CEREMONIAL MATTERS

5. Recognition of the Citizens of the Month

Minutes:

COUNCILWOMAN BRUNE said that as the Ward 6 Council representative, one of her goals is to build community, which has been easy because her constituents believe in that and are very active in Ward 6. Therefore, she could not think of one person to recognize, but she came up with four Ward 6 residents to recognize as Citizens of the Month for May 2026. She called forward KEN KRAFT, CORY RAVIZE, PATTI CHESS and KIM BISHOP, who was being represented by her husband, MITCH, in her absence, and cited the reasons for selecting them.

MR. KRAFT works as Senior Manager for IGT and has resided in Southern Nevada since 1997. He always steps up to help and was involved in his North Las Vegas neighborhood before moving to Ward 6. Without hesitation, he agreed to serve on the Traffic and Parking Commission. He and his wife, AMY, hold an annual festival and open it up to everyone on their own accord, and she was grateful for their efforts to build community.

MS. CHESS is a fierce advocate for pickleball, and she has always been very active in her community. They met at one of the Councilwoman's monthly coffee gatherings, and MS. CHESS volunteered to help with pickleball tournaments.

MS. RAVIZE taught school, became a realtor and got involved in the Kenneth Divich Elementary School PTO (Parent Teacher Organizations). They met at the Councilwoman's monthly coffee meetings and learned that MS. RAVIZE is very involved in the community because she believes in building community.

MS. BISHOP has been a special education teacher for many years and is considered the mayor of Ward 6 because people do not refuse her when she asks for something to be done in the community. She cares so much about her students that she will go to their home to give a lesson if they cannot make it to school.

A video was shown, but a copy of it was not submitted, of the honorees speaking in support of their passions and building community. They were all grateful to the City of Las Vegas for supporting the neighborhoods.

COUNCILWOMAN BRUNE presented each of the honorees with proclamations for Ken Kraft Day, Cory Ravize Day, Patti Chess Day and Kim Bishop Day, copies of which were submitted for the record, and she read portions of the proclamations. As each person accepted their proclamation, they gave thanks to COUNCILWOMAN BRUNE and the other Councilmembers for the recognition and spoke about their interests and involvement in the community.

PUBLIC COMMENT

Minutes:

SHOSHANA, Las Vegas resident, urged the Council to eliminate the invocation at public meetings, as there are places for people to practice their religion, claiming that the City of Las Vegas (City) denies certain religions to give the invocation, such as the Satanic Temple group. She alleged they were denied because the City only allows preferred religions, most of which, in her opinion, have encouraged abuse and other crimes.

Regarding Items 26 and 27, ALEXANDER BANOUB requested that the Council take a serious look at the system to be used and impose strict guardrails before approving funding, as the system uses surveillance cameras, which can lead to numerous Fourth Amendment violations. He stressed that it is the taxpayers who would be paying for the infrastructure and that the City would be subverting the democratic process by allowing these without civic approval. He cited examples of violations in Georgia: a resident showed Flock safety employees camera feed of children in a gymnastics room without a warrant, and in Carson City, Nevada, a Sheriff's deputy used Flock cameras to search protestors' vehicles.

MICHAEL GANSON said that at a recent John S. Park Historic District neighborhood meeting, staff from the City's Redevelopment Agency talked about a bid for a housing project in the area, and he felt the community was not adequately included. He added that the area and Downtown Las Vegas are a mess because of storm drain projects in the area.

ERIC KING thanked the Councilmembers for their leadership and sacrifices. He understood that one of the items pertained to the rodeo, which he supported because he believes in letting people enjoy nature. In dealing with horses, he found they help veterans heal. Therefore, he suggested finding a better use for wild horses because many of them get killed, but they could be used to help many veterans.

KAREN NEWCOMER was discouraged about Items 26 and 27 because they involve the installation of surveillance cameras, which are often used to track people, such as with the No Kings protest. She supported their use for fighting crime, but she did not trust law enforcement to use the cameras as designed, given how they treat protestors.

JOHN SULLIVAN, representing the applicant, explained that entitlements for the project were approved in 2019 to build 121 homes for seniors. Unfortunately, several extensions were requested because the financing became unavailable for the type of project. Subsequently, they came up with an affordable housing project without the senior housing component.

COMMUNITY DEVELOPMENT EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR SETH FLOYD reported that this involved the fourth request for Extension of Time (EOT) for the project since its approval in 2019, Several plans for review were submitted in 2019, which expired in 2022, and a building permit issued in 2020 expired in 2022, both expired for inactivity. In January of 2026, a permit package was submitted, and payment of fees was pending to start any reviews. Staff recommended denial of this EOT due to inactivity.

COUNCILWOMAN SUMMERS-ARMSTRONG appreciated the meeting they had and was open to allowing a one-year extension and cautioned that if they did not move forward within that time, the developer would be required to comply with submitting landscape and design plans for the project. Subsequently, MR. FLOYD indicated that Condition 1 for Items 46a-46d would be amended to reflect a date of March 20, 2027, and MR. SULLIVAN agreed with that amendment and appreciated the Councilwoman's consideration.

REPORTS AND PRESENTATIONS

47. Report by Kelvin Watson, Executive Director, Las Vegas-Clark County Library District, regarding an update on current and upcoming initiatives as part of National Library Week - All Wards

Minutes:

TAMMY MALICH, Department of Youth Development and Social Initiatives Director, introduced KELVIN WATSON, Executive Director, Las Vegas-Clark County Library District (Library District), to provide an update, which MR. WATSON was happy to provide, noting that National Library Week was celebrated April 19-25, 2026.

Using a PowerPoint presentation, a copy of which was submitted for the record, MR. WATSON reported on events, initiatives and collaborations the Library District worked on over the past year and reviewed the slides.

FY 2024-2025 Stats at a Glance (Slide 2) - The fiscal year started with encouraging gains that reflected the dedication, creativity and hard work that go into providing programming and resources to the community. The customer base grew by 23 percent, program attendance grew by over 60 percent, and website visitation grew by 72 percent. Based on the momentum, these percentages are anticipated to continue to rise.

New West Las Vegas Library (Slides 3-5) - The library's grand opening was held in December of 2025, and it offers a wide array of facilities and features, as highlighted on Slide 4. A partnership was established with the

Kline Veterans Fund, which will be on site two days of the week to provide veterans with free assistance on applications, resource navigation and other support resources, such as housing and utility assistance. They were also working to identify a story-time reading room in honor of MISS RUBY DUNCAN. To help educate the public about the new West Las Vegas Library, the Library District and the City of Las Vegas (City) launched a social media campaign to coordinate awareness strategies for the community and had the highest performing social media post in the Library District's history, delivering record engagement across TikTok and Instagram.

Up Next: Goodsprings Library - New Location (Slide 6) - In preparation for future growth, the Library District determined a new larger library is needed in the Goodsprings community to replace the current library, which is in a single-wide trailer in the Goodsprings Elementary School parking lot; therefore, several properties were being explored to house the new Goodsprings Library, including a school site no longer used by the Clark County School District (CCSD).

Local and National Recognition (Slide 7) - MR. WATSON, who was recognized as Librarian of the Year for 2026, extended the honor to the 678 employees across 25 branches of the Library District for their passion, dedication and excellence.

Partnerships & Programs (Slides 8-11) - Since 2023, the Library District has held the Annual Teen Empowerment Summit (Summit), and it continues to expand. This year, they collaborated with UNLV (University of Nevada, Las Vegas) to host the Summit at their campus, where 140 local high-school students experienced firsthand what higher education is and learned that it is achievable by engaging with UNLV students and faculty members and envisioning themselves on campus as students. The Summit also highlighted a range of career pathways through college, trade schools and other skilled professions. In partnership with COUNCILWOMAN BRUNE, the Centennial Hills Library offered Tales & Mocktails, an adult mixer and book club event with the goal of bringing more culture to Ward 6. A reading list centered on Las Vegas history was developed, and special guests from UNLV, DR. CLAYTEE WHITE, Historian, and DR. MICHAEL GREEN, Associate Professor, were present to read. With the Library District's partnership with Three Square, they continue to address food insecurity in local neighborhoods and helped serve over 371,000 meals since they started working together, as well as provided social connections for kids, teens and seniors. The Library District's partners, Vegas Golden Knights and Las Vegas Raiders, value and promote literacy and support awareness of programs and services. They provide the Library District with branded library cards and co-branded t-shirts, as well as collectible bookmarks from both teams featuring the teams' favorite books, movies and music, all of which can be checked out with a free library card.

Grants & Private Funding (Slides 12-14) - Through grants received, such as one from the Pizza Hut Foundation in the amount of \$10,000 from their Slice of Literacy Grant, the Library District created the partnership, Barbershop Books, which brings the joy of reading into neighborhood barbershops. Thanks to a \$25,000 grant from VegasTickets.com, they funded Lil' Learners Activity Kits through 2026. The kits are filled with books, skill-building exercises, crafts and activity projects with the goal of empowering caregivers to encourage early literacy and skill-building at home. The StarLab Experiential Learning Lab is an inflatable, portable planetarium launched in April to the public at East Las Vegas Library, and it will travel to more libraries throughout the year to immerse children and adults in visual learning experiences, from ancient civilization to the farthest corners of the universe.

Unique Cultural Experiences (Slide 15) - The efforts to bring national arts to the community to provide unique, cultural experiences included the shows Pepperland, a 50th anniversary tribute to the Beatles' Sergeant Pepper album; Disenchanted!, a comedy satire for adults that flips the script on traditional storybook princesses; and Bach to Beyoncé, a musical journey across genres, from classical music to contemporary pop.

Summer Challenge - Attracting Cardholders (Slide 16) - This is the largest literacy program of the year to be launched on May 15th, with the goal of issuing new library cards using the census list in order to target lower-income families who need libraries the most. The program runs through July 15th.

COUNCILMAN KNUDSEN said that as a parent who frequents libraries with his children, he observed that the libraries have many unhoused individuals, and he wondered how the Library District supports them. MR. WATSON stated that libraries are for everyone, and they hold events focusing on the unhoused. They offer showers and food-insecurity support. In collaboration with the County, they started offering eye exams and eyeglasses in the fall, and within the next two months, they will launch a dental exams and dental services program in partnership with UNLV School of Dental Medicine. He assured the Council that he is available to

help everyone despite their background, noting the various branches offer cooling services as well. The Councilman emphasized that the Library District does a phenomenal job yearly.

COUNCILWOMAN SUMMERS-ARMSTRONG was impressed with the West Las Vegas Library and the events offered and added that she receives positive comments about it even from people residing outside of Ward 5. She was excited to learn that the Library District helps unhoused people move into homes, employment and mental and physical health services.

COUNCILWOMAN DIAZ congratulated MR. WATSON on being named Librarian of the Year. She underscored that the Library District helps to elevate services to those in need so that they are not just surviving but thriving through its collaboration with Workforce Connections, which helps people get jobs. She looked forward to new concepts.

COUNCILWOMAN KELLEY was excited to see local people getting recognized for their hard work, and she liked how the Library District creates partnerships with organizations. She emphasized that the West Las Vegas Library was a source of pride for the City. Regarding the 2.1 million in attendance, she wondered if that was for library programs only or for programs where entities bring programs to the libraries. MR. WATSON answered that it was a combination of library programming and programming in conjunction with partners. The Councilwoman asked about electronic programming, to which MR. WATSON replied that the Library District offers hotspots, which involves providing mobile hotspots, along with laptops and tablets for residents. The libraries also offer computers, 3-D printers for people to learn to use them and digital lending. The Councilwoman asked if young families were taking advantage of those services. MR. WATSON said that last year, their digital use surpassed physical use, but some people like both or prefer physical books; however, they try very hard to ensure they have the right resources for residents.

COUNCILWOMAN BRUNE thanked MR. WATSON for what he is doing for the community and his efforts to bring library access to where it is needed, such as in Spring Valley, as well as for engaging youth. Regarding branding of the Vegas Golden Knights, she wondered if that created an uptick in membership and whether a partnership with the Las Vegas Aces (Aces) was being explored. MR. WATSON answered that they do events for the Vegas Golden Knights and Las Vegas Raiders cards that helped increase card membership. They have conversed with the Aces, but they had not finalized a deal, as the participating organizations typically provide funding.

MAYOR BERKLEY was delighted with the growth of the Library District and his recognition, noting that all libraries are necessary, doing a wonderful job, beautiful and providing a great environment for children to learn.

SET DATE

CITIZENS PARTICIPATION

Regarding Items 26 and 27, ALEXANDER BANOUB urged the Council to place an item on the next City Council agenda to discuss an ordinance regarding surveillance technology oversight before any funding is approved, noting that it affects conservatives and liberals.

MICHAEL GANSON felt the City Council failed to develop the Huntridge Theatre, despite millions of taxpayer dollars spent on it. He suggested building housing for seniors, which would be preferable to using the property for construction equipment. He added that carrying a cellular phone carries a whole different level of privacy issues that the government can enact. He felt that people who are legally in the United States or not breaking

the law had nothing to fear from safety technology. He complained about illegal immigrants in schools, underscoring that being in the country illegally is a crime.

SARAH LEAVITT said she holds a degree in electrical and computer engineering and worked in training AI, which she regarded as unreliable and without safeguards, and Flock technology is known to misread license plates, incorrectly flag vehicles and incredibly error-prone, which has resulted in many cases across the country of innocent people stopped at gunpoint or sent to jail. She alleged Flock AI cannot be trusted, and there is no robust set of standards for accessing the data, thus making it a big liability and the cause of many lawsuits. To increase public safety, the City of Las Vegas should invest in housing and healthcare for all.

KIMMY JOHNSTON-LINSDAY felt that more safeguards, policies and accountability are needed when it comes to Flock safety. However, she felt citizens should not expect a level of privacy with cameras on public roadways, noting that they have helped reduce crime and are very effective in AMBER (America's Missing: Broadcast Emergency Response) alerts. To her understanding, records are deleted within 30 days. She felt that Democratic groups are against Flock because they think the use of it will lead to illegal immigrants being arrested and tracked. As a caring resident in support of safety, she felt safety systems are necessary.

ERIC KING pointed out that May is Military Appreciation Month, and he would like to offer some ideas to enhance the prestige of veterans, perhaps even arrange a presentation to the City Council. MAYOR BERKLEY asked DEPUTY CITY MANAGER SABRA NEWBY to assist MR. KING.
