Director of Planning, Donald J. Saylor: This item has been held in abeyance for quite some time. We have had some problems that we have been trying to work out with the proposed development plan showing how it would fit into the subdivision street pattern. The proposal of the developer, of course, is not that he intends to build a shopping center within the next few months but we have had this problem in the past of homes being built in the area and then the request for zoning is made, causing problems. He wants to do it the right way. The Planning Commission has recommended approval subject to the various conditions as stated on the agenda. Staff would like to include one more condition in that we are in the process now of having to interchange, evaluate it and the possibility of West Fremont going further west than a limited access. It may require some type of an off-ramp design over a corner of the shopping center property, so we would like the further condition put in that any additional right-of-way that is needed would be excluded from the property included in the application.

Commissioner Stewart: How large is that piece of property?

Mr. Saylor: Three or four acres, I believe.

Commissioner Stewart: How about access, either on Rainbow or Fremont?

Mr. Saylor: There would be access allowed on Rainbow because from Fremont, south, it is not limited. There would be no access allowed on Westcliff, which is the name of Fremont's west wing.

Commissioner Stewart: It would be my suggestion that we add in here that when we determine how the interchange might fit, that at that time it be spelled out how close to that entrance-exit it can be so that we don't end up there in the radius with it.

Mr. Sauer: The Highway Department demands 100 feet off of from where the ramp would come to grade, I believe, to be fenced for no access because of the fact that they have turn-ins.

(Commissioner Mirabelli arrived at the hour of 1:50 p.m.)

Commissioner Stewart: This, we want to get spelled out.

Mr. Saylor: When we get with the Highway Department we will bring this back for an evaluation.

Mayor Gragson asked if there was anyone present in opposition - to which there was no response.

Director of Planning, Donald J. You did, however, allow them until this date to continue in that when the zoning request was considered, the owner of the property indicated that they were in escrow and that it would possibly be consummated by this date. I did contact a couple of the people that were part of the group that was supposed to purchase the property, but they indicated to me that they have nothing firm on the purchase - but the escrow was still open. The Planning Commission has recommended denial of the C-2 zoning.

Mr. Sauer: Actually, based upon what the mortuary paid on the land adjoining, it was \$275.00 per front foot (35 ft.) or \$8,250.00. There are 30 feet for the rest of it - 8/10 of acre -at \$6,198.00, making a total of \$14,448.00; however, I believe the policy has been to refer this to the Real Estate Committee since an appraisal is needed.

Mayor Gragson: When was this property purchased?

Mr. Bunker: Approximately eight (8) months ago.

City Attorney: Normally, we need an appraisal.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Do we provide the appraisal?

Commissioner Stewart: We usually add it on to the price of the land.

Mr. Sauer: If the Commission so desires, they could authorize an appraisal of the property immediately.

Director of Public Works, R. P. Sauer: We have 54.37% by front footage and 56.43% by property owners. This, of course, includes those letters which were mailed and they did not reply. This was considered a "yes" vote. There were some 200 returned "unclaimed

Mayor Gragson: Are you counting those in the "yes"?

Public Works authorized to proceed with plans & specifications:

Mr. Sauer: No, they were not counted at all. I would like to point out that if the Commission directs the Public Works Department to prepare plans and specifications the cost of this is practically been taken care of already, because, if you will recall, two and one-half years ago we retained a consultant based on a previous survey and most all of this has been designed already. We have divided them into small areas and in the past two years and most of them are now improved. This is about the last one of the over-all package that was presented some two or three years ago.

Mayor Gragson: Where is the only unblighted area that we have left?

Mr. Sauer: There is one, Your Honor, on Industrial Road from Sahara north between Fifth Street.....

Commissioner Stewart: That area down there from New York to Sahara between Fifth and Industrial. What is our cost in getting plans and specifications together?

Mr. Sauer: I can't tell you right now. As I said, most of it has been done.....

Commissioner Stewart: How much of it isn't done? What I am asking is how much capital are we to have.

Mr. Sauer: There is to be none. This is to be done by our own Electrical Engineers.....

Commissioner Mirabelli: Your men aren't worth anything - is that what you are saying? It costs us money.

Commissioner Stewart: We will get refunded for what we have already spent.

Mr. Sauer: That's true.

Commissioner Corey: On the strength of that, I am for it.

Commissioner Howery: You say there are about 1500 property owners involved and there are about 200 that you were unable to contact, returned unclaimed. This represents about 15% of the people. You are working pretty close on a 54-46 - I think further efforts should be made to locate these other property owners. I don't think we have a clear-cut majority here. If they have received them and hadn't answered them, I would say "yes."

Commissioner Mirabelli: It would be a terrible chore to locate them - they are out of town, etc.

Mr. Sauer: Commissioner Howery, how we do this - we obtain the last known address from the County Assessor and send out a certified letter to them. All we can assume is that the people that don't pick it up - the property has been sold, etc.

Commissioner Howery: You say the last known property owner. Wouldn't that be shown on the transfer?

Commissioner Stewart: It takes a year before the Assessor picks it up. If you waited a year, you might pick up those 200 and lose another 200.

This has been discussed with the City Manager and the Planning Department and we recommend that it be referred to the Real Estate Committee. I would like to point out, however, that this is industrial property. I think it is about 291 ft. deep by 150 ft. long. I believe he is going to use it as a parking lot.

Mayor Gragson: If we do anything at that price it should be on a month-to-month basis.

Commissioner Stewart: Mayor, the property is actually worth, and I know where a piece of industrial property down there - not on the corner - was sold and the property is worth at least \$100,000.00. You can't lease this kind of property for \$50.00 a month. It is worth \$6,000.00 a year minimum.

Commissioner Howery: What are we getting out of it?

Mr. Sauer: Nothing. I think we should check first, or the Real Estate Committee should have it checked to determine whether we would be assessed taxes.

City Attorney, Sidney R. Whitmore: We might well be. I think that we will on the basis of what they did to Reno in leasing property when it went on to the tax roll. I don't believe the law has been changed.

Commissioner Stewart: While we are talking about the corner, I think it would behoove us to put a sign up there - "FOR SALE"

and to contact the City Manager.

Mr. Sauer: The reason, up to now, we have never gone into that is because we assume that we are going to have to have a satellite yard, either for the electrical or the streets, in the future. I realize it is a pretty expensive piece of property for this. It could be leased, if the Commission desires, until we need it.

Commissioner Stewart: If you lease it - wouldn't it be subject to taxes? We could lease it for the rent plus taxes.

Commissioner Corey: I would have no objection to that, Your Honor - month to month.

Commissioner Mirabelli: I'm not ready to move on this yet, fellows. I want to look at it.

Mayor Gragson: I'm not ready to move on it yet. I do think if we draw anything up that it should be on a month-to-month basis. We will refer it to the Real Estate Committee. I will designate the Real Estate Committee as Commissioners Mirabelli and Howery.

REPORT ON TRAFFIC
SIGNAL AT "J" AND
OWENS

Abeyance

Director of Public Works, R. P. Sauer: I have a report from our Traffic Engineer, Mr. Bossi, who made a 16-hour turning movement study on Tuesday, February 8th, at the intersection of "J" and Owens. The information was then applied to the signal warrants and we have the back-up information, if you care to see it. The warrants show that the intersection does not warrant a traffic signal and it is, therefore, recommended that the request be denied. The intersection site is unrestricted and the two accidents which were in the intersection were caused by motorists entering the intersection without due caution. Gaps in the traffic on Owens offered safe periods for the traffic to enter off of "J" Street.

Commissioner Corey: A study was made on it?

Mr. Sauer: A study was made on it and it did not meet the warrants.

Commissioner Mirabelli: I would like to hold this in abeyance and look at it further.

Mayor Gragson: I would, too. I just can't believe the warrants are always the final determination.

Commissioner Stewart: I grant you are right on a 16 to 24 hour period, but there is an hour in the morning and an hour in the afternoon when we have those situations.

Commissioner Corey: Why don't we have a report on those particular hours?

Commissioner Mirabelli: They can show you hour-to-hour on those reports. If we hold this, we should all get a copy of it.

Mr. Sauer: We will see that all of you get a copy.

Mayor Gragson: When they are going to work is an important hour.

TRAFFIC & PARKING

Request of First
Church of Religious
for 15-minute loading

Approved

Director of Public Works, R. P. Sauer: We have a request from the First Church of Religious Science for 15-minute loading zone in front of 217 North 3rd Street. The Traffic and Parking Commission recommends denial. This was indicated upon the indicated ample curb spaces that were available in the 200 block and it was felt that a loading zone mid-block would not serve properly because of other businesses in the area.

Commissioner Stewart: They have an alley in the rear - do they not?

Commissioner Mirabelli: There are plenty parking spaces - did you say?

Mr. Sauer: Yes.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Then, what is this going to hurt?

Mr. Sauer: There is plenty curb space parking there already. What they are asking for is for a loading zone in front.

Commissioner Stewart: If they have an alley, I don't see where it is needed.

Mayor Gragson: I think you would have to know the condition of the property before we would know if the alley is adequate.

Mr. Sauer: The study was made by the Traffic Engineer to be presented to the Traffic and Parking Commission.

Mayor Gragson: Will this impede the traffic flow in there? No! What I mean, is this just an arbitrary decision that was made or was the decision made that they do not need it?

Mr. Sauer: That is correct. It was presented to the Traffic and Parking Commission following a study by the Traffic Engineer and it was his considered opinion, after studying it with the traffic officer, that it was not necessarily.....

Commissioner Corey: I make a motion that we follow the recommendation of the Traffic and Parking Commission.

Motion seconded by Commissioner Stewart and failed to carry by the following vote: Commissioners Howery, Mirabelli and Mayor Gragson voting "no" - Commissioners Corey and Stewart voting aye.

Commissioner Stewart: We had better make another motion, then.

Commissioner Mirabelli: No.

Commissioner Corey: The T & P has already heard it.

Commissioner Mirabelli: I understand that.

Commissioner Stewart: The motion was to deny it and that is where it stands, and you haven't approved it.

Mayor Gragson: OK, we need another motion.

Commissioner Mirabelli: If you would like, I would be glad to hold it for two weeks.

Commissioner Stewart: OK.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Right now, based on the information that I have, I am for it.

Commissioner Corey: What information do you have that I don't have?

Commissioner Mirabelli: I said, based on the information that I have right now, I would be for it.

Commissioner Corey: The Traffic and Parking Commission recommends denial. They have studied it.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Don't you ever vote against them?

Commissioner Corey: Not if I don't have any other information.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Well, do you want two weeks to go and look at it?

Commissioner Corey: No.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Then, I will move for APPROVAL.

Motion seconded by Commissioner Howery and carried by the following vote: Commissioners Howery, Mirabelli and Mayor Gragson voting aye; Commissioners Corey and Stewart voted "no."

Commissioner Corey: Why do we have the Traffic and Parking Commission?

Mayor Gragson: If the Traffic and Parking Commission makes the final decision, why bring it before us - may I ask?

Commissioner Howery: It would be like the Planning Commission when we vote against them.

Commissioner Corey: Yes, but we usually have something else to go on. I don't have any other information other than the Traffic and Parking Commission recommended denial. I assume that they know what they are doing.

Commissioner Howery: I think there should be a greater explanation on why they recommended denial.

Mayor Gragson: As long as there is plenty of parking space in the area and it isn't needed, I don't know who would know more than the operators there and they must have felt that it was needed or they wouldn't have made the request. It doesn't impede the traffic in any way.

Mr. Sauer: I have the minutes of the Traffic and Parking Commission meeting.

Mayor Gragson: We have already acted - we don't need them.

Mayor Gragson: I hope that the day never comes when we have to rubber stamp the Planning Commission, the Traffic and Parking Commission and all the others.

Commissioner Corey: Your Honor, I spent a lot of time on that Planning Commission and I spend hours and hours down here going over these things so that we can recommend to you with a good conscience what we feel is a good thing for the City. If you are not going to listen to us there is no use in me spending my time down here, and the rest of the gentlemen that serve on the committees.

Mayor Gragson: I don't always agree with you and probably never will all the time.

Commissioner Stewart: Your Honor, I recommend that we have a 10-minute recess.

(Mayor Gragson announced that there would be a 10-minute recess)

PARKING PRIVILEGES
FOR THE WORKING
PRESS

Commissioners
Howery & Mirabelli
appointed as a
committee to
evaluate

Mayor Gragson: We have some members of the Press here who are interested to know what, if any, disposition we are going to make concerning parking privileges for the working Press. I believe we have a committee on that, do we not?

Commissioner Howery: No, Sir, Your Honor, you didn't appoint one. The whole board discussed taking them off for everyone, but there hasn't been a committee appointed.

Commissioner Stewart: Ken Bouton sent out a letter with some suggestions and I thought the recommendation was very fine that the newspaper be given the privilege of buying a year's parking privilege pass for a small fee - \$5.00, \$7.50 or something like that, and this would solve the problem. It is done this way in other cities, as he stated in the report.

Mayor Gragson: Now, we have boards and commissions who serve the City, such as the Traffic and Parking Commission - especially, them, I have had those members in thinking it is extremely unfair for them to serve on this committee and walk out and find a \$2.00 parking ticket. I would have to agree. I think that we should analyze the ones that are actually deserving of these parking privileges and proceed with it.

Commissioner Howery: I won't argue with that, Your Honor. You will remember, I was the one that recommended taking them all off, including our own. There were so many of them that were so far out of line. I'm not opposed to the working Press if they are the ones that get them, but I don't think we should have a free book here to anyone that is employed by the newspaper, radio or TV so that they can have them automatically. If the papers say that they have four (4) working reporters and they want four (4) - I would say let's give them four (4) - but, not just "here they are - whatever you want."

Mayor Gragson: This is the thinking of the Press.

Commissioner Stewart: How many would each newspaper have to have? What is the limit?

Jim Burris: I would say that the maximum for the entire County would be twenty (20) people.

Commissioner Stewart: We aren't talking about the whole County. We are talking about just the City of Las Vegas.

Mr. Burris: This is a sheer maximum number of personnel actively engaged in gathering news and working on a beat.

Commissioner Corey: In all media?

Mr. Burris: Right.

Mayor Gragson: I would suggest that we consider, in order to be positive, issuing a specified number of permits and let the news media decide who in their organization is entitled to one of this limited number of permits.

Commissioner Stewart: Is there an association that could do this?

Commissioner Howery: Each newspaper could do this.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Call them up and ask them how many they need.

Commissioner Stewart: They would say twenty(20) each.

Commissioner Mirabelli: No, they won't. Tell them what our thinking is first.

Mr. Burris: For the record, I would like to make a few comments on this. My journalistic colleagues have elected me spokesman. Las Vegas currently is the only major metropolitan area to my knowledge that isn't providing parking, in one form or the other, for the Press. It has to be because of the economic structure of a reporter's salary. The average newsman in this town makes about the average of \$125.00 a week. If you hit him with \$25.00 a week for parking tickets, with what we are getting and doing our jobs, you are talking about a 25% cut in his income, which he certainly can't afford. I don't think you gentlemen could afford a 25% cut in your income.

Commissioner Corey: For the record, could we have your name?

Mr. Burris: Jim Burris of the Las Vegas Sun.

Say, you are covering a Press Conference at the Fremont Hotel. It may be a national personage who is saying some nice things about Las Vegas. All news is not bad news. We print a lot of good news. If you have to dash out at a crucial point and put a nickel in the meter and you have to tell your Managing Editor that you didn't get the story because you were feeding the parking meter, you have lost your job. I have some tickets here belonging to our Police Reporter. The nature of his job causes him to have to cover the highway patrol, the sheriff's department, city police, the airport, etc. He has to move around and he is bound to pick up a couple or three tickets each day. We have three or four reporters that are on roving assignments, our photographers, for example. I have the county beat. I am fortunate. There are two parking spaces provided at the County Courthouse, one for the Review-Journal and one for the Sun. The radio and television guys are out of luck. There is no parking provided for them and sometimes they have photographic equipment to carry with them for blocks. There are two spaces at the airport, but I have never seen a reporter able to park there yet. They are usually taken by a member of the civilian population. When I go out - many times I will call for a photographer and almost every time he will get a ticket because of waiting for someone to come out - perhaps, a criminal suspect who is being arraigned, say at 2:00 o'clock and the arraignment runs until 3:30. The photographer can't run across the street and put more money in that meter, as that is the time it is over with and he has only 20 to 30 seconds in which to get a picture of this person. So, it is a problem that the reporters can't help. It is as simple as that. They can't afford it financially. They shouldn't have to pay for the privilege of covering the news and I think it does fall under the title of public service in informing the public. I think anything over a nominal fee to the publisher would not be fair, because they would be paying for the privilege of putting out the news and we have a City where we have two (2) newspapers and several television stations, which makes for pretty fair competition - in political campaign years to assure fair campaigns, etc.

Mayor Gragson: Does it insure fair treatment of the office holders?

Mr. Burris: Well, yes, I

Mayor Gragson: I am being factitious, to a degree.

Mr. Burris: I am not being factitious in advising the commissioners. Reporters are human and if a reporter is being docked \$25.00 to \$30.00 a week, and he is writing a story about someone that is responsible for it, I don't know.....

Commissioner Howery: That statement lost me and I vote against any of them.

Commissioner Corey: Let me make one statement, Jim. I may be committing political suicide, because I want to say that a person that sells advertising in a newspaper has a job to do and he does a good job. They sell me every day. I buy advertising for my place of business, etc., and maybe he is almost to the point of closing me and he has to run out and put a nickel in the meter - maybe he won't do it, then he has a ticket. He has a job to do and he knows that he has to take care of that parking meter. A man that is writing news has a job to do and he is expected to do it in the best manner possible.

If he has to eat a ticket because he thinks he is going to get something that will help him to do his job better - then, that is his business - the same as a man that takes an ad for TV or anything else. I think that we should make some arrangements for the people that are in this particular business, whether they are selling ads, taking news copy or whatever in order that they may buy a year's pass - I think that is fine. I think it should be open to anybody that happens to be in that particular business, whether it is selling real estate, insurance or anything else, but I will not allow myself to be threatened that I will get bad Press

Mr. Burris: I thought we were kidding exchanging with the Mayor there, in a bit of joviality.

Commissioner Howery: I think he was. Mayor, I have a suggestion.

Mayor Gragson: O.K.

Commissioner Howery: I suggest that we give each newspaper six (6) and each TV station four (4), each radio station two (2) and they tell us who they want them assigned to.

Mayor Gragson: The ordinance will have to be changed.

Mr. Burris: Your current pool - actually, each of your television stations currently have three (3) people working news. At the present time, there is only one (1) radio station employing a newsman.

Commissioner Howery: I was trying to be fair about it, but we need to find out what their actual needs are. If they have three (3) people working, we don't want to give them four (4), etc. I was just trying to arrive at a figure.

Mr. Burris: I might make a suggestion on how you might a fair and equitable figure on this and how the list got out of proportion before. It was a chance for department heads to score, I don't know, maybe a point in favor for the people where you had so many salesmen and display people, etc. that had the stickers. You could contact the executive editors of the two newspapers and the general managers of the television stations.

Mayor Gragson: Would you do this since you have been appointed by your group - develop for us the need, as far as you can, of the working Press, meaning newspapers, television, radio, etc. and get in to the committee that I am going to appoint. I, also, want the committee to evaluate the needs of our boards and commissions. I am going to appoint Commissioners Howery and Mirabelli on that committee.

Mr. Burris: How long will that take in order that I may report back?

City Attorney: You have to refer an ordinance in. If you can get the material to me I can bring it in at the next meeting as an emergency ordinance, if you desire.

Mayor Gragson: I think this can well be done as an emergency ordinance.

City Attorney: I will need the material in so far as the amounts and number, etc. How about the fee?

Mayor Gragson: I think the fee is so insignificant that I don't think that we should.....

Commissioner Howery: We either give it to them, or we don't.

City Attorney: Will they be issued some kind of sticker? Is this what you are thinking?

Mayor Gragson: Yes.

Commissioner Corey: Are you going to include the commissioners in this?

Commissioner Mirabelli: The committee is going to make a recommendation and we will take a vote on it.

Mayor Gragson: The Press tells us they are the guardian of the people - yet, they are indicating that they would like for us to violate our own ordinance, but we will attempt to correct the condition.

Mr. Burris: It may appear to be a minor governmental problem to me and it may have its major administrative overtones, but I don't know. I do know that it is taken care of in other cities and I have worked in other major cities in this capacity and it is taken care of as an exercised right.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Will you call the City Manager and let him know what those figures are?

Mr. Burris: I will have the list tomorrow.

Mayor Gragson: Very good, then we will proceed from here.

DISCUSSION RE REGIONAL STREETS AND HIGHWAY COMMISSION (Additional Item)

Director of Public Works, R. P. Sauer: Your Honor, I would like to point something out to the commission at the moment. The Bond Issue for the Regional Streets and Highway was presented to the Clark County Commissioners a couple of days ago and it was held. I think the two people that held it were Commissioners Briare and La Porta. I think you are all aware that this is quite important as until such time as this is approved, Charleston Boulevard will have to be held in abeyance.

Commissioner Stewart: While we are on the subject - Mr. Howery has discussed this with me and I think he feels the same way. We have no more business being on that highway commission than to fly to the moon. No matter what we do, the County Commissioners can do what they want to do.

Commissioner Howery's resignation accepted - Mayor Gragson appointed

Mayor Gragson: You are wrong. They don't have to do what you do, but they can't go on their own and do things that.....

Commissioner Stewart: Just a moment. The District Attorney sits here and tells us differently.

Mr. Sauer: There is one thing, commissioner, right now, the District Attorney, as well as the Technical Committee is working on a proposed revision to this legislation that we now have. You, being on the board, would probably have some pretty good suggestions that we might incorporate into legislative action in 1969. There are going to be quite a few things brought up, I know.

Commissioner Stewart: We have had two things happen. Now, we, the commission, recommended the hiring of the bonding firm. The County Commissioners hired another one. We approved the bonding deal - it goes over there, and they are trying to kill it.

Mr. Sauer: Actually, I don't think it has gone that far. The only thing I think is that Commissioners Briare and LaPorta had some questions and it was just held. It was never voted on.

Commissioner Howery: If they had some questions, the chairman of that board is also the chairman of the County Commission and Mr. Ryan also served on it, and they should have been able to get satisfactory answers from their two commissioners representing them on this board. Apparently, they don't have any confidence in those two commissioners. As far as I am concerned, my time is too valuable to come down here and go through this hassle with these people and then have it go back to the County Commission, and have them say "we don't do it" - without any explanation or anything else as to why they don't do it. On this commission there is one representative from Boulder City, one from Henderson, one from North Las Vegas, two from the City of Las Vegas and two from the County Commission. We have a Technical Committee that makes recommendations to us, but any action that we take makes no difference, because the County Commission has the final say. We knew that it was necessary to move immediately on this Bond Issue. To finish work we had already committed to purchase right-of-way and we had planned to go to work on. We are out of funds. We knew that the general bond market was not too good at this time, so we can legally sell \$8,000,000.00. We said that we would sell \$4,000,000.00 in the unfavorable market and hold the other \$4,000,000.00 until it is a favorable market, but this would allow us to complete jobs that are now planned and ready to go into construction. For apparently no reason, it goes before the County Commission and it is held in abeyance - and, for what?

Mayor Gragson: I don't think it was ever voted on. There is nobody that knows that there is going to be a more favorable market than there is today.

Commissioner Howery: We are willing to take that chance, Mayor. It may be worse. I don't know. We do know that we are not in a good market today, but we needed the \$4,000,000.00 to proceed. We are willing to hold up on the other half, because we didn't need it right now - maybe we will get a better market and maybe we will get a worse one, who knows?

Commissioner Stewart: Mayor, the firm that the County Commissioners hired says that the chances of having a better market is greater than having a worse market six months from now, or a year from now.

If the federal government raises taxes and reduces some inflation, the market will get better. If the war ends, the market will get better. They say the chances of it getting better are greater than they are of it getting worse.

Mr. Sauer: Anyway, it might be mentioned that if you know Commissioners Briare and LaPorta, you might put in a good word for our cause.

Commissioner Stewart: If I have to go over there and start arguing with them, they can have it - I don't want to serve on the commission. They can just run it from start to finish.

Mayor Gragson: I am going to put it this way. If you want to resign from it - but, as long as it is established under the Regional Streets and Highway Commission, we are going to have our representatives on it.

Commissioner Howery: I would like to be replaced on it, Your Honor. Commissioner Corey says that he will accept.

Commissioner Corey: I just reconsidered.

Mayor Gragson: What is your thinking?

Commissioner Stewart: If somebody has to serve, I will stay there for awhile and take a look at it and see if some changes can be wrought. If we continue on in the same vein, I might be back in a month or two and say to put someone else on in place of me.

Mayor Gragson: Commissioner Howery, would you like to reconsider?

Commissioner Howery: No, Sir, I would like to be replaced. I feel that I am wasting my time and everybody else's time. Mayor, I think you should be on the board - you were in on it from the start.

Mayor Gragson: I will ask the commission to consider Commissioner Howery's resignation.

Commissioner Stewart moved that Commissioner Howery's resignation from the Regional Streets and Highway Commission be ACCEPTED.

Motion seconded by Commissioner Howery and carried by the following vote: Commissioners Howery, Corey, Stewart, Mirabelli and Mayor Gragson voting aye; noes, none.

Commissioner Howery moved that Mayor Gragson be APPOINTED to the Regional Streets and Highway Commission.

Motion seconded by Commissioner Stewart and carried by the following vote: Commissioners Howery, Corey, Stewart, Mirabelli and Mayor Gragson voting aye; noes, none.

Mayor Gragson: I would like to say that I would like to have the opportunity to serve on what I call one of the most important commissions in the County of Clark, and that is the Regional Streets and Highway Commission. You are proper when you say that I have worked on it. I worked on the 1¢ gasoline tax to the legislature and in all honesty, I would like to serve on that committee.

Commissioner Stewart: Let me ask you a question. Let's say that in the future, the Regional Streets and Highway Commission sits down here and determines some new priorities and the majority of the members of the Regional Streets and Highway Commission votes against the wishes of the County Commissioners - that we recommended some priorities, and they disagree. Where do we stand? According to Mr. Franklin's decision, as I understand it, they can go ahead and establish what they want and pass it and that is the way that it will be.

Mr. Sauer: That is why we are going to go to the legislature with suggested changes. If the commissioners and the mayor have any ideas and you will let me know what your feelings are, I could present them to the Technical Committee so that we could try to get them before the legislature. There are a lot of changes that should be made in this and I agree with you.

Mayor Gragson: Let me point this out, gentlemen. Commissioner Briare, in all honesty, represents the people of the City of Las Vegas, Commissioner LaPorta represents the three other incorporated cities and Commissioner Baskin represents the City of Las Vegas and Commissioner Lamb, the Commissioner-at-Large, and there are more votes in the City of Las Vegas than there is in all the rest of the County, so I believe that if, not in a direct way, but in an indirect way we have a recourse there.

LITTLE LEAGUE BASEBALL

City Manager: This item, Your Honor, concerns the Little League Baseball program. I don't know if there is someone here representing them tonight or not.

Abeyance

Commissioner Stewart: No, Fred, what do we have worked out now? You attended the last meeting with them.

Fred Martin, Supt. Recreation Department: I met with both the officers of the Central Little League and the Optimist Little League and they are going to submit a letter requesting a field. The Central Little League has already done this and the Optimist is going to do the same. We are going to try to work out something where they can use our fields, depending on what our projected uses are for ourselves.

Commissioner Stewart: There is only one problem involved that I know of and that isn't an administrative matter. I understand that Mr. Harvey has a lease from the City concerning concessions on City property and in City Parks. One of the methods on which the official Little League operates is that they operate a concession

themselves and the proceeds go to pay for the cost of the Little League program.

Mayor Gragson: He does have a five year contract with an option, is that right?

City Manager: I know it is a five-year, but I don't know about the option.

Commissioner Stewart: That is the only program, because the cost of the program, the Central Little League, is budgeted right now at \$12,000.00. We're not going to get \$12,000.00 from just the sponsors. It's got to come from somewhere else.

Commissioner Mirabelli: I think if you could see the sales from these Little League programs - I don't think that would do it either.

Commissioner Stewart: No, but this is what is done nationwide in the Little League Program.

Commissioner Mirabelli: Here, we don't have a lot of spectators like they do in a lot of cities.

Mayor Gragson: He has the contract. Do you have any questions?

Commissioner Stewart: No.

Mr. Harvey: May I say a word?

Mayor Gragson: Yes.

Mr. Harvey: Your Honor, and Mr. Commissioners, I believe it is a good idea - in fact, I am for anything that will sponsor or create a greater interest among the people themselves, especially the adults in baseball, and particularly baseball and the Little Leagues; however, going back to refresh your memory - four, five, six years ago in the ball parks that were in existence, I served in the capacity of furnishing wholesale products to various clubs and organizations that then tried to make themselves some money for their various causes and they wound up owing me money - those that talked fast enough to get me to believe them. They also destroyed property and left my property and the City's property in shambles. One of the things that I have completed since I took the contract over was to, at least, keep things presentable, pay the City each month for what percentages that were due them - I am continuing to do that and I would be happy to say that if you, as a Commission, wish to relinquish the City's percentage on the parks to the Little Leagues I still believe that I could make them more money by giving them the percentage than they could possibly make by operating it themselves, because they can't do it. It takes a lot of money to do it and roughly \$28,000.00 worth of equipment is sitting there for the baseball parks, alone, which will open up very shortly. I am opening up Squires Park for the Dog Shows on Sunday. There won't be a great deal of business, but they have asked me and I have said "yes." Anything that I can do at any time, I am at your service.

Mayor Gragson: Thank you.

Commissioner Stewart: Mayor, on this same subject, the idea that the Little League has at the moment is to take a complex like Muni out here, where you have one lighted field, and at their own expense-

it might take them five years, but they will light four more fields to where they will have five ball games going at a time - not just one. I think it will end up being a very large thing. We might have to wait two years to put in a Concession Stand, but the people are willing to operate it free - no labor costs - they already have a committee of thirty (30) women and their daughters that are going to work in shifts to do it, etc. I just can't see where somebody like this can't operate it and make some money when they don't have any labor cost. I just wanted to report to you from the last meeting. There will be another meeting tomorrow night and I am sure at that time they can put in writing what they would like to have.

It is their line and we could have use of the property and maintain them.

Mayor Gragson: I would like to suggest that, if the school board will, this commission and the school board get together as a whole and work out at this level, here and at the school board, what our joint cooperative efforts in these functions will be. What brings this to mind - we had a request from representatives of the school district to evaluate the possibility of joint library services, and actually, when it got to the point, the school board itself wanted no part of it. So, I think that we must go to the governing body before we make any commitment at this level.

Commissioner Howery: I agree. We should set a meeting and talk to them so that we can see where we are going.

Mayor Gragson: I don't think this is the only area that should be discussed, because we are both expending the same money and I believe that in every area possible we should have as close cooperation as we can, and I would like to know the thinking and desire of the school board.

City Manager: There is a representative here from the school district. He could contact members of the school district and we could set up a meeting .

Mayor Gragson: Will you proceed?

Commissioner Stewart: Fine.

Mayor Gragson: I am not indicating at all that this arrangement is agreeable, but I do think the two boards should meet and explore all the possibilities.
