



Youth Neighborhood Association Partnership Program (YNAPP) Grant Review Board Minutes

1. Call to Order and Roll Call

4. Presentations on Youth Neighborhood Association Partnership Program Applications submitted by National Honors Society College of Southern Nevada High School (CSNHS) West - Project 150 Hygiene Kits; Race to Erase 22 - Improving Veteran Food Security & Building Community; Advanced Technologies Academy Black Student Union - Baskets of Kindness; and presentations on Youth Neighborhood Association Partnership Program Applications by presenters listed on the December 2, 5, or 9, 2024 agenda who were excused by the Board on the presenter's originally scheduled meeting date

Minutes:

As each application was called forward, CHAIR BURCH advised the group they would be given five minutes to make their presentations followed by five minutes in which the Members could ask questions. Subsequent to each presentation, he explained the Board would be voting on the recommended funding awards at a later meeting, and the group would be notified regarding the Board's recommendations within the next three weeks.

Advanced Technologies Academy Black Student Union - Baskets of Kindness: MERON TESFAYE (phonetic) reported that the ATECH (Advanced Technologies Academy) BSU (Black Student Union) applied for YNAPP (Youth Neighborhood Association Partnership Program) funding last year and were awarded \$2,200 for

an AP (advanced placement) Final Exam Party. He reported that the event was successful and allowed students and staff to reflect on mental health and social connections. For this application, he wanted to create baskets of kindness that would include puzzles, chocolates, and books. He said the baskets would support families experiencing financial hardship during the holidays, stating that the baskets would help children feel valued. MR. TESHAYE noted that they would document each step of their journey on social media and encourage others to promote the event.

MEMBER MARTIN asked how many participants would be served and how many baskets could be constructed. MR. TESHAYE requested \$2,000 to make 300 to 400 baskets, adding that BSU and student council volunteers would help build the baskets. MEMBER BOUMAH wondered if they could still complete their project if they did not receive the funding. MR. TESHAYE said they would still complete the project through student contributions from those who were more fortunate than others. In response to MEMBER CRUSE, MR. TESHAYE clarified that each basket would have either a book or a puzzle. MEMBER CAMARILLO wondered if the books would be for different ages and MR. TESHAYE confirmed. In response to MEMBER SARKISIAN, MR. TESHAYE said he felt personally connected to the project since he was not from a wealthy family. He wished to support children that were unheard, and he chose to dedicate his life to creating a safe space for those students.

National Honors Society CSNHS West - Project 150 Hygiene Kits: AUDREYANNA TEBBENS, President of the College of Southern Nevada High School West National Honors Society (NHS), utilized a PowerPoint presentation, a copy of which was submitted for the record, to provide an overview of the project. She reported that Project 150 is a non-profit organization that was founded in 2011 and had supported over 7,500 homeless Las Vegas youth. They give students an opportunity to excel in school while balancing hardships. She explained that the project included assembling and donating hygiene kits to Project 150 for students that could not afford toiletries. Project 150 requested shampoo, conditioner, body wash, toothbrushes, toothpaste, and lotion for the hygiene kits. MS. TEBBENS noted that NHS students would attend meetings to discuss grant requirements and progress updates. Additionally, 40 to 50 students would complete four hours of community service at Project 150. She reported that they would utilize \$100 to \$200 of NHS funds to supply as many hygiene kits as possible and she requested \$2,000 to help them reach their community service goal of donating up to 120 hygiene kits.

CHAIR BURCH asked how she felt personally connected to this project. MS. TEBBENS said she was a student raised in poverty and had to balance working jobs while studying for school. She explained that she would get out of school at 3:00 p.m., work from 5:00 p.m. to 10:00 p.m., and then study when she got home. She realized that other students sympathized with her, which made the project important to her. MEMBER FAJARDO noted that MS. TEBBENS was previously awarded YNAPP funding and asked what she learned from that project. MS. TEBBENS reported that they were awarded roughly \$2,000 for last year's school supply kit project and she found that students receiving support from Project 150 needed pens, pencils, and folders. MEMBER WILLIAMS commended MS. TEBBENS for doing a project that was important to her and supporting the community.

MS. MANOR reported that the Stars Community Development Corporation and Race to Erase presentations were cancelled and disqualified from receiving funding.

5. Discussion for possible action regarding the scoring and recommended funding of the Youth Neighborhood Association Partnership Program for Fiscal Year 2024-25

Minutes:

TARA MANOR, Management Analyst II, provided the Board with a list of each grant application, a copy of which was submitted for the record, and stated she would take note of any stipulations. She reported that \$45,000 was available to be awarded to the 43 groups that presented. She explained that each Member could choose their top 3 groups to award full funding or choose their bottom two groups and deliberate over the minimal amount of funding.

MEMBER WILLIAMS wished to see each group receive some amount of funding, noting that it would be difficult to grant each project their requested amount. In the past, he said they could give each group \$1,000 and discuss which groups would receive additional funding.

DEPUTY CITY ATTORNEY CARMEN GILBERT advised that \$80,559 would be required for each group to receive full funding. If each group was funded \$1,000, then \$3,000 would be left to allocate to the top groups. She advised the Members to abstain from any discussion on applications they assisted with.

MEMBER McNAIR wanted to give each group \$1,000 but worried about electronic usages among certain groups. MS. MANOR explained that the Board could place stipulations on groups that have electronics in their application.

In response to MEMBER CANTOS, MS. MANOR reminded the Board of the program's mission and explained that groups receiving zero funding may not return. The Member agreed that each project should receive funding but did not believe they all should receive \$1,000.

MEMBER MARTIN noted that many projects included hygiene kits and baskets that could receive \$1,000 to accomplish their project. She wanted to completely fund Delta GEMS, Eva M. Wolfe Elementary School Student Council, Kay Carl Elementary School Student Council, and STEM Days. She felt that animal shelter projects were overlooked compared to homeless support and hygiene package projects.

Subsequent to further discussion regarding electronic usage, the Members decided to go through each project starting with a 50 percent baseline of their requested funding amount. MEMBER FAJARDO added that not every group applied for \$2,000. MEMBER SARKISIAN felt that every group that applied for less than \$2,000 should be fully awarded and all basket projects should receive an equal amount of funding.

Advanced Technologies Academy Black Student Union - Baskets of Kindness: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

Canyon Springs High School Batteries Included - CPR 101: MEMBER FULLER stated this group requested 25 CPR (cardiopulmonary resuscitation) certification certificates for \$1,500 and reported that each certification cost \$60. He suggested providing 15 to 20 certificates. MEMBER MARTIN added that several organizations offered free CPR certification. MEMBER SARKISIAN explained that the group could offer 10 certificates, which would bring the final amount to \$1,100 including their other requested funds. Several Members agreed.

MS. MANOR encouraged the Board to look at the applications in full. MEMBER CANTOS agreed but also wanted to consider how each group presented.

Cheyenne High School Batteries Included - Hands Across the City: MEMBER CASTRO felt they should be awarded the \$1,000 requested, to which several Members agreed.

AKATeens Youth Enrichment Group - Project AKATeens Serving Our Community: MEMBER CRUSE felt their cause was important and recommended granting \$1,200. MEMBER BOUMAH worried they could not complete the project without the requested \$2,000.

MEMBER McNAIR felt they would still be able to complete the project with \$1,000, since they received \$6,803 in donations. Several Members agreed.

Belong and Bloom - Belong & Bloom: MEMBER BOUMAH confirmed with MS. MANOR that the Board allowed this group to present on a different day, which they did.

MEMBER CANTOS reported that half of their requested amount would be \$807.07 and asked if the Board wanted to round up to \$900 or \$1,000.

MEMBER CRUSE and several Members felt that \$900 was fair. MEMBER CAMARILLO felt they should be awarded \$1,000, to which several Members agreed.

Subsequent to further discussion, the Board agreed to give them \$1,000.

Birthdays in a Basket - Birthdays in a Basket: MEMBER FLANK was fine with awarding \$1,000 since they had potential for donations and support from the family.

MEMBER CANTOS said it was a great project and felt they should receive \$2,000 since all the money put into the project was out of pocket.

CHAIR BURCH liked the idea of the project but offered to grant them \$1,500 to prevent going over budget. Several Members agreed.

Subsequent to further discussion, an additional \$100 was awarded to the project utilizing excess funding, totaling \$1,600.

National Junior Honor Society Golden Chapter: Knots of Love by Robison Community: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

BSU and Batteries Included NextGen - Game Night: MS. GILBERT noted that this group requested \$1,665 and their 50 percent baseline would be \$832.50. The Board agreed to round up and grant them \$900.

Community Projects - Art and Reading: A Book Tasting: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. Subsequent to further discussion, an additional \$200 was awarded to the project utilizing excess funding, totaling \$1,200.

Crown Together Crew - Crown Care: MEMBER SARKISIAN noted the importance of the project and felt they should be awarded \$1,250, to which several Members agreed.

Subsequent to further discussion, an additional \$150 was awarded to the project utilizing excess funding, totaling \$1,400.

Delta GEMS - Delta Gems Kickball and Cookout Event Empowering Youth Through Sports: A Community Sports Event For Youth In Las Vegas: MEMBER CRUSE believed this project should receive \$1,200 and several Members agreed.

MEMBER McNAIR felt they should stay at the 50 percent baseline totaling \$1,000.

In response to MEMBER FAJARDO, MS. MANOR said they could reach out to the Parks and Recreation Department and ask to waive the \$175 park fee.

Subsequent to further discussion, an additional \$100 was awarded to the project utilizing excess funding, totaling \$1,300.

De'oirs Wave - catch it - De'oirs Wave: MEMBER McNAIR liked the idea of the project but felt they should receive less than the 50 percent baseline since they could not answer questions about their budget.

In response to MEMBER FAJARDO, MS. MANOR clarified this event would be held at Pearson Community Center so the City of Las Vegas would not have any jurisdiction over waiving any expenses.

The Board agreed to grant \$1,000 for the project.

Emerging Leaders - Locking Screens and Unlocking Black History: Enhancing Black History Education for our Youth: CHAIR BURCH liked the idea of the project and felt they presented well. He asked if anyone opposed increasing the 50 percent baseline to \$1,200.

MS. GILBERT reported there was \$4,034 in excess funds remaining.

MEMBER MARTIN suggested awarding an extra \$200 to Delta GEMS and Emerging Leaders, to which no one opposed.

Equipo Academy - Community Garden: MEMBER CAMARILLO wished to increase the 50 percent baseline to \$1,100 and clarified that the group stated this project would benefit the community and not just their school.

The Board agreed to award \$1,100 for the project.

Eva M. Wolfe Elementary School Student Council - Pawsitively Rescued: MEMBER McNAIR asked if they could award \$1,100 or \$1,200 for this project.

MEMBER MARTIN believed they should award the group \$1,400 since the entire group presented and they were excited about giving back to the animal shelter.

CHAIR BURCH agreed to award \$1,400 for this project, stating that they were very passionate and it was a good cause. Several Members agreed.

Grower's Tribute Botany Club - Garden of Peace: Building a Community Prayer Garden: MS. GILBERT reported that they requested \$1,080 and the 50 percent baseline would be \$540. She added that if they were granted the full amount, there would be \$2,694.50 in excess funds remaining.

MEMBER CASTRO asked if anyone was opposed to granting \$700 for the project.

MEMBER CAMARILLO disagreed with awarding the project \$700 since the garden is in a church, and she had concerns with community access to the garden.

MEMBER McNAIR noted that the group said anyone could visit the garden and the produce grown in the garden would be given to those in need throughout the community.

MS. MANOR added that the entire community may not benefit from every project, but the only requirement is that the projects take place within city limits.

The Board agreed to award \$700 for this project.

Heroes & Heart - The Blessing Project: MEMBER McNAIR felt a stipulation should be added to not allow them to purchase the tablet included in their budget, stating that they could post on social media with their phones. She added that once the project was completed, the tablet would only be used for personal use.

MEMBER CASTRO disagreed and said that if they decide to spend most of their money on the tablet, that would be their decision.

MEMBER MARTIN did not believe funding for technology had been allocated in the past and recommended sticking with the 50 percent baseline.

MEMBER FULLER believed the group could remove the tablet and focus on purchasing the essentials for the project since they would only be granted 50 percent of their requested amount of funding

The Board agreed to fund \$1,000 for the project.

Homeschool West Chess Club - Homeschool West Chess Club: MEMBER McNAIR wished to grant \$1,200 to \$1,500 for this project.

MEMBER CANTOS felt that \$1,300 would be an agreeable amount, to which the Board concurred.

MS. GILBERT noted that there was \$2,270 in excess funds.

InspireX - InspireX Change: MEMBER CANTOS acknowledged that the project would raise money for those who were less fortunate to play sports, but he opined that the project was unorganized, and the presenters seemed uninterested. He recommended awarding \$650, and several Members agreed.

Kay Carl Elementary School Student Council - Champions for Paws-Itivity: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

KCES (Kay Carl Elementary School) Drama Club - Sweet Dreams: A Magical Spring Musical Production of Willy Wonka: MEMBER McNAIR proposed awarding \$1,200 to \$1,500, stating that there should be more funding opportunities for extracurricular activities. She added that this could help the atmosphere of the school since they said they would hold multiple shows per year and it would attract students to the drama club.

MEMBER MARTIN believed this project would only benefit the parents of the students at Kay Carl Elementary School and felt that \$1,200 was appropriate.

MEMBER BOUMAH agreed with MEMBER MARTIN. Additionally, he did not believe this project would impact the community.

After further discussion, the Board agreed to award \$1,200 for the project.

Las Vegas Alumnae Chapter of Delta Sigma Theta Sorority, Inc. Dr. Betty Shabazz Delta Academy - So Fresh and So Clean: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

Learning Is Fun Libraries - Learning Is Fun Libraries Fairs: MEMBER CRUSE felt their coordination and description of the project was amazing. He proposed awarding \$1,250.

CHAIR BURCH wondered if other library projects would be awarded the same amount of funding.

MEMBER CRUSE opined that the other library projects did not seem as interested in their idea.

MS. GILBERT stated that \$2,175 in excess funds remained.

MEMBER CANTOS felt this was the best library project and the presentation was well organized.

The Board agreed to award \$1,250 for the project.

Mad Hat Productions - Spring Break Meal Boxes: MEMBER McNAIR believed that CCSD (Clark County School District) provided meals to students over spring break. MS. MANOR clarified that they were no longer supplying lunches over breaks.

The Board agreed to award \$1,000 for the project.

National Honors Society College of Southern Nevada High School (CSNHS) West - Project 150 Hygiene Kits: MEMBER CANTOS indicated that Project 150 receives a lot of funding and proposed \$600, to which several Members agreed.

Nehemiah Youth Ministries - CAN WE TALK?: CHAIR BURCH noted that they requested \$1,250 and asked if the Board wished to grant more than the 50 percent baseline of \$625. He felt that it should be increased to \$1,000.

MEMBER McNAIR felt \$750 to \$800 was more appropriate since the camera they were asking for costs \$800.

MEMBER FAJARDO wanted to be consistent with how technology was treated in the past and noted that cameras and filming equipment are closely examined.

CANDACE CAMARILLO, Management Analyst II, explained that each group should have included how they would continue to use an expensive piece of technology to serve the community after the project is completed. She added that this group successfully completed projects in the past and met the requirements of the grant.

MEMBER FULLER recalled the group stating they would continue to film videos after this project.

MEMBER CRUSE felt they were engaged in their project and trusted that they would continue to film.

In response to MEMBER McNAIR, MS. MANOR clarified that staff conducts site visits, and each group is required to provide monthly reports.

MEMBER FLANK added that their filming schedule was included in their project.

The Board agreed to fund \$1,000 for the project.

NextGen Leaders - Hope for the Future: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

Northeast Career and Technical Academy Construction Program - Little Library: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

Read and Build Crew - The Little Libraries: A Land of Love: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

Somerset Black Student Union - Care Packages for Homeless Youth: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

STEM Days - STEM Days: CHAIR BURCH noted that three tablets were included in their budget totaling \$300.

MEMBER MARTIN recommended keeping them at the 50 percent baseline, which would force them to budget accordingly.

MEMBER McNAIR stated that if they do not purchase Meta Quest 3 and the charger then they would have enough money in their budget to complete the project.

MEMBER FLANK added that they earned \$730 in cash donations.

The Board agreed to award \$1,000 for the project.

Taron Brown - Kindness on Wheels: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

Team V - Project Volleyball: CHAIR BURCH reported that they requested \$1,500 and wondered if the Board wished to keep their funding at the 50 percent baseline.

MEMBER BOUMAH said he loved the idea and felt they should be awarded \$1,500.

MEMBER McNAIR felt \$1,000 would be more appropriate since there were more groups.

MEMBER MARTIN proposed \$1,400 since the family was taking time to manage multiple clinics and they did not ask for the maximum amount of funding.

MEMBER BOUMAH proposed awarding \$1,300, to which several Members agreed.

The Allsparks - Bricks and Bots: MEMBER McNAIR proposed awarding \$1,200 to \$1,500 for this project since the electronics are expensive, and they could reuse the equipment in the future.

MEMBER FAJARDO agreed and added that the group came back with findings they could improve on from prior years. She appreciated the presentation.

CHAIR BURCH proposed \$1,300, to which several Members agreed.

Tofu Tees - Youth Art Gallery: MEMBER CAMARILLO wished to award \$1,200 for this project.

CHAIR BURCH agreed and felt the idea could expose the community to creating art as a hobby or career.

MEMBER CANTOS wanted to increase the funding to \$1,300, stating that the group's events are organized and the presentation was done well.

MEMBER CRUSE felt \$1,250 would be fair and asked how much in excess funds they had remaining.

MS. GILBERT stated that if this project was granted \$1,250 and the remaining groups were funded at a 50 percent baseline, there would be \$1,100 in excess funding.

The Board agreed to fund \$1,250 for the project.

United Haven - United Haven: CHAIR BURCH noted that the group requested \$1,500 for the project.

MEMBER CRUSE proposed to fund \$800 for this project, to which several Members agreed.

VALLEY HIGH SCHOOL MSTEM (Military Science, Technology, and Emergency Management) - Ready Prep Go: MEMBER CAMARILLO proposed awarding \$1,100 for this project, to which several Members agreed.

WESTERMAN FAMILY - A BIRD'S GUIDE TO SWIM: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. Subsequent to further discussion, an additional \$200 was awarded to the project utilizing excess funding, totaling \$1,200.

Youth Empowerment and Education Initiative - Guidance & Opportunity Youth Project: CHAIR BURCH asked if there were any objections to granting 50 percent of the project's requested amount. There being none, \$1,000 was agreed upon.

YOUTH HELP YOUTH - Youth Help Youth: Making No-Sew Fleece Blankets: MEMBER McNAIR proposed giving the group \$1,100 to help them provide more blankets.

MEMBER MARTIN noted they were in partnership with the Boys and Girls Club. She felt \$1,000 would be enough money for them to put together a sufficient amount of fleece blankets.

MEMBER FAJARDO asked the Board to award \$1,100 for the project, to which several Members agreed.

Youth Of WLVAC (West Las Vegas Arts Center) - Heal Your Heart Through the Arts: MEMBER FAJARDO wished to award \$1,100 for the project since they were very passionate about the project. Several Members agreed.

Motion made by Khloe Camarillo to Approve \$1,200 to Community Projects - Art and Reading: A Book Tasting; \$1,000 to Heroes & Heart - The Blessing Project; \$1,300 to Homeschool West Chess Club - Homeschool West Chess Club; \$1,250 to Learning Is Fun Libraries - Learning Is Fun Libraries Fairs; and \$1,000 to STEM Days - STEM Days
