5. [Report for possible action by Detention and Enforcement regarding park issues at City facilities and parks All Wards](#)

Minutes:

NANCY WEBER, Deputy City Marshal, distributed the Deputy City Marshal Monthly Report for May 2015, which is attached as backup. MS. WEBER explained that purple indicated arrests and citations, and the olive color represented the incident reports that were done.

She reported that there were 285 individuals picked up for warrants. She also provided the number of arrests, citations and incident reports, as well as the average dispatch time, noting that there were more self-initiated calls than dispatch calls. MS. WEBER provided information on the major crimes, which occurred at Lorenzi Park, Durango Hills Park, Leavitt Park, Ed Fountain Park, Kellogg-Zahr Park, Doc Romeo Park, Centennial Hills Park and Douglas A. Selby Park. She commented that the Marshals were being proactive and vigilant since more kids were hanging out at the parks later now that school was out but noted that with kids now taking videos and pictures on their cell phones, this assisted the Marshals in identifying some of the suspects. COMMISSIONER McCURDY was surprised to see that Ward 5 had no major incidents and complimented MS. WEBER on doing a good job.

MS. WEBER stated that there was only one incident that occurred last week during Helldorado Days. In response to COMMISSIONER LOPEZ'S inquiry as to an e-mail address where pictures of graffiti could be sent, MS. WEBER stated that she did not have the e-mail address with her, but she would provide it to the members. She also remarked that the Graffiti Hotline contained that information. CHAIR WHITE asked that any information requested by the members be provided to all the members. TIM HACKER, Director of Parks and Recreation, noted that the City was one of the first entities to have a mobile application, which would make reporting easier.

MS. WEBER provided additional information to CHAIR WHITE and COMMISSIONER McCURDY regarding the individual that put an epoxy-like substance in the sidewalk cracks at Doc Romeo Park, which ended up costing the City \$20,000-\$30,000 to have the substance removed and the cracks repaired.

COMMISSIONER BASTIAN appreciated the consistency in which MS. WEBER attended the monthly meetings and commended her for providing a report format that was easy to read, representative of all wards and contained good data. CHAIR WHITE concurred that the report format presented was the best and most informative so far. COMMISSIONER LOPEZ echoed CHAIR WHITE'S comments, as did COMMISSIONER McCURDY.

6. [Report for possible action regarding a partnership with the Red Cross for water safety at City facilities All Wards](#)

Minutes:

ERIN CLARK, Aquatics Specialist, noted that the PowerPoint presentation, which is attached, was prepared for the May 5, 2015 meeting. As that meeting was not held, she would provide any updates during the presentation.

MS. CLARK reported that this year, the American Red Cross (ARC) was celebrating 100 years of water safety. The organization contacted the high drowning rate communities, of which Las Vegas was one, to partner with to improve water safety and drowning prevention. She provided some history relating to NAVY COMMODORE WILBERT E. LONGFELLOWS role in the ARC developing its first national water safety program.

She reported that there were approximately 3,700 drowning deaths per year. The Southern Nevada Drowning Prevention Coalition is a partnership between the Fire Department and the various municipalities throughout the valley. The Southern Nevada Health District (SNHD) keeps the current statistics for children 14 and under. Statistics were displayed for 2012 through 2014 relating to the total number of submersion incidents, submersions in pools (public versus residential) and the number of fatal and non-fatal drownings. MS. CLARK noted that there had been two more drownings since this slide was

prepared. The trigger for the SNHD is the call to 9-1-1, so the partnership between the Fire Department, SNHD and the Drowning Coalition has brought the reporting to more accurate numbers.

The ARC has targeted the Las Vegas valley by partnering with the City of Las Vegas and the City of Henderson. MS. CLARK announced that it was the goal of the Centennial Campaign to reduce the number of drownings by 50 percent by offering swimming lessons in communities with high drowning rates, motivating kids and families to learn about water and becoming water competent, developing more lifeguards and instructors, conducting on-site water safety demonstrations and education, providing CPR training for parents and conducting community-based outreach to include safety fairs through the Office of Community Services.

A slide of What Everyone Must Know was shown presenting the ABCs of drowning prevention. She named the City's three qualifying pools: Baker Pool, Carlos L. Martinez & Darrio J. Hall Family Pool and the Doolittle Pool. She went over the classes that would be offered and the associated fees.

MS. CLARK reported on the number of kids already signed up for the Learn To Swim program and provided the updated figure of 1,643 relating to the number of individuals the Water Safety/Parent Education classes were provided for. Word has spread and school principals have already booked for next year. She commented that the City of Henderson does a full school presentation and had reached 8,000 students.

She described the materials the ARC was providing to the participants, which included a cap, goggles and a Longfellow Whale Tales sticker or tattoo. The ARC also wanted parents to be involved so an Achievement Booklet would be given to the parents of any student that takes a swimming lesson. To stay current with the times, the ARC also has an application where students can earn various badges.

CHAIR WHITE commented that as a safety swim instructor himself, he recognized the effort and impact of what was being done and congratulated MS. CLARK. MS. CLARK explained that part of the goal was to teach the families, not just the kids. Swimming lessons will begin June 15th at the YMCA. A swim lesson map was created with all of the entities information on one map.

MS. CLARK noted that the Drowning Prevention Coalition receives funding from the International Code Council. In response to COMMISSIONER THOMASONS inquiry regarding the age of the children being taught, MS. CLARK stated that the age was from 18 months to adult. Telling the story of what the City was doing was another component of the program, so the Marketing Department would be taking pictures and doing press releases.

MS. CLARK displayed and commented on some of the upcoming aquatics events. She also explained the policy on pool attire for COMMISSIONER BASTIAN.

Minutes:

MAYOR PRO TEM ROSS stated that he was very excited to be in attendance and was grateful for the work that the Commission did for the benefit of the community. The family of one of the two police officers that was gunned down lived in his ward, and the reason the family moved to that area was because a park was going to be constructed in that neighborhood.

In speaking with OFFICER ALYN BECKS wife, MAYOR PRO TEM ROSS thought re-naming the Indian Hills Park would be a good way to remember a police officer who gave his life for his community. MAYOR PRO TEM ROSS asked MRS. BECK to discuss with her family the suggestions he provided, and they chose The Officer Alyn Beck Memorial Park. Police officers have been under attack the past couple years, and this would be a good step forward to show that the City of Las Vegas supports all law enforcement agencies throughout the state.

MAYOR PRO TEM ROSS referenced how well attended the impromptu gathering a couple weeks ago was at City Hall, noting that there was not a quorum present, so there was no violation of the Open Meeting Law. Listening to those in attendance helped one understand the significance of moving forward with the re-naming of this park.

Subsequent to COMMISSIONER McCURDYS motion, but prior to the vote, COMMISSIONER SHERMAN mentioned that CAPTAIN RICHARD FLETCHER, the Honor Guard Commander for the Northwest Area Command, enthusiastically supported this park being re-named after fallen OFFICER BECK but asked if there was an opportunity for a building or park to be named after fallen OFFICER IGOR SOLDO too. COMMISSIONER SHERMAN noted that Police Memorial Park had already done a dedication for both of the fallen officers as part of their Fallen Officer Memorial Wall and Tree Grove. She supported re-naming the park because it was a neighborhood park, and there was such a showing of his family and church family. She wanted this put on the record to be sensitive to other families of fallen police officers. MAYOR PRO TEM ROSS committed to work with the Councilmember whose ward OFFICER SOLDO lived in to look for other naming opportunities within the city of Las Vegas in order to honor OFFICER SOLDO in a similar manner. COMMISSIONER LOPEZ expressed his full support and believed this to be the best way to honor fallen officers.

COMMISSIONER BASTIAN asked for clarification as to the proposed name made during the motion. COMMISSIONER SHERMAN suggested dropping the word memorial since a memorial was already done at Police Memorial Park and to keep it upbeat. While he respected COMMISSIONER SHERMAN'S position regarding sensitivity to the families of other fallen officers, MAYOR PRO TEM ROSS reiterated that he had given the family many options and they chose The Officer Alyn Beck Memorial Park and asked that the members honor that request. COMMISSIONER McCURDY confirmed that this was his motion.

COMMISSIONER BECKER was at the impromptu gathering and was personally moved by the citizens and police officers stories as to why the park should be named after OFFICER BECK and asked that the members consider that when voting.

COMMISSIONER MCCURDY nominated COMMISSIONER BASTIAN due to her seniority, knowledge and experience. COMMISSIONER BASTIAN nominated COMMISSIONER LOPEZ due to his contributions and involvement in the community.

CHAIR WHITE stated that both individuals were very fine, qualified candidates. He deferred to DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY BOB SYLVAIN for direction after COMMISSIONER McCURDY suggested a secret ballot. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN stated that a motion needed to be made and a vote taken if the Commission wished to hold a secret ballot.

Following the secret ballot, DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN counted the ballots and announced that COMMISSIONER BASTIAN received six votes, and COMMISSIONER LOPEZ received five votes.

COMMISSIONER BASTIAN accepted the nomination and appointment as Vice Chair.

## 9. [Discussion for possible action regarding the Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission Bylaws All Wards](#)

## Minutes:

KELLY SCHWARZ, Senior Management Analyst, stated that she had only received comments on the draft Bylaws from COMMISSIONER BASTIAN. CHAIR WHITE suggested that all the Commissioners take a second look at COMMISSIONER BASTIAN'S comments and asked DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY BOB SYLVAIN to comment. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN stated that he had identified some items that needed to be corrected but had not seen COMMISSIONER BASTIAN'S proposed changes. He recommended incorporating these changes into the final document and to place an item on the next agenda for approval. MS. SCHWARZ informed COMMISSIONER THOMSON that the draft did not include COMMISSIONER BASTIAN'S proposed changes. As such, CHAIR WHITE suggested reading through the document to solicit input from the Commissioners and DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN.

The Las Vegas Parks and Recreation Advisory Commission Draft Bylaws, which are attached, were reviewed during the meeting, and the Commissioners and DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN provided their recommendations for suggested changes. These included changes to Article II Purpose; Article III Commission Duties, Sections 5, 7, 8 and 9; Article IV Membership, Section C; Article V Officers, Sections B, C and D and Article VI Meetings, Section F.

Discussion took place between the Chair, Commissioners, TIM HACKER, Director of Parks and Recreation, and DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN regarding what determined whether an absence was excused or unexcused and what options the Commission had when an individual had more than three unexcused absences. CHAIR WHITE commented that the City Council ultimately had the authority to remove a person based on the Commission's recommendation; the Commission could not independently do so. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN indicated that language should be added for clarification. COMMISSIONER BECKER remarked that the Commissioners may need to re-evaluate their level of commitment because absences make it difficult to obtain a quorum. CHAIR WHITE stated that in the past, if a Commissioner notified staff that they would be unable to attend a meeting, this was considered an

excused absence. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN believed this to be sufficient. MR. HACKER concurred, stating that notifying either the City Clerks Office or the Parks and Recreation Department would be acceptable.

Relating to Article V, Section C, COMMISSIONER BASTIAN stated that language should be added to identify what to do if neither the Chair nor the Vice Chair were present at the opening of the meeting, such as happened at this meeting.

COMMISSIONER McCURDY suggested selecting a Second Vice Chair to keep the continuity of the group functioning. CHAIR WHITE deferred to DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN, who explained that he could incorporate the language to create a Second Vice Chair position into the final document without COMMISSIONER McCURDY'S formal motion; however, since some of the Commissioners objected to having a Second Vice Chair, he suggested a formal motion and vote be taken. Suggestions from COMMISSIONERS ARMENIAN, THOMSON and SHERMAN included the member with the most seniority could take over the meeting, the Director be given the ability to appoint someone or that the Director would ask for a volunteer. Although CHAIR WHITE noted that to the best of his knowledge, the Chair and

Vice Chair had never both been absent, COMMISSIONER McCURDY still believed this should be identified in the Bylaws.

After comments made by DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN, COMMISSIONER McCURDY amended his motion to include that the Secretary be allowed to select someone to Chair the meeting in the event the Chair, Vice Chair and Second Vice Chair were all absent.

COMMISSIONER THOMSON preferred a vote be taken on the original motion to give those Commissioners that did not wish for a Second Vice Chair position to be created to voice that position as the amended motion addressed two separate issues. COMMISSIONER BECKER clarified that what was at issue was whether or not a Second Vice Chair position was needed and reiterated that the amended motion included two separate issues.

COMMISSIONER McCURDY amended his motion back to the original motion to create a Second Vice Chair position.

There were questions as to why the City Clerk was named as the ex-officio Secretary of the Commission under Article 5, Section D. MR. HACKER noted that in consultation with the City Clerks Office, this was the preferred language, and it would be necessary to stay consistent with what the City Clerk felt was appropriate for maintaining records and posting notices. COMMISSIONER McCURDY stated that in every government, the City Clerk had to be an ex-officio officer of any board. As such, COMMISSIONER BASTIAN questioned the need to clarify department staffs role. MR. HACKER indicated that in the Parks and Recreation Departments mission statement and work plans for the year, staffs role was very clear in its support of the Commission.

As it related to Article VI, Section F, COMMISSIONER BASTIAN pointed out that as written, approval would require two-thirds of the entire membership. MR. HACKER clarified that this was just to approve the Bylaws and any changes to those Bylaws, not other actions. CHAIR WHITE and COMMISSIONERS BASTIAN and BECKER thought the language should be changed to quorum. COMMISSIONER McCURDY stated that the reason why most organizations use two-thirds of the entire membership was because they wanted a super majority of the individuals knowing what was occurring. CHAIR WHITE appreciated that information but his personal view was that it should still be changed to quorum. Additional discussion took place where it was agreed that the entire membership of the board entitled to vote should be modified to reference two-thirds of the quorum present.

COMMISSIONER BASTIAN asked for clarification on Article VIII, Section A, as to who would file the executed Bylaws with the City Clerk. COMMISSIONER McCURDY stated that legal counsel should file the Bylaws on behalf of the Commission. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN concurred.

Referring to Article IX, Section A, COMMISSIONER THOMSON wondered if the motion to add the Second Vice Chair position had to be presented at two meetings before it could be put into the Bylaws. CHAIR WHITE stated that since the Bylaws had not yet been adopted, Article IX, Section A, did not apply. DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY SYLVAIN explained that the intent was to have a meeting where input could be given and then a final document would be brought

back at a subsequent meeting for approval. CHAIR WHITE stated that the Bylaws had been discussed at four meetings and requested that the revisions be e-mailed to the Commissioners prior to the next meeting. The final draft was anticipated to be approved at the next meeting unless an issue arose with the revisions preventing approval of the final document.

10. [Report for possible action by Parks and Recreation Director regarding department announcements All Wards](#)

Minutes:

TIM HACKER, Director of Parks and Recreation, stated that the Chair, Vice Chair or designee needed to attend the June 17, 2015 Council meeting to make the recommendation to the Council for the re-naming of the park addressed under Item 7. CHAIR WHITE welcomed any Commissioner that would like to be present.

MR. HACKER mentioned that the 30th year of Corporate Challenge was now over and that the City took second place overall.

MR. HACKER went on to report that the budget adopted by the City Council included many Capital Improvement Projects that benefited the Parks and Recreation Department. The two bond issuances, totaling approximately \$50 million, were specific to Parks and Recreation facilities. Facilities that had been ignored over the years as far as deferred maintenance would now be addressed, new parks would be brought on-line and renovations to existing parks would take place. A list will be sent to the Commissioners.

MR. HACKER stated that approval was obtained for two new staff members for the sports unit. This would allow the Parks and Recreation programmers to go out to the centers to work with the emerging youth and adult sports leagues, which would enhance services.

An informational report will be presented to the City Council on June 17, 2015 relating to the effect of the new fees on soccer tournaments. The City has a long-standing partnership with the Mayor's Cup and with the current agreement set to expire this fall, staff was looking for direction from Council on how to proceed with that as well.

MR. HACKER thanked former COMMISSIONER LAURIE BUCHMAN for her service on this Commission. She expressed in an e-mail to him her disappointment that she would not be able to continue to serve on the Commission but noted that she would still be engaged in the community. Several Commissioners requested that former COMMISSIONER BUCHMAN be officially recognized. As such, CHAIR WHITE requested that an agenda item be placed on the next agenda so that this could be discussed.

KELLY SCHWARZ, Senior Management Analyst, announced that she had received an e-mail from the City Clerks Office stating that COMMISSIONER WILLIAMS resigned today, so Ward 5 would be appointing someone new. Although COMMISSIONER ELIASON was not present, she did take her oath and MR. HACKER has been in contact with her.
