6. **24-0200-HPC1** - Discussion for possible action regarding voting on the nominations for Historic Preservation Month that will be awarded at the May 29, 2024, Special Historic Preservation Commission Meeting

Minutes:

This item was heard after Item 7, which was called forward and heard after Item 5.

CHAIR STOLDAL announced that for the past 20 years, the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC) has promoted the importance of historic preservation by awarding more than 100 excellent and historic preservation honors in May, which is Historic Preservation Month. He explained how the process has changed from when it was instituted.

With the idea from the City's Historic Preservation Officer (HPO), DR. DIANE SIEBRANDT, a luncheon was added to the awards process. However, the actual Commission guidelines for the nominations and the awards are limited. Initially, nominations only came from the Commissioners, who in turn would read the actual nominations during the presentation. Subsequently, the rules changed to allow the Commissioners, City staff and the public to submit nominations.

Regarding the award categories, CHAIR STOLDAL summarized the requirements from the Award Category Descriptions sheet in the backup documentation. In 2003, the Commission selected these categories: Dorothy Wright Bricks and Mortar (Bricks and Mortar), Preservation Education, Advocacy and Career Achievement.

The Chair underscored that under Item 14, he would suggest a future discussion item regarding the creation of a committee to improve and formalize the award process.

COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT pointed out that although DR. SU KIM CHUNG was nominated by two Commissioners, she would only receive one award.

CHAIR STOLDAL commented that there were nine nominees, who would be voted on in the order listed on the Agenda Memo in the backup documentation, and he explained the voting process, urging the Commissioners to give a brief review of the reason for the nomination of the person or organization. Additionally, he asked that any suggested changes to the award be submitted to COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT, noting that space was limited.

COMMISSIONER ROBERTS asked how the public is engaged in the nomination process, to which CHAIR STOLDAL replied that the Commission bylaws do not have such regulations. For this reason, he would like a discussion about it. COMMISSIONER ROBERTS asked if this meeting's nominations included public input, and the Chair replied that he was not sure.

The following Commissioners provided abbreviated descriptions from the nomination forms in the backup documentation for the following individuals in the respective categories: 1) CHAIR STOLDAL for Bricks and Mortar - Mayor OSCAR B. GOODMAN; 2) COMMISSIONERS SIEBRANDT, PURDUE, LARIME and MOODY for Advocacy, respectively - Honorable RICHARD BRYAN, COUNCILMAN CEDRIC CREAR, The Plaza Hotel and Casino Marketing Team and COUNCILWOMAN NANCY BRUNE; 3) CHAIR STOLDAL for Career Achievement - ROOSEVELT FITZGERALD; 4) COMMISSIONERS LARIME and SIEBRANDT for Preservation Education, respectively - DR. SU KIM CHUNG and Boyd Productions.

Regarding the nomination for COUNCILMAN CEDRIC CREAR, COMMISSIONER LARIME wondered if Historic Westside Legacy Park would better fit the category of Bricks and Mortar instead of Advocacy, even if it does not

include the preservation of a space, and she asked if the nomination could still be made. COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT said it could be nominated for next year's awards, given that the Commission was voting on the nominations as submitted.

COMMISSIONER BECK agreed that COUNCILWOMAN NANCY BRUNE has done an outstanding job of protecting Floyd Lamb Park at Tule Springs.

CHAIR STOLDAL was confused as to why a change could not be made, and COMMISSIONER BECK interjected to say that it was because the agenda was posted to indicate the nomination for the Advocacy category. The Chair asked if errors could not be corrected and thought the box category on the form was blank. COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT explained that an error could be corrected, but the nomination category could not be changed. COMMISSIONER COSGROVE thought the nomination category was checked.

After the votes, COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT confirmed for COMMISSIONER MOODY that the nominees would be informed via e-mail.

7. **24-0203-HPC1** - Discussion for possible action regarding approval of the final report of the Historic Context and Reconnaissance Level Survey of historic resources dating from 1946 to 1982 in the Twin Lakes area, generally bounded by Vegas Drive, North Rancho Drive, North Decatur Boulevard and West Bonanza Road - Ward 5 (Crear)

Minutes:

This item was pulled forward for discussion after Item 5.

CHAIR STOLDAL welcomed COURTNEY MOONEY, North Wind Resource Consulting (North Wind), and praised the work on the survey, which he said is full of solid, historical information. He had the opportunity to view the neighborhoods, and he saw them in a different light based on the survey. He indicated that he submitted change suggestions regarding some dates.

MS. MOONEY said she did not have a presentation because SHPO (State Historic Preservation Office) had no substantive comments to the document submitted to them. However, she made the revisions the Chair submitted within the last couple of days, and those will be reflected in the final document submitted to SHPO and the City of Las Vegas Historic Preservation Officer (HPO).

CHAIR STOLDAL summarized the purpose of the subject survey and confirmed with MS. MOONEY that no properties were identified for listing on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP) or the City of Las Vegas Historic Property Register (local register) in any of the neighborhoods; however, North Wind recommended a reevaluation of the Priory subdivision when it reaches 50 years of age in 2028. MS. MOONEY reiterated that it was only a recommendation, which is also the recommendation for the Woodland Hills neighborhood. The properties were evaluated based on the City's requirements and under Criteria G for listing on the NRHP.

The Chair wondered if they should go ahead and reevaluate the properties under the City's criteria of 40 years old or wait until they are 50 years. MS. MOONEY said it was a general recommendation, without saying it is of high priority.

In reading the City's criteria for 40 years, COMMISSIONER BECK said it seemed that some of the requirements could not be met without meeting the NRHP requirements. COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT was confused and explained that the City requires the standards for listing on the NRHP to be met, but it will also accept the 40-year age limit, and she did not consider those requirements to be in conflict.

CHAIR STOLDAL asked if this was the final draft submitted to SHPO, to which MS. MOONEY replied that she received a response from SHPO with no comments. However, the suggested revisions from the Chair would be made and the final submitted to the HPO.

After the vote, COMMISSIONER BECK praised MS. MOONEY for the fine work and the way the data was organized. CHAR STOLDAL agreed.

10. **24-0211-HPC1** - Discussion for possible action regarding approval of a streetlight sign design identifying the John S. Park neighborhood, generally bounded by East Charleston Boulevard, South 9th Street, East Oakey Boulevard and Las Vegas Boulevard - Ward 3 (Diaz)

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT introduced this item and said the applicant was required to seek approval from the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC).

ERIC KRAL, Vice President, and RAE LATHROP, President, John S. Park Neighborhood, were present. MR. KRAL referred to a PowerPoint slide, a copy of which was submitted, that depicted the proposed sign developed according to the precedent set in the McNeil Estates and Beverly Green neighborhoods. The funding for the sign was received through a Neighborhood Partners Fund Board grant from the City. The proposed, double-sided, aluminum sign will measure 24" x 24". He showed a sample of the Beverly Green sign on the monitor, which is the same size as the one proposed, and he added that the proposed sign, which would include graffiti protection coating, would be installed by City traffic engineers to ensure the signs will not interfere with traffic safety or other signs. Several neighborhood meetings were held and forms were sent to 46 residents to gather input, and the proposed sign was approved by a vote of 34 people in support.

MR. KRAL referred to a map with orange dots, which represented the sign installation locations throughout the entire John S. Park Neighborhood. The locations were selected because there are no poles with signs and to maximize the value, as the grant includes a matching component and the neighbors have contributed.

MR. KRAL explained the sign design, a copy of which was included as backup documentation from the meeting, noting it highlights the district's establishment in 1931, the color scheme is representative of development in the late 1950s and 1960s, including the architectural styles of Tudor, minimal traditional and mid-century modern. He emphasized that the goal was to highlight the development and character of the neighborhood over time.

COMMISSIONER PURDUE asked if they felt it was not necessary to include the word neighborhood. MR. KRAL explained that the selected artist wanted to highlight the name of the person the neighborhood was named for, but he offered to add it as a condition of approval, and CHAIR STOLDAL agreed that the word neighborhood should be added.

COMMISSIONER LeVINE suggested adding the City of Las Vegas seal since the City provided funding. The Chair said that was a good point and verified with COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT that there had not been any discussion about it or negative feedback.

COMMISSIONER MOODY liked the sign design, agreed with the addition of the word neighborhood and appreciated the applicant seeking approval first.

COMMISSIONER ROBERTS applauded the presentation and liked the combination of architectural styles, but he was concerned about losing some of the details in the printing. He supported adding the word neighborhood and the City logo and wondered if a marker could be added to the signs for the historic areas to make the distinction, given that some people believe the entire neighborhood is designated historic. MR. KRAL said they intend to run a proof before finalizing the sign to ensure it is exactly what they want. About a historic distinction, he explained that some residents were concerned about the focus being placed on the historic areas, when the goal is to create a sense of place in order to get buy-in from all the residents for neighborhood improvements. Additionally, making the distinction would mean additional costs, especially when an area becomes historic and the signs have to be replaced. He pointed out that none of the other neighborhood signs have the City logo. He offered to turn over a collection of interviews from the historic area instead.

CHAIR STOLDAL stressed that the challenge with the signs is that some residents were posting signs declaring a historic neighborhood when they had not been designated as such, but he reiterated his support for adding the word neighborhood and the City logo. He confirmed with MR. KRAL that the colors in the digital design are more accurate and observed that the three-story structure in the design seemed out of place. MS. LATHROP explained that they wanted to include all the homes in the neighborhood, including the homes recently constructed on 8th Street because they are contributing members of the neighborhood.

COMMISSIONER BECK explained that she supports adding the word neighborhood because people will be searching for a park without it.

CHAIR STOLDAL restated the suggested additions to the sign, the word neighborhood, City logo, and a historic marker. COMMISSIONER PURDUE motioned for approval of all three additions. MS. LATHROP pointed out that signs funded through City grants in other neighborhoods do not include a City seal. ANNE KILPONEN, Senior Neighborhood Outreach Specialist, said the City seal has not been added to other signage and the Office of Communications has strict branding specifications, so she was not sure they could move forward with adding the City seal. CHAIR STOLDAL stated that until last year, neighborhood signs were being posted without the HPC's review, but that is no longer the case.

COMMISSIONER PURDUE amended her initial motion to only add the word neighborhood, noting that she would like the HPC to come up with its own seal for historic neighborhoods to include on signs and not have to seek approval from the City.

COMMISSIONER ROBERTS said he wanted to make sure the historic neighborhood designation marker is determined, either by using the City seal or by adding an appendage to the sign or on the pole indicating the official historic designation where appropriate, as he felt it important to come up with a plan for implementation. MR. KRAL pointed out that the Beverly Green neighborhood sign does not feature the word historic, and they just wanted to be consistent with the design. The Commissioner appreciated the clarification, but he persisted that not having a marker for officially designated historic neighborhoods concerns him, especially because there are neighborhoods that do not have the historic designation and feature it on their neighborhood signs, which causes confusion. Hence, he sees this as an opportunity to resolve the issue.

COMMISSIONER LeVINE said adding the word neighborhood is important because the John S. Park Neighborhood consists of approximately nine subdivisions.

COMMISSIONER BECK interjected to say that the objective with the signs is to solidify the neighborhood as a community, and she feared that requiring a historic marker would be problematic for the neighborhood. CHAIR STOLDAL understood COMMISSIONER ROBERTS' concerns, which could possibly be addressed in the near future, but he felt that having the history of the neighborhood was a major step.

12. Report by the Community Development Department regarding Project Update List

Minutes:

COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT reviewed a PowerPoint presentation, a copy of which was submitted for the record, and reported that most of the surveys were completed and some were in progress. The City Council approved the Christensen House to the City of Las Vegas Historic Property Register (local register), noting that it was initially listed on the National Register of Historic Places (NRHP). The Plaque Ceremony for the 1425 Francis Avenue property will be held on May 8, 2024, and reminders would be sent. The updates to the NRHP for the Old Mormon Fort and Historic Westside School are in progress. The meeting for the Design Guidelines was cancelled and would be rescheduled.

The Free Hands-On Workshop in Boulder City, Nevada, is still available.

The Helldorado Days Parade was scheduled for May 11, 2024, and some of the Commissioners will participate.

The City of Las Vegas: The 1960s documentary film is scheduled to premiere Saturday, May 18, 2024, at the Historic Fifth Street School. Invitations would be sent out the following week. KCLV Channel 2 will play the first five films that day leading up to the main premiere.

May's Commission meeting was rescheduled for May 29, 2024, to accommodate the luncheon and meeting on the same day.

Slide 6 showed a table of pending Future Agenda Items and their status that COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT and her staff are working on. The Commissioner explained that the process of getting an item on an agenda is complicated, as there are various aspects involved, such as research, departmental and agency input and deadlines. Nevertheless, she assured the Commissioners that she takes notes of the projects and added that this table would be a new addition to her reports.

COMMISSIONER HOTCHKISS verified that the meeting on May 29, 2024, would be at noon.

14. **Discussion regarding topics for future agenda items.** Comments made during this portion of the agenda by individual members shall refer solely to proposals for future agenda items and any discussion shall be limited to whether or not such proposed item are within the purview of the Commission and/or whether such proposed items shall be placed on a future agenda. No discussion regarding the substance of any such proposed topic shall occur and no action shall be taken.

CHAIR STOLDAL asked if there were any topics for future discussion.

COMMISSIONER LARIME requested the Legal Aid Center of Southern Nevada be invited to make a presentation to the Commission, understanding that they were not required to do so.

CHAIR STOLDAL asked for the creation of a committee to consider submitted ideas of the nomination and award process for Historic Preservation Month. This committee would be tasked with reviewing the award categories and their descriptions and determining if they should be changed and whom the nominations should be accepted from, such as the public, City staff or only from the Historic Preservation Commission (HPC). The committee should also decide if multiple winners could be chosen in each category. The Chair said this is a necessary undertaking because there are no current rules about the awards process, noting that the HPC's bylaws should also be reviewed, and COMMISSIONER SIEBRANDT would send a current copy of those to the Commissioners. He asked for an action item on this at the next meeting to establish the process before next year's awards.
