and the Moulin Rouge (1992, though a 2009 fire led to its eventual demolition). Constructed from 1954 to 1955 near Owens Avenue and D Street, Berkley Square was the first minority-built subdivision in Nevada.

The 148 one-story, rectangular, ranch-style homes were designed to be atmospherically middle-class and to improve living conditions on the Westside. The development was financed in part by Thomas L. Berkley, a prominent attorney, media owner, developer and civil rights activist from Oakland, California. In 2012, Las Vegas artist Joseph Watson was commissioned to create banners that hang throughout the neighborhood.

In an oral-history interview with Berkley Square resident Ruth Eppenger D’Hondt, Claytee White asks about discussions D’Hondt’s family had about race relations in Las Vegas while sitting around in the first African American subdivision designed by black LA architect Paul Revere Williams.

“We didn’t sit around,” D’Hondt told her. “We worked.”

Work and perseverance defined the struggles and triumphs of a marginalized community living without equal employment opportunities and services. Survival meant being resourceful—working two jobs or running a family business, making ends meet against the odds. Some left for other parts of the Valley when segregation ended, but so many stayed. D’Hondt still lives in Berkley Square, and has fought to keep it together while watching it crumble as careless tenants and absent landlords take over—a reality that has hit many Las Vegas

neighborhoods as sprawl has crept outward.

But this area is championed.

Residents successfully fought to reopen F Street, connecting them to Downtown redevelopment.

The city-owned Westside School is under renovation.

A portion of it is slated to be a museum celebrating the rich history of the

community, says Barlow,

who attended Head Start there as a child. (The campus also includes a 1948 building, housing nonprofit public radio station KCEP.) The school's history stretches back to racially integrated classes in the '20s, and it's being restored using oral histories and memorabilia.

“Preserving this historic school is important because it will serve to culturally enrich our community,” Barlow said in 2010, when he and the city were organizing workshops and open houses. The sentiment resonates, that a community should put a premium on honoring its roots. “Lessons learned from the past help us to set our sights and accomplish where we need to be in the future. By preserving this historic building we are leaving something for future generations, and that is something to be proud of.”
