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[Presentations on Youth Neighborhood Association Partnership Program applications by Red Rock Elementary School, Desert Pines High School, Fremont Middle School, John C. Fremont Middle School, Lunt Elementary School, Becker Middle School, The Legacy Project, Sunrise Acres Justice Alliance Group, Faith Lutheran High School, Arbor View High School DECA and Northwest Youth Empowerment Council](#)

As applicants made their presentations, CHAIR FIGUEROA explained to each of them that they would be given five minutes to make their presentation, and the Board members would be given five minutes to ask questions. Each group would be advised regarding the Board's recommendations, which will be presented to the City Council at the February 4, 2015 meeting.

Desert Pines High School - Desert Pines High School Math Club - JUANA HERNANDEZ, President, IVAN VILLA and MARIO LUNA, Vice Presidents, EDGAR ACOSTA, Treasurer, EDGAR MEDINA, Secretary, Inaudible Individual and MAGDALENA LULE, Historian, shared in narrating a PowerPoint presentation which was submitted as backup, describing how Math Club benefits students at their school. Students receive math assistance from their peers, helping them to become more confident and more successful in the future. They also sign a contract, a sample of which was submitted as backup, stating that they will earn and maintain a grade of 75 percent or higher in their math class. The Math Club currently has two adult advisors; with the help of the YNAPP (Youth Neighborhood Association Partnership Program) grant last year, the group was able to purchase hoodies and advertise the Math Club, increasing from 15 to 47 student tutors.

MS. HERNANDEZ explained how Math Club helped her increase her math score, pass all of her proficiencies and stay on track with the rest of her classes while providing a comfortable learning environment with other students.

MEMBER D. REYES was a big fan of the club and wondered how the grades are monitored to ensure the students are meeting the contract requirements. MS. HERNANDEZ explained that they hold meetings every Tuesday and Thursday and the advisor looks up the students' grades; if the grade is not maintained, the student is approached and the tutor helps them so they can improve their grade.

In response to MEMBER DAVIS' inquiry, MS. HERNANDEZ explained that the intention of the Math Club is to help the student become better with math; if the grade drops below 75 percent, they can still be a part of Math Club, but tutors will talk with them and help them to raise their grade.

MEMBER SKOUSON wondered how many students they have helped and asked about the \$900 cash donation they listed in the budget for snacks. MS. HERNANDEZ stated that they raised the \$900 on their own, and it was used for snacks. MS. HERNANDEZ knows of many students who were able to pass their proficiencies, and they can see the success in the math scores. She confirmed for MEMBER SKOUSON that most of the students return year after year until they graduate.

Fremont Middle School - Fremont 60th Anniversary Project - JAVIER GRACIANO, a student at student at John C. Fremont Middle School, appeared with his sister JASMINE and SHAWN KELLY, 6th Grade English teacher, and described his proposed project which is to design and paint a community mural with ceramic tiles to celebrate the 60th anniversary of the school. Former students and families paint a tile with something that was memorable to them at the school and write a paragraph explaining why the memory was important. Those writings will be published on the internet and possibly a Facebook page. A booklet was distributed and submitted as backup, showing photos of tiles and writings from previous events. This is a great opportunity for the school, neighborhood and community because it will show pride and school spirit.

MEMBER SKOUSON asked how former students would be reached, and MR. GRACIANO replied that flyers would be sent home with current students to help spread the word.

MEMBER D. REYES asked when this would be done, and MR. GRACIANO replied that it would be done in the spring; he is a yearbook student at the school and he will be painting a tile. In response to MEMBER D. REYES' inquiry regarding funds, MR. GRACIANO explained that the grant money would be used for brushes and paint supplies.

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MEMBER SKOUSON thought this was a great idea to add variety and color to the school and to involve the community. She asked about the tiles shown in the book, and MR. GRACIANO and MR. KELLY explained that they are from previous events and have been put on the school in the last decade. MEMBER DAVIS asked where they are placed on the school, and MR. GRACIANO replied that they are in the front area, the hallways and in front of the restrooms. MR. KELLY stated that originally a company was going to be contracted to do the entire tile project, but the Downtown Achieves Foundation informed them that there was a local business that wanted to work with the school and was willing to donate the tiles. He revised the budget which was submitted as backup, to show costs for the paints, glazes brushes and other materials. MR. KELLY pointed out that the book shows the different types of themes that have been done in the past, and each year his students look forward to this project.

John C. Fremont Professional Development Middle School - Family Math Night: Math as a Theme, Not a Thing - WENDY ZAMBRANO and NATASHA SMITH described activities that take place during Family Math Night that will help to promote an understanding in math, dealing with all different shapes which leads to geometry. Family Math Night will bring families closer to the school, students and teachers.

MEMBER DAVIS asked how many Family Math Night events have been held, and MS. ZAMBRANO replied that only one has been held, and they got the idea from MR. KELLY, 6th Grade English teacher. MEMBER SKOUSON asked when this event would take place, and MS. ZAMBRANO replied that it would be at the end of April. MS. SMITH said the first one they held was in December and it was successful. MEMBER SKOUSON liked that some of the money will be used to purchase instructional materials that can be used again in the future. MEMBER N. WINSLOW liked that the parents were coming to the event and that they would be provided with resources to take home.

CHAIR FIGUEROA asked if they had sought other donations, and KATIE DANIELS, 7th Grade Math teacher, reported that they have connections with UNLV (University of Nevada, Las Vegas) programs, and they supplied the food, beverages and additional resources for the last event to help support the students.

Lunt Elementary School - Anti-Bullying Project - ENRIQUE REYES, EMELIO REYES and CHRIS VALDEZ showed a video of which a paper copy was submitted as backup, describing their proposed project of creating an anti-bullying video and posters to be shared with students and others in the community. The \$1,000 grant money would be used to purchase materials for research and items for the video, to pay the videographer and to make and distribute the videos. An anti-bullying video was shown.

MEMBER N. WINSLOW complimented the group on their video and asked how someone gets involved with this project. MR. ENRIQUE REYES replied that the group meets on Thursdays to talk about stopping bullying with MS. LENOX, MS. ROCHA and MS. JANOFF.

DOMINICK SILVA introduced himself and joined the group.

MEMBER SKILBRED asked how many videos would be made in 2015, and MR. ENRIQUE REYES replied that they would be making two of them. BEA ROCHA, teacher, clarified that there is a behavior group for 2nd and 3rd grade students and another group for 4th and 5th grade students; each group will make a video.

In response to MEMBER D. REYES' inquiry, MR. ENRIQUE REYES stated that the kids decide how to put the videos together and what songs will be used.

MEMBER SKOUSON asked if the same people would be mailed videos this year and if the group received feedback from those who had already received the videos. MR. ENRIQUE REYES reported that they would be sending the videos to the same people again including schools, PRESIDENT OBAMA and the Mayor.

MEMBER D. REYES asked if the videos are shown at the school assemblies, and MR. ENRIQUE REYES replied that they show them and act them out as well.

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MEMBER SKILBRED requested to see the 2nd and 3rd grade video. She thought this project was phenomenal and very impressive.

MS. ROCHA stated that the goal is to get kids involved who have had struggles and difficulties with their own behavior. They come together and do research about how their behavior affects people they may be bullying and hopefully they will stand up for others who are being bullied. The group also includes students who are role models. The students pick the songs, the moves and which part of the research they are going to use in their presentation.

The 2nd and 3rd grade video was shown.

Becker Middle School National Junior Honor Society (NJHS) - Vegas Verdes Carnival - MEGAN McCORD and TEEGAN TEAL shared in narrating a PowerPoint presentation which was submitted as backup, describing their proposed project of hosting a carnival for the students and community at Vegas Verdes Elementary School. They researched the schools and chose this one because 91.13 percent of their students were lower income. MS. McCORD described the booths that would be set up for the event and indicated Becker Middle School NJHS students would be running them.

MS. TEAL explained that she had good experiences in elementary school and wanted to provide that for other kids, giving them something to look forward to and making memories to reflect on. The students from both schools will benefit from this project as some will experience the carnival and others will be doing something for a good cause. The Becker Middle School students are willing to take the time necessary to provide this opportunity for the kids and are very determined to make it memorable for them. MS. TEAL stated that the Las Vegas Metropolitan SWAT Team will be donating extra money needed for this project.

MS. McCORD said that the project is important because they are doing something for others who are less fortunate; they are providing a fun event for a school that otherwise would be unable to do so. It will bring the community together and will show that the students are being good role models.

MS. TEAL stated that they are requesting \$1,000; the actual cost for the event will be \$1,200 so the SWAT team will donate the balance. The group will be responsible for getting all of the supplies, running the meetings and doing the event set-up and clean-up; advisors KATHLEEN BANDHAUER and LAURA CARDUCCI will be assisting throughout the process.

MS. McCORD reviewed the budget which included supplies, the bus trip, prizes and candy. There will also be 565 volunteer hours worked, bringing the total project value to \$12,510.

MS. TEAL reported that the youth and adults would work together on this project, advisors would be present at all times and the principal of Vegas Verdes was excited about this idea. MS. McCORD stated that they would be writing thank you cards for the donations and to the Vegas Verdes principal and faculty for allowing this project to take place. The NJHS group will also have a post-event discussion focusing on what went well and what could be improved upon.

MS. McCORD stated that the NJHS group did a YNAPP project last year, which was a field day for the kids at their school who have special needs; it was very successful and encouraged them to do another project this year.

MEMBER KRAMAR wondered why this would be held during school hours rather than supporting the carnival the parents hold for the school which serves as a fundraiser. MS. McCORD replied that they wanted to provide the students with a day of fun. She confirmed for MEMBER KRAMAR that the principal agreed to give up an instructional day for this carnival. LISA CAMPBELL, Sr. Neighborhood Outreach Specialist, clarified that YNAPP funds cannot be used for any kind of fundraising activity.

MEMBER DAVIS suggested holding the event on a Friday or some time that is not as productive, and MS. McCORD explained that the carnival would probably be held for two hours in the morning.

MEMBER SKOUSON liked the project idea and that the students acknowledged their great childhood and wanted to share that with others.

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In response to MEMBER D. REYES' inquiry, MS. McCORD reported that there are approximately 40 people who will be involved with this project.

MEMBER KRAMAR asked if the students had reached out to the school PTA (Parent Teacher Association) to see what the parents would like for their students. MS. McCORD replied that they reached out to the school principal, who supported the idea, but the principal did not mention anything about the parents.

Red Rock Elementary School - Learn through Landscape - Student Council officers ALEX BOULIT, ATILLA FEDA, Vice President, MARRIYAH ALVAREZ, Secretary/Treasurer, MARRISAH ALVAREZ, Activities Director, and JASMEEN LOVE, Historian, shared in narrating a PowerPoint presentation which was submitted as backup, describing their proposed project of beautifying their school's back courtyard by replacing planter boxes with a sustainable garden.

The school opened their doors in 1955 and will be celebrating their 60th anniversary in August. The group would like to create a community garden, noting that the sand and dirt in the planters needs to be replaced with soil and compost. The grant would be used to purchase soil, shovels, spades, gloves and vegetable and flower seeds. Student Council officers and representatives will create and maintain the garden with the assistance of advisors and volunteers from the Redrock Baptist Church. They will grow several vegetables that will be given to the school community. They are good candidates for this grant because they are hard workers and are taking care of the community; the garden will provide healthier snack choices on non-school days.

MEMBER D. REYES complimented the group on their presentation and asked when the growing season starts and who will plant the seeds. MS. MARRISAH ALVAREZ replied that the Student Council officers and representatives will plant the seeds which will grow in the spring.

MEMBER SKOUSON liked the presentation and the idea; she asked if just the Student Council would be working on the project or if the whole school would be involved. MS. MARRISAH ALVAREZ replied that the Student Council and volunteers from the Red Rock Baptist Church would be working on the garden. MEMBER SKOUSON asked if they had approached Home Depot for donations, and MS. LOVE indicated they had not. MEMBER SKOUSON encouraged them to consider doing that so they could do something more with the money they receive.

MEMBER SKILBRED wondered if they could borrow some of the tools from the congregation or the school so they could save money and use it for more plants.

Sunrise Acres Justice Alliance Group (J.A.G.s) - Recycling Club - ALEJANDRA ORTIZ and GUADALUPE IRIANDA shared in narrating a PowerPoint presentation which was submitted as backup, describing their proposed recycling project. They explained that recycling protects the environment and reviewed statistics regarding items that are dumped in the landfill and energy savings that would occur if they were recycled. They watched a video in a class that inspired them to create a Recycling Club; items from the school such as paper, plastic bottles and aluminum cans will be recycled, and they will collect trash and recyclables from the playground as well. The JAGs will create an awareness of the importance of recycling by working with the teachers, talking to each class and creating a competition amongst the classes. The students will be in charge of making a schedule for recycling pick up. Many of the students go to the Boys and Girls Club after school and are interested in starting a recycling club there as well.

MEMBER SKILBRED asked how the class competition would be handled, and MS. ORTIZ explained that they will discuss recycling in the classrooms; they will not tell them what to do, but will answer any questions the students may have. MS. IRIANDA said that prizes will be Reese's or something the kids really like.

The following Items were heard subsequent to Item 5.

Faith Lutheran High School - Rainbow Dreams Academy Ambassador Leadership Program - BRAILEY PARKER, student, explained that she and three of her friends have been going to Rainbow Dreams Academy, a public charter elementary school in west Las Vegas, to help the students with their homework. YNAPP funded a project last year for

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Faith Lutheran High School students to teach 4th and 5th grade students to be good citizens and leaders. Her proposed project would continue this work, and funding would go towards supplies for the project as well as trophies for the students who are chosen by other elementary students as the best leaders. Those who are chosen as the best leaders will give tours of the school and help with major projects so when they move on to junior high and high school, they will have some leadership qualities.

MEMBER SKOUSON liked the ingenuity and how the project is mentoring and teaching the kids, and MS. PARKER thought that the younger kids are seeing this, and it makes them strive to become leaders and do what the 4th and 5th graders are doing.

MEMBER D. REYES asked how many students from Faith Lutheran are involved, and MS. PARKER replied that there are three of them, but she is recruiting more so there could be three to seven as well as her mom. They teach the kids to become leaders and help them with their homework after school. The Dream Care after school program leaders also watch over them.

MEMBER SKILBRED commended MS. PARKER and mentioned that January is National Mentoring Month; she asked if there were success stories MS. PARKER could share. MS. PARKER tutored a girl who had a stuttering problem and after a couple of weeks, the girl was excited that she could get to the next word without stuttering. This helped MS. PARKER realize why she is giving back.

Arbor View high School - DECA - WestCare No Place for Hate - DEJA AUSTIN, Vice President, JOSHUA McKAY, ASHLEY WINKLE, Vice President of Publicity, and TODD SCHULER, Treasurer, shared in explaining their proposed project, which is to assemble care packages and deliver them to patients at WestCare. MS. AUSTIN stated that DECA is a student organization that helps prepare emerging leaders and entrepreneurs for careers such as marketing, finance, hospitality and management. A flyer relating to their project was distributed and submitted for the record.

MS. AUSTIN reported that the care packages would consist of a bed-in-a-bag along with socks for the women and children in the facility. Other items to be purchased would include toddler toys, sports equipment, celebration supplies and arts and crafts, which are items the Director of the facility specifically requested. Parents and faculty will also volunteer for this project and will create a positive impact on a critical situation.

MR. McKAY reported that DECA members requested their first YNAPP funding for care packages in 2011. The group has received support from in-kind donations and volunteer hours from many different people including students, DECA members, alumni and parents.

MS. WINKLE stated that the project will benefit the patients of WestCare who usually arrive with nothing but the clothes on their backs. The group wants to help others, and they are also working with a program called No Place for Hate who helps those in need no matter who they are or what they look like. They will be purchasing the supplies from Kmart and will make care packages to distribute at the WestCare facility.

MR. SCHULER stated that they are requesting a grant in the amount of \$998.57 which would be used to buy the items WestCare requested, and they will also replace the toys and exercise equipment that is breaking down. The group will reflect on how they helped to change the lives of others through a two-page essay and a display case of memorabilia so others can see what they are doing.

MEMBER D. REYES appreciated the efforts on behalf of WestCare and asked how many people would be involved in putting the care packages together. MS. AUSTIN indicated that approximately 50 people would be helping including DECA, the advisors and all of the marketing classes. MEMBER D. REYES asked if they had checked into a matching donation by Kmart or from others, and MS. AUSTIN stated that the drawstring bags were donated and were valued at \$300. MR. SCHULER showed one of the bags and MS. AUSTIN stated that they partnered with Kmart because they will hold the items for five to 10 days.

Northwest Youth Empowerment Council - Hope for the Homeless - Students from various high schools introduced themselves as follows: DANIEL CONTRERAS, DARIAN TOTH, JOSHUA BALLARD, AVIVA LESSNICK,

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ANTONIO HERNANDEZ, HOPE PETERSON, DARRAH WESTBAY, SHREYA JOSHI, MADDYSON CROSTA, CASEY HYATT and HANNAH LESSNICK. A video was shown and the group shared in narrating a PowerPoint presentation which was submitted as backup, describing their proposed project to fill backpacks with essential items for the homeless people at the Las Vegas Rescue Mission. They will hold backpack drives at the various high schools and purchase some as well; they will be filled with items such as hygiene products and socks to help the homeless community. The Council applied for a YNAPP grant in 2013 and did a project called Suitcases For Love; suitcases were filled with toiletry items, and it was a huge success. The group will have a fundraising dunk tank at COUNCILMAN ROSS' Spring Fling; last year they raised approximately \$900 in five hours and hope to repeat that. They also hope to receive donations of bus passes, haircuts and food cards. They want to give back to the community and make the homeless people feel like they are not alone.

MEMBER N. WINSLOW commented that the presentation and application were very thorough, and she commended the group for pooling their resources and having so many high schools working together. She thought it was great that they partnered with the Las Vegas Rescue Mission as they will reach a lot of people.

MEMBER JOHNS referred to the group's application and asked where the \$500 cash donation would come from. CHAIR FIGUEROA asked if they had considered partnering with Catholic Charities, and MEMBER DAVIS asked if the group could still proceed with their project if they did not receive the entire grant amount they requested. One of the students explained that with their suitcase project, they received gift cards from McDonalds and a hair salon, and COUNCILMAN ROSS helped them get bus passes. They could team up with Catholic Charities and possibly donate some of the backpacks to them, and if they do not receive the full amount they requested, they will still do the project, but may not be able to do quite as much.

5. [Presentation on Youth Neighborhood Association Partnership Program application by Boy Scouts of America \(Held over from the January 5, 2015 meeting\)](#)

Upon reconvening the meeting at 6:57 p.m., Item 5 was heard subsequent to the Item 4 Sunrise Acres Justice Alliance Group (J.A.G.s) presentation.

CHAIR FIGUEROA explained to the applicant that he would be given five minutes to make his presentation, and the Board members would be given five minutes to ask questions. Each group would be advised regarding the Board's recommendations, which will be presented to the City Council at the February 4, 2015 meeting.

Boy Scouts of America - Derfelt Community Gardens - VOLODYMYR HENNESSY narrated a PowerPoint presentation which was submitted as backup, describing his proposed project of creating a community garden at the Derfelt Senior Center. MR. HENNESSY explained that this community garden would be cultivated by many people, ranging from children to seniors, and will be ADA (Americans with Disabilities Act) accessible. He described the planter boxes and the materials that would be used to build them. The garden will provide additional nutritious food for the food pantry while bringing the community together and providing a source of entertainment. This project will be performed by the Boy Scouts and other groups as an Eagle Project. There will be youth/adult collaboration with the planning, paperwork and budget; DONALD FABBI, Master Gardener and STEPHANIE RICHARD, Principal Community Program Specialist, will help as well. Volunteers will provide \$2,750 in labor costs, and the materials are expected to cost \$1,400; MR. HENNESSY will raise the remaining funds needed. Discussions regarding the projects will be held in the troop meetings, and other groups will have their own club discussions.

MEMBER KRAMAR asked if the garden would be located in a secure location. MR. HENNESSY replied that entry will be through a gate, and the area will be fenced on two sides with buildings on the other two sides.

MEMBER SKOUSON asked about irrigation and how the food will be distributed, and MR. HENNESSY explained that water lines will be underneath the gardens and will be provided by the Derfelt Senior Center. The food items will be donated to the Derfelt food pantry, who will distribute the food.

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MEMBER SKILBRED thought the presentation was good; she wondered if the tools could be borrowed instead of purchased and did not see plants in the budget. MR. HENNESSY indicated that plants are part of the budget, and he thought it was likely that some of the tools would be donated by the volunteers.

MEMBER N. WINSLOW asked who would maintain the garden after the initial planting. MR. HENNESSY explained that the seniors will be maintaining four of the gardens, and the clubs will maintain the other two.
