CEREMONIAL MATTERS

1. Call to Order

MAYOR GOODMAN called the meeting to order at 9:00 a.m.

PRESENT: MAYOR GOODMAN and COUNCILMEMBERS KNUDSEN, CREAR, SEAMAN (excused at 12:00 p.m.), DIAZ, ALLEN-PALENSKE and BRUNE

ALSO PRESENT: CITY MANAGER MIKE JANSSEN, CITY ATTORNEY JEFF DOROCAK and CITY CLERK LUANN D. HOLMES

3. Invocation - Pastor Drew Moore, Canyon Ridge Christian Church

PASTOR DREW MOORE, Canyon Ridge Christian Church, gave the invocation.

4. Pledge of Allegiance

Minutes:

MAYOR GOODMAN led the audience in the Pledge of Allegiance.

5. Recognition of the Citizen of the Month

Minutes:

MAYOR GOODMAN invited COUNCILWOMAN SEAMAN to the podium to recognize this month's Citizens of the Month. COUNCILWOMAN SEAMAN explained that on December 27, 2023 JERRY LOPEZ, 39 years old and father of seven children, was killed in a hijacking spree in Las Vegas. In remembrance of his life and the impact he had on his community COUNCILWOMAN SEAMAN also recognized his wife, KAREN LOPEZ. She is now taking on responsibility for their family of seven kids, six of whom have special needs and were adopted by the family. COUNCILWOMAN SEAMAN wanted to honor MR. LOPEZ for the lives he touched and the legacy he left behind. She recognized MR. and MRS. LOPEZ'S profound impact within the community by fostering and

adopting children with special needs and creating a loving environment for them to grow in. She encouraged supporting those in need and creating a culture of inclusivity. COUNCILWOMAN SEAMAN presented MS. LOPEZ with a proclamation for her and MR. LOPEZ, a copy of which was submitted and attached as backup.

ANTHONY LOPEZ, son, thanked the Councilmembers for the recognition and said his father was a good man and would be proud.

MS. LOPEZ thanked COUNCILWOMAN SEAMAN and the people that helped make the recognition happen, and she felt blessed to be a part of the Las Vegas community. She said she never imagined being a victim of senseless violence, and their family feels the void of her husband every day. She thanked the community for their support and generosity and her church for the help they have given. She expressed gratitude for the award and said MR. LOPEZ had integrity in everything he did, was a kind man and an exceptional father. She reflected on things he did every day, how he served within their church, and how their partnership made her a better person. MS. LOPEZ said she was humbled to be honored and thanked MAYOR GOODMAN, the Councilmembers, the Las Vegas Community, and the first responders that assisted that day.

6. Recognition of Local Organizations Supporting The Arts

Minutes:

COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ said the art of public speaking has been instrumental in her upbringing and observing art helps bring compassion and humanity to the community. She recognized FAYM (Foundation to Assist Young Musicians) as a local organization that supports the arts. She said the organization offers individual and group guitar, cello, and violin lessons, and they have provided opportunities for the youth to develop their own musical talents. They provide programming to families and children that would not normally be able to afford lessons, and COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ stated they have partnered with the City to provide sites for the organization to run. She expressed gratitude for the organization providing music programs to children within the community and presented FAYM with a certificate of recognition, a copy of which was submitted and attached as backup.

ARTURO OCHOA, President, explained the organization was created 17 years ago by HAROLD WELLER who was the creator and conductor of the Las Vegas Philharmonic. MR. OCHOA said when he had a violin program at Sunrise Acres Elementary School, MR. WELLER would visit the children and that is how their friendship began. He explained even though he is retired, this organization allows him to remain in education, and he believed this organization helps raise the children involved. He noted the board recently added a parent that has been involved with the program for a long time to help make decisions and keep the program effective for the children.

TIM THOMAS, Program Coordinator, expressed gratitude for the award and stated the concerts the program organizes are attended by 500 people, and the community has helped the organization continue on. He agreed with COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ that music allows children to grow into people with confidence and it is a tool that allows them to find their better future.

MAYOR GOODMAN acknowledged the many things MR. WELLER contributed to the community and noted her children played instruments when growing up. She thanked the organization for everything they do and expressed the importance of music in life.

COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ recognized the First Friday Foundation and invited COREY FAGAN, Executive Director, to the podium. She noted the organization has been operating for 22 years and the monthly First Friday Festival draws thousands of people to Downtown Las Vegas. It began as an event on Colorado Street by visionary CINDY FUNKHOUSER, and grew into a major event now including talent, artisans, and food trucks. The First Friday Organization is a 501(c)(3) non-profit organization that supports local artists and students and is holding their second ARTUOK? event that assists youth in the arts. COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ presented MS. FAGAN with a certificate of recognition that was read for the record and submitted as backup.

MS. FAGAN said she was grateful to be a part of a community that cares and it starts at the top with leaders. She noted First Friday is a collaboration that starts with the City and their support and understanding of what goes into the organization. She opined artists heal, and providing children an artistic outlet helps the community. She thanked the First Friday team and the community that attends the events and noted they have added walkable spaces in the Arts District. She said she has been involved with First Friday for 17 years was

grateful for the people in the organization that started before her. She expressed gratitude for the Council and the recognition.

COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ introduced KIRSTEN LEEDS, Communications Manager, Life is Beautiful, to be recognized for their support of the arts. COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ noted the festival started in 2013 and is an annual three-day event that focuses on music, food, art, and diversity. She explained the art in front of the Marriage License Bureau was donated by the festival, and murals are left for the community to visit after the event. The festival has contributed to the Downtown Las Vegas economy by having over 180,000 attendees over the years and has enabled local artists to partner with the City in bringing murals to parks across the valley. COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ noted TONY HSIEH was a visionary behind the event and thanked MS. LEEDS and the organization for their contributions to the art community. She presented MS. LEEDS with a certificate of recognition, a copy of which was submitted and attached as backup.

MS. LEEDS thanked the City and said it started with MR. HSIEH and has blossomed into what it is today. She thanked the community and the other art organizations for supporting them and each other.

TIM PARKS, Program Manager, reported that this Special Improvement District (SID) is for 32 parcels bounded by Las Vegas Boulevard to the west, Ogden Avenue to the north, Carson Avenue to the south, and 8th Street to the east. This SID covers the cost of landscape maintenance, street cleaning, public utilities, promotional events, and marketing for the period of July 1, 2024 through June 30, 2025. In coordination with the Fremont East Entertainment District Board, there will be no assessment this year due to sufficient reserves to cover anticipated expenses. The assessment is fully paid by the property owners. No protests were filed.

MAYOR GOODMAN declared the Public Hearing closed.

FINANCE - DISCUSSION

31. Discussion for possible action regarding the recommended Fiscal Year 2025 Tentative Budget for the City of Las Vegas and the City of Las Vegas Redevelopment Agency - All Wards [NOTE: This item will be heard after the Community Development - Discussion section of the Agenda]

Minutes:

This item was heard subsequent to Item 35.

CITY MANAGER MIKE JANSSEN, DEPUTY CITY MANAGER STEVE FORD, and SUSAN HELTSLEY, Director of Finance, shared in narrating a PowerPoint presentation, a copy of which was submitted for the record, to report that the tentative budget focuses on City Council's priorities of public safety, healthcare, and diversifying the economy, while also focusing on the needs of the community. Regarding public safety, MR. JANSSEN stated that a \$2.5 million grant will be allocated towards street light upgrades, and the proposed budget includes citywide transportation safety improvements. He stressed the importance of organizational health and using social media to recruit employees. He expected an employee survey to be sent out in the fall, and he said the training budgets would return to pre-pandemic levels. He advised that other cities were dealing with significant budget challenges, and a conservative and balanced budget was proposed to ensure the City remains at or above reserve targets identified by the Council. He reported that the Capital Improvement Projects (CIP) budget had less funding than last year but included additional funding to cover inflationary costs for existing projects.

MR. JANSSEN listed budget items within each Council priority from the presentation, including adding a Fire Training Officer, 20 students to the paramedic school, and two Deputy City Marshals to expand the Problem Oriented Policing team. He said the budget included support contracts with Hearts Alive Village and Heaven Can Wait Animal Society for animal microchipping, and he advised that it will cost \$15 million for the City to take over The Animal Foundation's shelter building. He stated that \$3.5 million was allocated towards contract ambulance services to help address crisis response calls, and the budget includes funding for behavioral health services added to the Homeless Resource Center. Regarding diversifying the economy, MR. JANSSEN noted there was RDA (Redevelopment Agency) funding allocated towards a biotech innovation center in collaboration with the UNLV (University of Nevada, Las Vegas) Medical School, and additional funding will be provided to master plan the CSN (College of Southern Nevada) Northwest Campus. He stated that the City will partner with

Google and other providers for the deployment of high-speed broadband access, and he said the budget includes staffing and equipment for the upcoming Civic Plaza and three additional vehicles for Animal Control Officers.

MS. HELTSLEY thanked several staff members and departments for their efforts on preparing the budget. She provided a year-end estimate summary for the Fiscal Year (FY) 2024 General Fund. She expected revenues to exceed the budget by \$23.1 million, which included C-Tax (Consolidated Tax) estimated to be \$5 million over budget, and she said money from the ARPA (America Rescue Plan Act) will be transferred to the General Fund to fund projects. Regarding expenditures, she stated that the City had around 300 open positions and was underrunning the budget by \$12 million, and she advised that \$55 million would be used towards CIP and purchasing The Animal Foundation's shelter building. MS. HELTSLEY expected C-Tax to increase by 1.6 percent and property tax to increase by 5.25 percent in Fiscal Year 2025, and she explained that a large portion of the property tax will be abated and amount to nearly \$70 million. She displayed a pie chart showing General Fund revenues broken down by category, noting that C-tax accounts for around 55 percent of the revenue. Speaking to C-Tax history, she stated that it decreased in FY10 due to a recession. She believed FY20 would have been a record year if not for COVID shutting down the city, and she said federal stimulus funds helped support the large increase in FY22. MS. HELTSLEY displayed a bar graph on property tax history to report that property tax abatement fell to nearly zero percent in FY13 due to the recession and lower home values, and she expected the City to collect \$159.1 million and \$71 million in abatements in FY25. She spoke of expenditures for FY25, highlighting that Metro (Las Vegas Metropolitan Police Department) requested an 8.7 percent increase in funding to accommodate additional civilian and commissioned positions. She advised that operating costs for the Homeless Resource Center increased by \$2 million, which included behavioral health services, and she noted several positions that were funded through ARPA would be transferred to the General Fund. MS. HELTSLEY felt optimistic about progress made on collective bargaining agreements with IAFF (International Association of Fire Fighters) and CEA (Las Vegas City Employees' Association), and she advised that PMSA (Police Managers & Supervisors Association) was in arbitration and any settlement was not included in the budget.

MS. HELTSLEY expected Civic Plaza to open in the spring, stating that funding was included for six months of staffing and equipment. In response to MAYOR GOODMAN, MR. FORD advised that the FF&E (Furniture, Fixtures, and Equipment) budget for the main building was included in last year's CIP, and the proposed budget will fund tenant improvements for building two. He clarified that no FF&E was budgeted for building two since that space would be leased out and become the tenant's responsibility.

MR. JANSSEN reported that 28.67 new positions are being proposed for several departments, which he listed from the presentation, including five positions to support the Civic Plaza. One Payroll Analyst was proposed to assist with payroll for nearly 4,000 City employees, and one Budget Analyst would help the Neighborhood Services Department handle the complex grants they receive. An Irrigation System Repairer was proposed to support the city's expanding tree canopy, while a Graffiti Technician will maintain 83 city parks. One Youth Development Behavior Specialist will support nearly 8,000 participants in the Safekey Program, and a Network Administration Specialist will provide increased cybersecurity at the sewer plant. One Facilities Field Supervisor will maintain over 3,000,000 square feet of City buildings, and a Hydrant Technician will work in collaboration with the Water Authority (Las Vegas Valley Water District) to install locking mechanisms and maintain more than 15,000 unmetered hydrants within the city. The Mayor confirmed with MR. JANSSEN that the Water Authority will purchase hydrant-locking mechanisms for the Hydrant Technician to install. MAYOR GOODMAN wondered if the mechanisms would allow for digital monitoring of hydrant functionality. MR. JANSSEN stated that the Water Authority added sensors to streetlights allowing them to monitor water meters remotely, and he expected to have a follow-up conversation with the Water Authority to improve hydrant controls. Further, he said an Interlocal agreement between the City and the Water Authority would be presented to the Council in the future.

MS. HELTSLEY displayed pie charts from the presentation showing General Fund expenditures broken down by category and function, noting that salary and benefits accounted for 48.8 percent of the budget on the category pie chart while public safety accounted for 63.5 percent of the budget on the function pie chart. An overview was given that compared actual numbers for FY23, the estimate for FY24, and the tentative numbers for FY25. She reported that FY23 had an excess revenue of \$52.3 million that allowed a \$55 million transfer towards one-time capital projects in FY24. She advised that conservative C-Tax estimates for FY24 were \$435 million, and she explained that the FY24 decrement budget had a large portion of non-labor expenditures, including spending ARPA funds that were not spent in FY23. Speaking to the General Fund Revenue and

Expenditure Trending graph, MS. HELTSLEY noted that revenue was higher than expenditures in FY20 due to the pandemic, and she expected the City to use more of the fund balance by spending federal funding previously received. Regarding the General Fund Forecast graph, she believed there will be a surplus of \$7.9 million in FY26 and deficits for the following years, which she explained were due to conservative revenue estimates.

MR. FORD showed several revenue streams for project funding from the presentation, including reallocating existing project funding for closed projects and the Residential Construction Tax. He listed major public safety and ward specific projects, which included the Strong Start Charter School expansion in Ward 3 and Heers Park improvements in Ward 5. MAYOR GOODMAN wondered when the projects would be completed, and MR. FORD expected each project to go out for bid in FY25. The Mayor confirmed with MR. FORD that the Centennial Hills Community Center pool improvements in Ward 6 would be phased so one pool remains open. He noted that the design for FS (Fire Station) 103 would be funded in this budget, and fencing will be installed around older fire stations to limit vandalism. He advised that \$133.4 million was allocated towards new capital projects for FY25, and he broke down the allocation by category.

Regarding the RDA, MR. JANSSEN explained that locations within a redevelopment area were eligible for financial programs. He contributed the increased assessed valuation of properties within the RDA to projects such as The ENGLISH Hotel and Auric at Symphony Park. He stated that the RDA supports City programs and initiatives, including the HUNDRED (Historic Urban Neighborhood Design Redevelopment) Plan in Action and development within Symphony Park and the Medical District. He explained that the Visual Improvement Program provides funding to property owners to improve the exterior of their building, and the new Downtown Special Event Public Safety Support Program will offer money to event organizers to fund public safety staff. An overview was given that compared actual numbers for FY23, the estimate for FY24, and the tentative numbers for FY25. MR. JANSSEN provided an outline of the tentative budget for all funds totaling nearly \$2.1 billion for FY25, which he felt was appropriate with the city's growth.

In conclusion, MR. JANSSEN believed the conservative budget responds to Council priorities and focuses on organizational and fiscal health. He reported that the tentative budget needed to be filed by April 15th and the final budget filed by June 3rd.

The Mayor wondered if an upcoming silver tsunami was considered in the budget. MR. JANSSEN acknowledged that several long-time leaders had retired, and he expected an additional wave of retirements. He stated that succession planning identified new leaders, which he believed were people that helped recruit to the City.

COUNCILMAN KNUDSEN congratulated MR. JANSSEN for his first budget presentation as the City Manager. He questioned if additional BIDs (Business Improvement Districts) in the Arts District or Medical District would affect the RDA budget, and he requested an update on the volunteer program that was discussed in Council briefings. MR. JANSSEN stated that several agencies use volunteers to provide a security presence at parks, and he said graduates from the Citizens Academy developed by CHIEF JASON POTTS, Department of Public Safety Director, had expressed interest in volunteering. He noted that two SIDs (Special Improvement Districts) were under consideration that operate similarly to BIDs. He advised that The Strat and property owners within the Arts District were interested in creating BIDs, which would provide additional levels of security, cleaning, and marketing. Further, MR. JANSSEN said funding was available to discuss creating a BID in the Medical District. The Councilman asked if the required 18 percent set-aside met City needs. MR. JANSSEN offered to discuss this with staff, noting that much of the set-asides fund programs managed by the Neighborhood Services and Youth Development and Social Initiatives Departments.

COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ stated that 63.5 percent of the budget was allocated towards public safety, and she thanked MR. JANSSEN for focusing on Council priorities, which she said were created through interactions with the community. She thanked the Economic and Urban Development and their former Director, RYAN SMITH, for their work in the RDA.

COUNCILWOMAN BRUNE appreciated that the conservative budget grew in line with the city's population growth. She wondered how much funding would be set-aside for the Downtown Special Event Public Safety Support and RDA Area Powerline and Power Service Upgrade Programs. MR. JANSSEN clarified that funds generated by the RDA can only be used within the RDA area, and he expected a 50 percent match for the public safety component at special events. He wanted the powerline program to handle different sized projects,

and he expected to budget around \$2 million per year towards powerline upgrades. The Councilwoman asked for the expenditures pie chart to include a breakdown on Council priorities.

COUNCILWOMAN ALLEN-PALENSKE recognized that the budget was limited and the needs were great. She was proud that the City has a AA bond rating, and she felt confident that MS. HELTSLEY would be as fiscally responsible as CHIEF FINANCIAL OFFICER GARY AMELING, who had recently announced he would be retiring.

In response to MAYOR GOODMAN, MR. JANSSEN advised that the formal reserve policy was amended from 15 percent to 25 percent after discussions with Councilmembers, and he stated that the community is dependent on leisure and hospitality and is susceptible to an economic downturn. He wanted to ensure that the budget met Council goals, noting that the reserve balance will be 26.1 percent with the proposed balanced budget. The Mayor thanked the team for their effort.

JACK ESLINGER, Court Administrator, introduced DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY ANTHONY RUGGIERO, and explained he began working for the City in 2009 as a Special Assistant to the City Council. He left the City in 2016 and earned his Juris Doctorate Degree in Law as well as a Master's Degree in Public Administration. Afterwards he was a law clerk and a guardianship staff attorney for the Legal Aid Center of Southern Nevada and a law clerk for Eighth Judicial Court Judge MARK BAILUS. In April 2019 MR. RUGGIERO joined the City again as a Deputy City Attorney in the criminal division where he maintained good working relations with his coworkers.

MAYOR GOODMAN explained he worked for City Council and attended law school at night and noted this took hard work and dedication. She clarified with him that he worked for COUNCILMAN STAVROS ANTHONY from 2009-2016.

MR. RUGGIERO said he was honored to be the new Hearing Commissioner and he thanked his family, his wife in the audience, his coworkers in the City Attorney's Office, and Judges that helped him along the way. He explained he was grateful for the consideration and he planned on working hard in his new position while upholding the values of the Municipal Court. He thanked the City of Las Vegas for being a great place to work and allowing him to achieve his goals.

PARKS, RECREATION AND CULTURAL AFFAIRS - DISCUSSION

33. Discussion for possible action regarding the adoption of the City of Las Vegas Public Art Master Plan - All Wards

Minutes:

MAGGIE PLASTER, Director of Parks, Recreation and Cultural Affairs, introduced AMANDA RAWSON, Project Manager for Art Builds Community, and utilized a PowerPoint presentation, a copy of which was submitted for the record, to provide a background and timeline of the City's third Public Art Master Plan (Master Plan). MS.

PLASTER advised that funding for the Master Plan was approved as part of the Municipal Arts Plan for Fiscal Year 2023, and Art Builds Community was hired as the consulting team in January 2023. The Arts Commission recommended approval of the Master Plan at their March 21st meeting. She stated that the first plan inspired the development of the Percent for the Arts Program, and this plan evaluates the growth, guides the advancement, and provides a road map for the next 10 years of the program. She said more than \$4.5 million had been transferred into the Percent for the Arts Fund since Fiscal Year 2015, noting that the City's art collection contains more than 1,000 items. She explained that the Master Plan offers a breakdown of community engagement efforts and an updated mission, vision, and goals.

MS. RAWSON displayed the project's timeline and community engagement efforts from the presentation, stating that the project began at the Las Vegas Arts and Culture Summit. Art Builds Community met with the Councilmembers and Arts Commissioners in May 2023 to learn about the City's program and collection, and they worked with NuWu Art Gallery to connect with the community through public events. Two public community meetings and three steering committee meetings were held, and they worked with private development representatives to guide the program towards alternative funding sources. MS. RAWSON said they reviewed several plans developed by the City in order to respond to those plans' recommendations. She stated that the Master Plan's goals include addressing innovation, livability, equity, resiliency and engagement through the arts, which are in alignment with the 2050 Master Plan. She explained that eight recommendations for the program were identified, which she listed from the presentation and noted that they were placed into an implementation grid and classified as short-term (up to two years), mid-term (three to five years), and long-term (six to 10 years). The short-term items focus on program-wide policies and improving processes, while the mid-term items direct the planning and preparation for long-term goals. The long-term items emphasize commissioning new projects in alignment with procedures and programs. MS. RAWSON stated that the Master Plan includes a summary of comparable cities with percent for arts in private development programs, which she believed would be the next step for the City's program. Lastly, she acknowledged City leadership and staff, Arts Commissioners, and her staff for their help completing the Master Plan.

COUNCILMAN KNUDSEN noticed that Page 60 included long-term recommendations for Wards 3 and 5 to work with community groups to commission art, and he requested for Ward 1 to be included. Regarding a recommendation on Page 59, he believed creating partnerships between the City and private property owners could be done earlier than six to 10 years. Lastly, he believed the Public Works Department should be involved with the plan. MS. PLASTER advised that one recommendation was to meet annually with the Finance and Public Works Departments to discuss Percent for the Arts, and she offered to include Ward 1 at the Councilman's request. She felt it was better to under-promise and over-deliver, noting that the Planning Division was working to revise form-based code to include art in private development.

COUNCILMAN CREAR understood the need to promote local artists, but he felt the city is world-class and should include art pieces from well-known artists. He wanted to ensure that was incorporated into the Master Plan. MS. PLASTER stated one recommendation was to identify projects specifically for local artists, and there will also be projects for well-known artists. She advised there had been discussions to include a focus on local artists on the mission statement, which she thought needed to be broader than that. Further, she believed the Arts Commission supported bringing all types of artists into the program.

COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ wanted to see more art throughout Ward 3, and she was happy to see the Master Plan serve as a launching pad. She felt encouraged by the community engagement and wanted to ensure a better revenue stream could be identified to support the arts. She said citizens wanted to see painted AMP utility boxes in their community, and MS. PLASTER advised that the Project Development Subcommittee of the Arts Commission would meet in August to discuss AMP projects.

COUNCILWOMAN BRUNE believed that the recommendation on Page 57 to commission permanent and temporary art should include all wards. She wondered if workforce partnerships had been considered to identify local high school and university artists. MS. RAWSON said wards were named in the implementation plan that they felt would begin each recommendation. She said the advisory committee discussed workforce planning and partnerships, which she said is mentioned in the plan. Further, they discussed developing a stronger relationship with the UNLV (University of Nevada, Las Vegas) Art Museum (Marjorie Barrick Museum of Art), noting the City has an existing internship program.

MAYOR GOODMAN stated that Symphony Park looked forward to the development of public art, and she wondered how developers fit into this plan with its integration with the 2050 Master Plan. She said they were

trying to build a world-class city, and she opined that places are recognized by their art. She appreciated the comprehensive report and thanked MS. PLASTER.
